

WOMAN-COACHED FIVE SHOWS CLASS

Port Orford Holds Own at Hoop Tournament; Myrtle Creek Stands Pace.

ASHLAND, Ore., March 6.—(AP)—A woman-coached team was the talk of the southern Oregon invitational tournament here today as eight teams which survived the first two rounds yesterday battled in the quarter finals and semi-finals.

Port Orford, coached by Principal Ruth Clark, just wouldn't be beaten, and after the third overtime period last night emerged a 19 to 18 winner over Riverton high.

The score was tied 17 to 17 at the end of regular play. Then for two breathless overtime periods neither team scored. Two free throws in the third extra frame brought Port Orford the win.

Other teams which won their way to the quarter-finals were Bluff Falls, Merrill, Phoenix, Malin, Jacksonville, Powers and Myrtle Creek.

In the second round games Bluff Falls set a fast pace to defeat Williams 39 to 22. Merrill edged out Wilbur 22 to 19 to become one of the favored teams.

Another impressive team was Phoenix which eliminated Arago 27 to 13. Malin beat Drain 23 to 16.

In a hotly contested game Jacksonville topped Riddle 24 to 22. Powers loomed as the team to beat after it eliminated Gardiner, last year's champion, by a 21 to 12 score.

The strong Myrtle Creek five eliminated Glendale 24 to 16. Coach Ruth Clark's Port Orford team set the highest scoring mark yesterday and at the same time turned in the best defensive showing by defeating Lookingglass 42 to 2 in the first round.

In the consolation round, Reedsport beat Bonanza 28 to 23. Sams Valley eliminated Central Point 22 to 17, and Prospect beat Talent 23 to 7.

OSC AND HUSKIES READY FOR BATTLE

SEATTLE, March 6.—(AP)—Washington's somewhat chastened Huskies will face a threatening Oregon State college basketball team here tonight in the first of two games for the championship of the northern division of the Pacific coast conference.

At Pullman, Wash., the University of Oregon and Washington State will play the first of two games in which Oregon victories would send it into third place above the Cougars.

Cougar States Gill and his Oregon State team, last year's division champions, seeking both the title and revenge for two defeats by the Huskies this season, arrived last night from Corvallis.

Coach Edmundson of Washington had no forecasts to make. Before their eastern Washington and Idaho invasion, the Huskies had won 10 straight games with no losses, and appeared headed for the title without more ado.

One defeat by tall-end Idaho and two by the Washington State Cougars changed the picture and gave Oregon State its final crack at the title.

The games here and at Pullman will close the northern division schedule.

GRAYSON WALKS IN NEVERS' FOOTSTEPS

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Calif., March 6.—(AP)—Bobby Grayson continued to walk in the footsteps of Stanford's great Ernie Nevers today.

He is the new backfield coach for the Red football machine, vacated when Nevers resigned recently to become head coach at Lafayette university.

Grayson was admitted Stanford's greatest backfield star since Ernie Nevers, whom Glenn "Pop" Warner once described as the ace back of all time. Aside from a brief sojourn into professional football, basketball and baseball ranks, Nevers, like Grayson, stepped from the football team into the coaching staff.

"Other changes" in Coach Claude E. "Fay" Thornhill's staff will be announced next month. The board of athletic control said.

The board also revealed Robert "Bones" Hamilton, blocking back on the powerful Indian team that closed its three-year career in the Rose bowl New Year's day, did not apply for backfield job, as was generally believed.
