

Roseburg Indians Tie Marshfield For Zone Lead

LOCALS WIN OUT BY TWO POINTS

Return Games Will Follow March 13 and 14 After Mix With Medford.

The Roseburg Senior high school Indians went into a tie with Marshfield in the Douglas-Coos county division of the state basketball conference by virtue of a 22 to 20 win over the Coos Bay team at Marshfield last night.

The game was Roseburg's last for the conference schedule. The Indians played Medford at Roseburg March 7 in the last home game of the season, and then on to Marshfield March 13 and 14 for the annual championship tournament, from which the winner will enter the state championship play at Salem.

Last night's game was a close and exciting struggle, with Marshfield taking an early lead with a free throw and three baskets to hold a margin of 7 to 1 at the quarter.

Roseburg's passing attack started clicking in the second quarter, and brought the score up to 14 to 13 in Roseburg's favor at half time.

Team Cuts Nicely

The second half was a bitter defensive struggle, with the Indians having a slight edge, forcing Marshfield to shoot from long range. The Indians worked well as a unit last night, both on offense and defense with no outstanding player in any department.

For Marshfield Rine and Johnson were the main threats throughout the game, showing in which they were very accurate. Roseburg's baskets came chiefly from quick breaks under the basket.

SPOKANE, Wash., Feb. 29.—(AP)—Jack Hubbard, of Klamath Falls, Ore., nursed a broken jaw today as a reminder of two rounds of fighting last night, with Bobby Milburn, Spokane.

Hubbard was unable to answer for the third round after going down for a count of nine in the second and taking a terrific rap on the jaw a few seconds before the round ended. Milburn weighed 165; Hubbard 164. The fight was scheduled for 16 rounds.

The final of a double main event saw a terrific round draw between Jimmy McLeod, hard-hitter, Tacoma, and Buzz Brown, Portland. McLeod weighed 132; Brown 130. The tide of battle changed throughout. Brown won the early rounds; McLeod rallied with a two-fisted attack from the fifth to ninth, and Brown came back to take the tenth.

OREGON TEMPLAR'S EX-CHIEF PASSES

NORTH BEND, Ore., Feb. 28.—(AP)—Andy P. Davis, 62, of Coquille, past grand commander of the Knights Templar in Oregon, died at a hospital here today following a heart attack.

He was stricken at a Masonic meeting in Marshfield last night. He was a past presiding officer of all Masonic lodges in Marshfield.

Ten years ago he received the red cross of Constantine, highest honor awarded by the Knights Templar.

He formerly was a deputy sheriff here, was in charge of the Pacific lumber inspection bureau offices on Coos bay, served two years as executive secretary of the Marshfield chamber of commerce and was county juvenile officer.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 29.—(AP)—A topsy-turvy basketball season was ended today for southern division teams of the coast conference and Stanford and University of Southern California emerged tied for the division championship.

BABY GIRL BORN TO MOTHER AGED 12

RENO, Nev., Feb. 28.—(AP)—A seven-pound baby girl was born to 12-year-old Genevieve Myer of Sparks, Nev., at the Washoe General hospital here today.

Alva Jones of Sparks, 24-year-old alleged father of the baby, is serving five to fifteen years in the Nevada state penitentiary at Carson City on a statutory charge. J. N. Irwin, 53, who was also accused of attacking the girl, is serving a five-year to life sentence in the same prison.

Miss Myer will be 13 years of age April 2.

TRAGEDY HITS HOME OF JAP FARMER

SEATTLE, Feb. 29.—

(AP)—Paul Kondo, Kent Japanese farmer whose wife was found shot to death at their home last night, was in a critical condition at a hospital here today, with a bullet in his head.

Physicians said he might recover.

Deputy Coroner John P. Brill, Jr., reported neighbors called authorities last night after hearing shots at the home. As he and other deputies arrived, Brill said, they heard a shot and found Kondo wounded beside his wife's body.

Mrs. Kondo, 27, had been shot three times. Relatives said they had quarreled and Mrs. Kondo had threatened to return to Japan with their young son.

TIME EXTENDED FOR LIQUOR PERMITS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 29.—(AP)—Willard S. Alexander, new federal alcohol administrator, today extended until July 1 the time for liquor, wine and beer wholesalers to secure permits under the new control unit. He said there were 8,600 applications for the basic permits and the extension was granted to provide sufficient time for "proper consideration."

The original deadline was March 1.

Alexander also extended the effective date of labeling and advertising regulations for the distilled spirits and wine industries. Labeling regulations, originally scheduled to become mandatory on March 1, will not take effect until August 15 for distilled spirits and December 15 for wine.

OREGON TOWNSEND GROUP IS HALTED

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 29.—(AP)—Townsend members who gathered here last night to name a committee to endorse candidates for national officers bumped squarely against order from national headquarters that no action be taken at this time on candidate endorsement.

Charles E. Hansen, state manager, ordered the measure from national headquarters ordering the Oregon group to refrain from picking its own candidates.

12 GYPSIES JAILED FOR MURDER, THEFT

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 29.—Twelve followers of the open road were locked in jail here today as police sought the marauding Gypsies who robbed and fatally injured an elderly bachelor at Crosby, Wash., Wednesday.

Andrew Clinchy, 70, died the day following the brutal mugging and heading for Gypsies who obtained \$70 from him at his residence.

On his deathbed Clinchy told officers of the unexpected and vicious assault by the Gypsies, who had inquired of neighbors where to find the solitary dweller.

CRASH SENDS STEEL INTO MAN'S SKULL

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 29.—(AP)—A two-inch piece of steel penetrated the skull of Clark F. Sutter, 23, of Vancouver, Wash., when his automobile collided head-on with a streetcar here last night. His condition was critical.

Volleyball Rounds Played
In the volleyball series, Days Creek and Myrtle Creek survived the double round yesterday to advance to the championship match. It will be played at the senior high school gymnasium at 7 o'clock tonight.

Close games marked the first and second rounds of the volleyball journey yesterday, furnishing plenty of excitement to a large crowd of fans.

Myrtle Creek and Yoncalla opened the series at 4 o'clock with a close affair. Gardiner winning 31 to 29 after Lookingglass made a remarkable second half comeback. Gardiner's strong team had a 21 to 9 lead at the half, Lookingglass being quite erratic in the early part of the game. In the second period, however, the Lookingglass girls put on a fine exhibition to come within two points of the coast team at final time.

Reedsport, with a strong, fighting team, using a good system of "kills" at the net, swamped Sutherland 34 to 18. Sutherland did not play as strong a game as exhibited earlier in the season.

Days Creek and Drain fought an interesting game, despite the fact that Days Creek had a substantial lead throughout. Both teams played a careful but steady game, although play was fast.

Both teams were good on handling low balls, and both exhibited unusually quick recovery. Days Creek, however, played the more consistent brand of ball and piled up a lead of 20 to 5 at half time. Days Creek won by the score of 28 to 15.

Yoncalla and Lookingglass played the first game of the second round, Yoncalla proving too strong for the Lookingglass team and winning 33 to 11 after playing on fairly even terms in the first half.

Myrtle Creek easily outplayed Gardiner 30 to 17 in a game which was featured by long volleys. The teams played fairly even in the first half, which Myrtle Creek took 15 to 10, but Myrtle Creek's ability to maintain consistent handling of the ball gradually gave a growing lead in the second period.

Drain Rally Futile
Sutherland won a first half victory over Drain, taking the half 22 to 8. Drain, however, made a brilliant finish but was unable to overcome the early lead and lost 30 to 29.

The final game of yesterday's round saw Days Creek smother Reedsport 34 to 10. Reedsport was apparently tired and was unable to meet the fast pace set by the smooth-playing team from the south division.

The results of yesterday's games bring Myrtle Creek and Days Creek together for the championship tonight. Yoncalla meets Sutherland and Gardiner plays Reedsport in the semi-final round of the consolation this afternoon, with the consolation finals to be played at 5:30 o'clock.

F. R. TAX PROGRAM FACING BATTLE

of the house ways and means committee, which will begin work on a tax bill quickly, needed the tax would be nothing like \$785,000,000. But Representative Bankhead (D., Ala.) said the president's request would be met.

"We can't go on forever with all outgo and no income to offset it," he said. "The president has made his mind to balance the regular budget and he's going to do it."

Representative Snell (R., N. Y.), minority house leader, said: "Oh, this country is going to be tax conscious, all right, and the sooner it is, the quicker this spending will stop."

Defending new deal expenditures for relief and recovery, Representative Samuel R. Hill (D., Wash.), said: "We'll get this money and what else is needed for honest and constructive rehabilitation of the country."

Income Levies Opposed.

The president's program gave life to house proposals for inflation and senate moves to raise income and excess profits taxes. Administration spokesmen said both would be beaten, but from one democratic, Senator Walsh of Massachusetts, came the forecast that any substantial new taxation must come from income levies.

Some administration leaders were hopeful of avoiding any new taxes, and confining the revenue bill to replacement of the invalidated processing taxes. As the plan now shapes up, the president is seeking the following:

A permanent tax of \$500,000,000 a year to pay for the new farm program.

A nine year tax of \$120,000,000 annually to meet the additional bonus costs.

A three-year tax of \$165,000,000 annually to replace the revenue lost this year by the invalidation of the processing tax.

Informed members of congress said the permanent farm revenue would be chiefly raised through new processing taxes, spread broader and thinner, than the old ones.

"Recapturing" is Aim.
They said the \$165,000,000 "recapture" levy would largely come from recapture of this year's refunded or "delinquent" processing taxes. About \$180,000,000 in processing taxes were refunded under supreme court orders, while payment of another \$120,000,000 had been refused, making a total of about \$300,000,000. New dealers count on recapturing much of this.

President Roosevelt said he favored new income taxes to meet the cost of the bonus. It was this, which congressional leaders hoped to avoid through higher tax returns in March.

Speaker Byrns said today that "any unexpected increase in the March returns would cut down the amount needed in taxes." He added that was "what everybody hopes will happen."

Treasury experts have already estimated large increases in revenue beginning in March from last year's business improvement. They have contended, however, that their estimates of the increases were conservative and might be substantially exceeded by the actual returns.

No Suicides Reported

Reports that some or all of the rebel officers had committed harakari were not confirmed. Other reports said that imperial permission had been granted when insurgent officers, unable to obey the emperor's command, had asked permission to kill themselves.

During the morning operations the United States embassy was protected by a military guard estimated at 30 men armed with machine guns with strong barricades of sandbags and logs defending all approaches.

At 4 p. m. the administration lifted traffic restrictions, permitted the city to resume its normal business, where formerly all of central Tokyo had been virtually abandoned.

OSC BASKETEERS WIN OVER U. OF O.

Stellar Work of Palmberg Big Factor in Beavers' Victory, 35 to 29.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 29.—(AP)—Talk of little else but basketball echoed on the Oregon State campus as the Beavers pointed toward the title-deciding series with the University of Washington at Seattle next week-end.

The Beavers, once apparently hopelessly out of the race for honors in the northern division Pacific coast conference, turned in their fifth consecutive victory last night, defeating a dinged University of Oregon team 35 to 29. The game made it 3 to 1 for the Beavers in their four-contest series with the rival Oregon school.

Wally Palmberg, Beaver forward, came within 15 points of the conference scoring record when he bonated his total last night to 161 by tossing in six field goals and a pair of free throws. He has two games left to play.

The Washington Huskies, with 11 victories and three defeats, need but one of the games with Oregon State to clinch northern division honors. The Beavers, defending champions, have won 10 and lost four, and thus need both contests to repeat for the title.

Washington state is in third place with six wins and seven losses, Oregon is fourth with four wins and eight losses and Idaho last with a pair of victories and 11 defeats.

Last night's contest was bitterly contested. The Webfoots jumped to an early 4 to 2 lead but were trailing at half-time 18 to 13. With eight minutes left to play, the Beavers were out in front 29 to 16 but the fireworks had barely started. From there on out, the Webfoots splattered in baskets from all over the floor, halted the Beavers' scoring at 35 points with five minutes to go and rolled in four more goals to narrow the gap to six points just before the final gun.
