Governor Landon Keeps Middle Course in Quiet Drive for Presidential Nomination

WASHINGTON (AP)—When Alfred Moseman Landon twice resisted democratic vote inundations to seize and retain the governorship of Kansas, his place among 1936 republican presidential nomination possibilities was assured.

The "grand old party" had too few cases in '32 and '34 for the "Kansas budget balancer" to be overlooked.

Until very recently, Governor Landon did nothing obviously to seek party honors at Cleveland in June. His friends ran a "sell Landon" boom, but the governor stuck to state affairs.

He was a mystery man until his speech in Topeka at the Kansas day celebration January 29 of this year had the effect of tossing his hat into the republican nomination ring, however silent as to his personal ambitions Landon remained.

In that speech, dealing almost wholly with national issues, he definitely joined the chorus of republican attack upon the Roosevelt new deal as "delaying the return of prosperity" by mismanagement and waste.

His call for "better housekeeping" in Washington, for "revival of confidence in national credit," in soundness of the dollar, in the government at Washington, to bring "a flood tide of recovery," had the look of a Landon platform and was so construed. It was regarded as an application of Landon's "pay-as-you-go" policy in Kansas to the national scene.

The Boom Goes National.
The Topeka speech did more than that. It represented without doubt the judgment of the government at Washington.

That with it the Landon boom began assuming proportions of a real drive for the nomination is hardly to be questioned.

Frank Knox, maker of opportunities, Now Raps at the Door of White House

WASHINGTON (AP)—Col. Frank Knox, of Massachusetts, Michigan, New Hampshire and Illinois, believes in making his own opportunities.

He carved out his professional career the way he won his military title—by starting from scratch and working hard. He seems to have carried the same tactics into politics.

The colonel—the pistol-shot "Frank Knox" was contracted from "William Franklin Knox" on his own motion—enlisted as a Rough Rider under Leonard Wood and Theodore Roosevelt in 1898 and reached a lieutenant colonelcy in a big gun regiment in France in 1917-18.

Hammers For Success
He began his newspaper career, which has carried him to the publisher's desk of a great Chicago daily and with the sight of republican presidential nomination, as a reporter in Michigan.

Whatever his work, the records disclose him as no man to wait on opportunity. He has hammered hard and always at the door of success—opening up his own paths.

He has steered an undisciplined course toward realization of ambition for high political preferment. Formal announcement of his candidacy came when he filed in the Illinois primary. He has been more willing to talk on prospective campaign issues, more ready with plans of procedure, than the other probable aspirants.

Knows The Ropes
There are means by which an energetic republican could help destiny shape party ends at Cleveland.

LOS ANGELES, March 2 (AP)—March came in with two slight earth shocks in southwestern Los Angeles and an 82-degree "heat wave."

Diapers rattled in suburban Ingleside yesterday when a pair of slight earthquakes centered there and sent families running into the street. No damage, however, was reported.

Long Beach, badly damaged in the 1933 earthquake, was undisturbed, as were Santa Monica and other neighboring communities. Beaches were crowded, life guards estimating more than 100,000 persons on the strand. In the mountains, snow-blanketed by February storms, thousands enjoyed winter sports.

Simplicity Keynote
But by hit they have built up a picture of a man who likes the homey things of life. He likes to put his feet on the desk, they say, prefers plain folks and old clothes, enjoys fishing and a quiet game of cards, smokes a pipe.

A business man in politics, they call him—with a hard head but a kind heart, modest and thrifty.

Reformers made his Topeka address the vehicle for presenting his economic philosophy on a national scale, the governor declined many out of state invitations to speak on national affairs.

That address made him a part of the political activity that introduced in January a presidential campaign year far ahead of normal schedule.

land. Although he only once has run for public office—governor of New Hampshire—and then been defeated, Colonel Knox has been active in party affairs for years and in more than one state. He knows what to do.

Waiting to be drafted would mean foregoing important organizational work for the enlistment of delegates in advance. Colonel Knox's temperament hardly harmonizes with such strategy. Wherefore it would little surprise political observers if at Cleveland he disclosed a considerable block of southern votes.

There may be little prospect of republican electoral votes from the south, but that section casts a good share of the votes at a convention, and there have been whispers for months that "Knox men" were working quietly among southern republicans in the colonel's behalf.

A Regular Republican
Colonel Knox can qualify doubly for the possible republican insistence on a western candidate. Boston born, he was reared and began his newspaper career in Michigan. He transferred back to New England for a period of years, making New Hampshire the site of his activities. Now he has turned west again as publisher of the Chicago Daily News.

He was a Theodore Roosevelt follower in 1912 and a Leonard Wood supporter in 1920, but he campaigned vigorously for Warren Harding when the '20 nomination was made. That perfects his party regularity. His political assets include a robust physique, fighting ardor, a powerful voice and an engaging personality.
