

BORAH HELD LONE REPUBLICAN HOPE

Idahoan Only Man Able to
Beat Roosevelt, Avers
Editor Gannett.

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Feb. 27.—(AP) — Frank E. Gannett said today "beat Roosevelt" must be the keynote of the republican campaign this year, and "Borah is the only hope of beating Roosevelt."

The Rochester, N. Y., publisher, who has accepted second place on the Ohio primary ticket with Senator William E. Borah, said defeat of Mr. Roosevelt was necessary to "safeguard" the constitution.

The publisher said if Senator Borah gains the nomination at the Cleveland convention he doubtless will be given his choice of running mate.

Gannett declined to intimate whether the Idahoan's selection of him now foreshadowed a vice presidential nomination if Borah becomes his party's candidate.

"You see the issue today goes beyond any program the republicans may offer," he said, "and Senator Borah and I are in pretty close accord on a constructive plan — the issue deals with the saving of fundamental Americanism itself," the publisher declared.

"Within the next four years the president will have in his hands appointment of four or five supreme court justices to fill vacancies which are almost certain to occur in the natural course of things."

"I would much prefer to have Borah appoint them than to have judges appointed who would be sympathetic to the new deal, to a planned economy and to further centralization in Washington of greater and greater powers and control over agriculture, industry and all other enterprises."

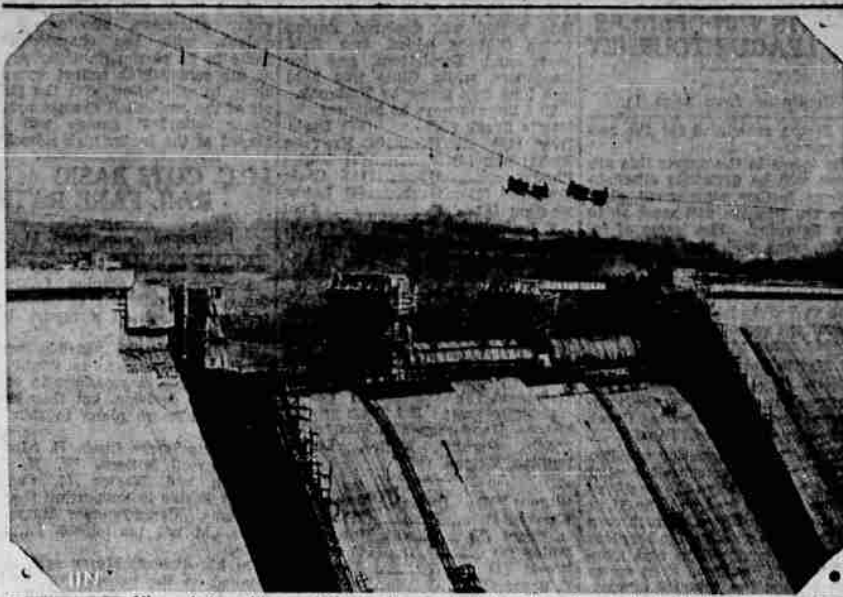
OTTUMWA, Iowa, Feb. 27.—Ray McKaig, candidate for the Idaho senate seat held by William E. Borah, declared here today that weeks of survey have convinced him Borah now holds the balance of favor in the republican party.

Next in line, he said, is Governor Alf M. Landon of Kansas.

Of Borah, McKaig said: "The senator from Idaho has two characteristics — one, like a prophet of Israel he denounces the sins of king and people alike; the other is a desire to build for future generations."

"His political record is a combination of eye and ear. Destruction? Yes, to those who loot the treasury and spread the power of bureaucracy. But he is a constructive."

UNUSUAL VIEW OF NORRIS DAM, NEARLY FINISHED

Norris dam, part of the huge TVA power project, now approved by the U. S. supreme court, is nearing completion on the Clinch river, near Knoxville, Tenn. This latest view of the dam shows the beginning of work on the last link necessary to complete the structure. At the left, through which

may be seen the rapidly-rising Norris lake, is the spillway where only one more drum gate is required. At the right, the first of six girders that will sustain a 300-foot bridge across the spillway, is being lowered. The girders are 112 feet long and weigh 40 tons each.

CORN-HOG PAYING PROCEDURE BEGUN

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—(AP) —Machinery went into gear today to pay the nation's corn-hog farmers about \$100,000,000 for their compliance with 1934 and 1935 AAA programs.

Farm administration officials said actual writing of checks to finish payments probably would begin in about two weeks and soon thereafter would proceed rapidly.

An opinion by Comptroller General J. R. McCall covering some legal questions is being awaited.

Secretary Wallace last night signed an order authorizing the payments under an appropriation bill recently passed by congress which included a \$296,000,000 item for farm administration benefit payments. The AAA corn-hog section immediately dispatched telegrams to major corn-hog states instructing them to proceed just as they had been when the payment work and compliance check was stopped January 6 by the supreme court decision invalidating AAA.

One major change in regulations had been made to permit farmers who were unable to raise 25 per cent of their hog quota to receive partial payments.

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TALMADGE BLAMES WOES ON NEW DEAL

Georgia Governor Asserts
State Embarrassed to
Halt His Campaign.

ATLANTA, Feb. 27.—(AP) —Governor Eugene Talmadge, in a written statement today, said the present situation in Georgia "was deliberately brought about by the new deal to stop Talmadge from campaigning against Roosevelt in the United States."

The governor's statement came on the heels of a move by a state senator for a call for a self-convening legislature to go into the situation arising from the governor's efforts to operate the state this year without an appropriations bill.

"They have gone to the length of backing up a suspended treasurer," Talmadge said, "in taking over twenty million dollars worth of bonds out of the vaults of the state."

"They have gone to the length of having the United States mail take letters containing checks away from the legal comptroller general and the legal state treasurer of Georgia."

"Their attorneys know that they are acting illegally."

"The pressure and recent appointment of a member of the federal reserve board from Atlanta is behind the whole works."

(Ronald Hanson, formerly vice-president of the Fulton National bank of Atlanta, was appointed to the federal reserve board recently by President Roosevelt.)

Governor Talmadge overcame a major threat to his financial dictatorship when his state highway bank withdrew approximately \$1,850,000 from the Fulton National bank and placed the cash in the vault of the state treasury.

This money had been on deposit to the credit of the highway board in the Fulton bank, which yesterday refused to honor a warrant for \$100,000 drawn on other state funds by the defunct state treasurer, J. B. Daniel.
