

PRICES FIXED FOR OFF-GRADE PRUNES

Federal - Subsidized Agency Announces Schedule On Door Test Basis.

From a recent meeting of the executive committee of the Pacific Prune Products association announcement has been made of the schedule of prices at which the government subsidized agency offers to buy 1935 crop off-grade prunes.

The price schedule of the offering is as follows:

40/larger	\$40.00 per ton
41/61	\$30.00 per ton
62/81	\$25.00 per ton
82/101	\$22.50 per ton
102/smaller	\$17.50 per ton

These prices are subject to the deduction of \$1.75 per ton, which the government requires that the seller shall pay on account of the administrative costs of this buying agency.

As explained in the announcement: "These prices will be paid for ungraded stocks on a door test basis. The object of this offering is to divert inferior fruit from the effect of competing with good fruit in the ordinary channels of trade. The Pacific Prune Products association is under contract with the department of agriculture to resell sub-standard fruit into by-product channels only. As losses are incurred on account of such sales, the Pacific Prune Products association will be reimbursed from the appropriation provided under section 32 of the amendment to the agricultural adjustment act passed in the last congress. The procedure established under this section of the act was not affected or disturbed by the recent decision of the supreme court affecting production control."

Offering Explained
H. H. Hyde, manager of this newly established organization states, explaining the offering: "The real object of the prune diversion plan is to buy in any off-grade prunes which might be used in the preparation of competitive packs. The competitive packing and sale of off-grade fruit at a discount is one of the most disturbing influences in the prune trade. As the Prune Products association may be offered fruit ranging from slabs to culls the price range of the offering is from \$15.00 to \$50.00 per ton."

"The Pacific Prune Products association was organized primarily for the purpose of handling about 10,000 tons of sub-standard fruit carried over from the California control board operation in the season of 1934. This transaction is expected to be completed on or about March 10."

Manager Hyde further explained that although the operation of the Pacific Prune Products association was only finally established during the past month, "providing the foundation in law and the contract with the secretary of agriculture can be continued, a similar purchase and diversion of sub-standard fruit may be carried on in the future to the great advantage of the prune industry of the coast."

"Owing to the late season's start, on the 1935 crop it is not expected that any material tonnage will be available for purchase. Growers and others in the northwest who have any sub-standard fruit to offer may make inquiry as to the complete terms and conditions of the offering by addressing Pacific Prune Products association, 24 California street, San Francisco, Calif. As any material tonnage may be offered from the northwest, plans for receiving and handling will be established."

SEED LOAN VETO LIKELY TO STAND

WASHINGTON, Mar. 2 — (AP) — The senate agriculture committee decided today to investigate the adequacy of the \$30,000,000 President Roosevelt has promised to make available for 1936 seed and feed loans before attempting to override the veto of a \$50,000,000 authorization.

Members came out of the meeting with a statement that Chairman Smith (D-S. C.) had insufficient votes to take the vetoed bill to the floor for a vote.

Senator McNary, the republican leader and member of the committee, said the group agreed to a proposal by Senator Thomas (D., Okla.) that the bill be kept alive in the committee while an investigation of seed loan needs by districts is carried out.

Most members predicted this

would end the controversy without trying to override the president's wishes.

PRESIDENT WORKS ON TAX MESSAGE

WASHINGTON, Mar. 2 — (AP) — President Roosevelt today set aside the afternoon for completing a special message to congress on taxes.

Stephen T. Early, a white house secretary, said the president would not deliver the message in person. It is expected to go to Capitol Hill tomorrow.

PETTY THEFTS TOP STATE CRIME LIST

Drunkenness 2nd in Annual Report of Police; Fines Total \$125,951.

SALEM, Mar. 2 — (AP) — The state police reported a total of 12,135 arrests made during 1935 by its three divisions which resulted in jail sentences of more than 632 years and fines assessed amounting to \$125,951, the report of Charles P. Pray, superintendent, revealed today.

In addition to warning and checking the police also collected fees amounting to \$36,816. The three main divisions are general law enforcement, traffic law activities and the game division.

Of the 2,396 general law enforcement arrests, the greatest number, 430, were for larceny of \$35 and under, followed closely by arrests for drunkenness and disorderly conduct. Heaviest jail sentences were for burglary, followed by statutory offenses and larceny. Most fines were for sale of liquor, drunkenness and larceny in that order.

In the traffic division failure to carry operators' licenses led in arrests, followed by lack of motor transportation permits and reckless driving. Driving while intoxicated resulted in 234 arrests, but the proportion to total violations ranked far down the list.

Fines assessed in the traffic division were led by violators of the drunken driving act, for a total of \$19,909. Reckless driving fines followed with \$15,327, while driving without licenses was third.

Fees collected were largely for license plates and void foreign licenses.

Fishing without licenses accounted for the highest game violations, the report showed, followed by possession of game animals and hunting without licenses. Jail sentences and fines assessed followed in the same order.

AMERICAN FLIERS AID PERILED CREWS

TIENTSIN, Mar. 2 — (AP) — Help came from the skies today for ice-locked ships frozen into the Gulf of Chilli.

Two American aviators dropped food to the marooned crews, staving off the starvation which has threatened the sailors since their ships were trapped in the ice two weeks ago.

The two fliers were A. R. Kidder, Washington, D. C., and R. W. Simons, West Plains, Mo. They were in a plane of the China National Aviation corporation, the airline in which the Chinese government and Pan-American Airways are partners.

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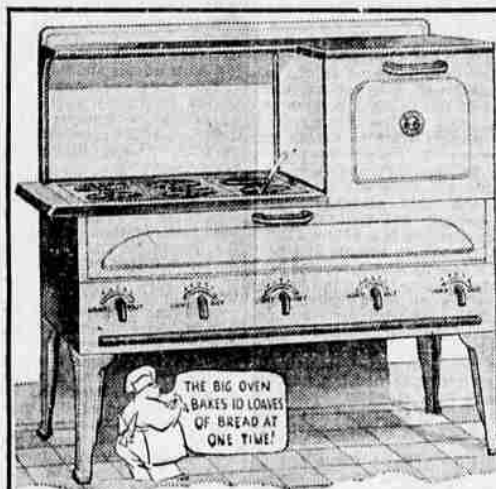

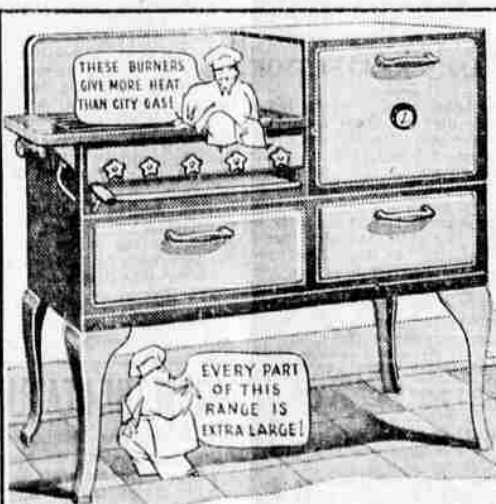
