BOSTON, Feb. 28.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:
"The market is rather slower again this week. The goods markets are irregularly active but manufacturers are inclined to move rather cautiously at the moment. There has been some movement in foreign wools which are procurable fully as cheap as domestic wools."
"Western operations have continued slow this week, with prices about on the same level."
"The manufacturing situation is less keen. Combers and spinners report a further let-down in operations."
"The foreign markets are very firm and the primary markets are making good clearances."

Texas Centennial Turns Spotlight on Allred



As work speeds toward completion for the Texas centennial which opens June 6, the spotlight turns with increasing intensity on the governor of the Lone Star state, James V. Allred, the man who is due a major share of the credit for making possible one of the big events of 1936 for the southwest. When Allred left the navy after the war to return to his home in Wichita Falls, he had little to qualify him for the executive mansion except determina-

tion and perseverance. A clerk's job yielded him enough money to finance a law education at Cumberland Law school in Tennessee. Returning to Wichita Falls, he began practicing law, was defeated for attorney general in 1926, won the post in 1931 and was re-elected in 1932. He became governor on June 15, 1935, and was named the "nation's most outstanding young man" last year by the U. S. Junior Chamber of Commerce.

ITALIANS CAPTURE COVETED POINT
ROME, Feb. 28.—(AP)—The Italian government announced today that its forces had captured Amba Alaji, the historic point reached by the Italian punitive expedition in 1895.

Amba Alaji was the farthest the Italians were able to penetrate in the former war with Ethiopia and it was at that place that the massing forces of Ethiopians stopped the Italians and turned them back to Adduwa to a crushing defeat in the following year.

The official war communique, issued earlier in the day, disclosed that the fascist troops were moving toward the old strategic point again.

In the original Amba Alaji battle, 2,000 Italians, mostly native troops, under Major Toselli, were annihilated.

OREGON EVENTS FLASHED FROM WIRE SERVICE
EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 27.—(AP)—The proposed allotment of CCC camps according to population drew a strong protest from the Eugene chamber of commerce in a communication to President Roosevelt and other officials.

Conservation work is needed most in thinly populated states, the chamber's petition declared.

ALBANY, Ore., Feb. 27.—(AP)—

District Attorney J. K. Weatherford, Jr., said today that J. J. Cronin, accused of assaulting Claude Hults with intent to kill, probably will be retried the first of April.

The jury disagreed in his first trial and he was freed on \$2000 bond.

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 28.—(AP)—Probability that Eugene will vote on the question to include its police department under civil service loomed today. The city attorney was instructed to draw up a resolution for vote at the May primary. The fire department was voted under civil service at the January ballot.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 28.—The navy department turned down a bill providing for the development of a naval base at Tongue point at the mouth of the Columbia river, the Oregonian's Washington correspondent said.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 28.—(AP)—Debt-distressed farmers should lay their cases before county debt adjustment committees, Walter A. Duffy, regional director of the resettlement administration, said today. He promised "a confidential hearing and all possible help toward a satisfactory solution."

LA GRANDE, Ore., Feb. 27.—(AP)—The La Grande grade school board re-elected teachers for 1936 with provision they must present satisfactory health certificates. The health program was made a permanent part of the board's policy for all teachers.

NORTH BEND, Ore., Feb. 28.—(AP)—The North Bend National bank will become an affiliate of the First National bank of Portland, effective March 1. It was announced here, C. P. Kibler, cashier, is to be retained as manager. The local bank's deposits approximate \$400,000.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 28.—(AP)—Senator Charles McNary nominated Alan G. Baker of Salem for appointment to the West Point military academy; the Oregonian's Washington correspondent said.

McNary named John C. Beatty, Jr., Portland, first alternate, and Hamilton E. Rebertsch, Portland, second alternate.

RICE IS SPEAKER ON WILDLIFE MEETING
Dexter Rice, who returned recently from Washington, D. C., where he attended a conference on the subject of wild life, told the Roseburg Rotary club yesterday of the newly formed organization for the conservation and protection of game in America. The newly organized, nation-wide wildlife institute was explained to the club. Oregon, with one of the three national vice-presidents and a director, fared unusually well in the organization, the speaker said. G. L. Finley was named vice-president.
