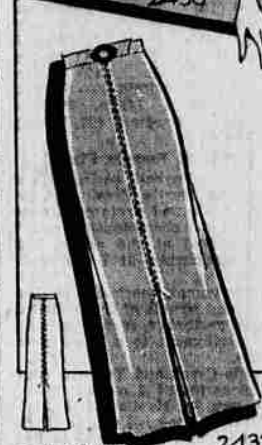

Warren Dick came home Monday, the logging camp where he has been working at Alleghany having to close for a time due to heavy snow.

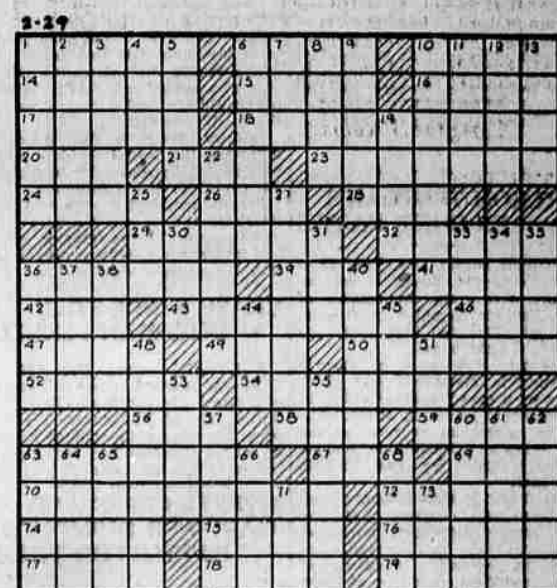
Guy Lawson and Ernest Wheeler went to Coquille on business Monday.

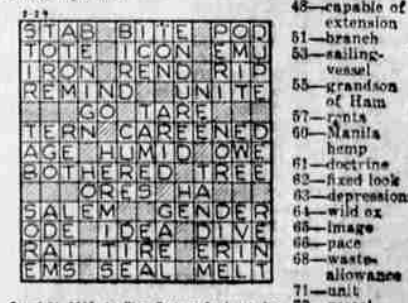
Several members of the ladies aid met at the home of Mrs. P. M. Paulson and finished quilting which started last week.
