SMITH RIVER ROAD EXTENSION WISHED

County Court Will Discuss Project With Forest Service Officials.

Members of the county court will go to Portland Thursday of next week to meet with forest service officials relative to continuation of extension of the Smith river road. The court will probably be accompanied by representatives from the Smith River district, who were represented before the court yesterday by a large delegation.

Rumors of the possible removal of the present CCC camp at Smith River caused the delegation to meet with the court yesterday to protest the change, and this protest will be taken before the forest service officials by the court, which is anxious to complete the project.

"We are very anxious to complete the Smith river road," County Judge George Quine said today, "and have given every possible cooperation to the forest service. The trouble is, however, that the CCC camp is operated during the winter time when very little work can be done, and is then moved out in the summer, when it would be possible to do a lot of good work."

"We hope to be able to keep the camp in operation during the coming summer to complete the four miles of grading still required. About 11 miles of grading has already been finished, and the road can be completed this summer if the men are made available."

The court expects that officials from the Siuslaw national forest, which is cooperating in the project, will also be present at the forthcoming meeting in Portland.

HAGOOD OUSTER INQUIRY DENIED

er government officials.

General Hagood was ordered to his home in South Carolina to await orders after he had testified before a house appropriations subcommittee and referred to WPA funds as "stage money."

Hopkins Complaints
Yesterday it was disclosed the removal of Hagood was preceded by a formal complaint from Harry L. Hopkins' office about the general.

The military subcommittee declared language critical of the president in such instances was in violation of the sixty-second article of war prescribed by congress.

It added that in this particular case Hagood "by other language could have conveyed to the committee his opinion that it would be much better to expend public funds for the building of quarters and barracks for housing the army than for purposes for which he considered wasteful and unnecessary."

The report added that "ample opportunity was given him to revise his testimony, which he declined to do."

Not Up to Congress
Whether the removal was justified under the generally accepted ethics of military discipline, the subcommittee said it was of the opinion that "matters of military discipline must be determined by the commander-in-chief, or proper officials of the war department, and that it would be unwise for congress to undertake to determine what is, or what is not, proper military discipline, providing the same is not contrary to the articles of war which congress enacted as a statute for the government of the army."

The report said there was "no necessity" for an investigation to determine the persons responsible for the provisions of the Metcalf resolution. It said under the constitution the president is commander-in-chief of the army and the order of removal stated that it was "by direction of the president."

EX-ATTORNEY GEN. OF WASHINGTON DIES

OLYMPIA, Wash., March 6.—(AP)—John H. Dunbar, 46, former state attorney general, died here today. He was taken to a hospital with a liver ailment yesterday. Dunbar was attorney general during the gubernatorial administrations of Louis F. Hart and Roland H. Hartley from 1922 to 1932. He was of pioneer Washington stock, the son of the late Chief Justice Ralph Oregon Dunbar of the supreme court and the late Mrs. Clara A. Dunbar, who was born in Portland in 1852.
