Fifth British Party Assaults Mt. Everest In Defiance of Perilous Natural Forces

DARJEELING, India (AP)—The snowlocked secret of Mt. Everest still inviolate after four desperate assaults by man, may soon be revealed at last.

About March 15, a new British expedition, headed by the veteran Hugh Rutledge who captained the luckless 1933 venture, will leave here in the fifth attempt to scale the 29,140-foot monarch of the mountains.

Literally "breathing" defiance, in the form of a diaphanous white plume which swirls around the great, the Himalayan giant has repelled every onslaught since the first expedition in 1921.

"Demons" Tibetans explain. Roaring avalanches, precipitous ice cliffs, the heart-suffocating of dizzying heights and the sub-zero blasts that forever rage around the peak, have proven insurmountable hazards to climbers—hurting them back again and again, until some almost believe the native Tibetan superstition that "demons" rule the mist-enshrouded pinnacle and prevent man from reaching the top.

One of the chief aims of Rutledge and his band will be an attempt to solve the 12-year old mystery of the fate of Mallory and Irvine, two members of the 1924 expedition who vanished into the mists when less than 100 feet from the top.

"Demons," said the natives. To that the white man can only shrug. All that is known is that one instant Mallory and Irvine were clearly seen by other members of the party below. In the next, they had disappeared—apparently swept off the face of the

earth by a sweep of the white vapor plume.

Two Men May Reach Top. The actual ascent of Mt. Everest, launched by a successive series of five or six camps to a height of about 27,000 feet, probably will start in the middle of May. Porters and even cooks will go as high as 24,000 feet, and from there on the main party of twelve expert climbers will "carry on."

Their great struggle will be over the last exhausting 2,000 feet. Only two men will attempt the final dash.

Experienced Alpinist says that after 20,000 feet the slightest exertion is almost beyond human endurance. The effort of stooping to tie a shoe lace causes violent palpitation of the heart, and even slow walking induces nausea and a feeling of suffocation.

Equally, if not more, troubling is the effect on climbers' mental attitudes—the utter depression and fits of irritability which make them quarrel savagely over trifles and at the same time become so careless that they fail to take vital precautions against danger.

Even after long acclimatization, the human body revolts at such altitudes as Rutledge's party will face for many weeks, and in the last stages of the assault it will take the climbers more than an hour for each hundred feet of lung-pounding progress.

Oxygen would banish one of the main handicaps, but the weight of the gas containers makes it out of the question, since at that altitude a hunky, physically-fit man staggers under a 20-pound pack.

LOG HAULERS CITED ON OVERLOAD CLAIM. SALEM, March 5.—(AP)—Henry Callister of Agate Beach and Leymon R. Johnston of Gearhart were cited to appear before the utilities commissioner here to show cause why their permits to operate as log haulers should not be revoked.

Both men were arrested by state police on charges of overloading. Other truck operators will be cited for hearing later, the utilities commissioner announced.

THREE-BUS LIMIT GIVEN STAGE LINE. SALEM, March 4.—(AP)—The public utilities commissioner today issued a permit to operate interstate through Oregon to the Benjamin Franklin Lines, Inc. The company operates between Seattle and Los Angeles.

The permit, granted after a hearing, restricts the company's operations to three buses.

MR. AND MRS. JONES WILL CELEBRATE GOLDEN WEDDING ANNIVERSARY ON FRIDAY

SUTHERLIN, March 5.—Mr. and Mrs. T. E. Jones of Sutherlin will observe their fiftieth wedding anniversary Friday, March 6. The many years of their married life, spent for the most part in frontier-like sections of the west, make up a story as fascinating as any novel of pioneer days.

In the early spring of 1886, Miss Libbie M. Dakin, leaving Elko, Nevada, traveled about one thousand miles to Sheridan, Wyoming. The last one hundred and fifteen miles had to be made by stage coach through deep snow. One memorable event of the trip took place at the Big Horn River, where it was necessary for the passengers to cross the river over the broken ice at night in a box suspended by a cable in order to make connections with the stage across the river.

When she finally reached her destination she was met by Thomas E. Jones, whom she married there on March 6, 1886. After living five years in Wyoming, Mr. and Mrs. Jones returned to Nevada, their former home, making the entire trip by journey and a six-hour team trip. The journey, going by way of Yellowstone park, which was then a national wild state, took six weeks. They settled at Elko, Nevada, where they were engaged in cattle ranching for a number of years. In 1900 they moved to Santa Rosa, California, and were there at the time of the great earthquake in 1906. Since that time they have lived in Nevada, California and Oregon. At the present time they are making their home in Sutherlin where they operate a small telephone exchange.

Mr. Jones was born in Dayton, Nevada, in 1864, and Mrs. Jones was born at Honey Lake, California, in 1867. Five children were born to this union, four of whom are living.

We, however, do have something that most cities of this size do not have and that is nothing more than a fine band. What would a convention be without a band? "Snap" Gilmore is very anxious that the proper picture be secured and just as soon as the contract is signed he will announce the name of the picture to the public. Many people are already planning to attend "that" show because regardless of the name, they have plenty of confidence in the ability of Don Radabaugh and "Snap" Gilmore to deliver the goods.
