DEATH TOLL IN RAIL HORROR GOES TO 16

REVELSTOCKE, B. C., March 3.—(AP)—D. D. Cossar, district manager of the Revelstoke division of the Canadian Pacific railway, died today from burns and shock suffered yesterday when a runaway tender struck a work crew in a snow cut near Downie, 26 miles east of here.

His death brought the toll of lives to 16 with five injured still in a hospital. The five are expected to recover.
