Partial Peace Effected

Efforts to obtain peace between the union and individual property owners bore fruit when an agreement between representatives of the Prudential company, owner of 45 large buildings in the city, and union officials was signed in the presence of Mayor LaGuardia.

The company is not affiliated with the realty group which has refused to negotiate with the union on the issue of the closed shop.

Strike moves were marked by comparative peace. Disorders decreased, although four men were arrested in the Bronx on a charge of damaging two apartment buildings.

The main strike, that of building workers called last Sunday by the building service employees union, progressed slowly, with strike leaders withholding their threats to "pull" elevator operators and other workers in the Grand Central zone, district of many of the city's tallest buildings.

No Troops Needed

From Albany came the disclosure that the state national guard had considered plans for possible emergency action in New York City, but Brigadier General Walter G. Robinson, head of the guard,

BRIEF HISTORY OF ROSEBURG GIVEN

Recorder Geddes Presents Interesting Facts at Rotary Meeting.

A brief history of Roseburg, coupled with interesting facts gathered from city records, was presented before the Roseburg Rotary club at its regular meeting yesterday by A. J. Geddes, city recorder.

"In 1852 there was a considerable immigration to Douglas county and the village of Roseburg, or Deer Creek as it was then called, began to assume somewhat larger proportions," Mr. Geddes said.

"In 1853," he continued, "a man by the name of Bradbury imported his first stock of general merchandise and opened the first regular store here. In 1855, the village of Deer Creek became Roseburg, being named for Aaron Rose, who was the first settler, and through whose donations of lands and money churches and schools were established and the city founded. During that year the village was the central point for the northern battalion, enlisted for the Indian war.

Early Rivalry Told

"About 1857 the U. S. land office, a two-story building, was erected at Winchester, the county seat. This building, the largest in the county, aroused the pride of Roseburg citizens and they outdid Winchester by erecting a three-story schoolhouse. These two buildings were the finest in southern Oregon at that time. In about 1859 Roseburg's attractions became so great that Winchester was not able to resist them and the principal buildings at Winchester, including the land office, were moved to Roseburg.

"The city was incorporated October 3, 1872, and until October 7, 1895, when the first mayor and council were elected, was governed by a board of trustees.

Early Day Officials

"The first board consisted of C. Gaddis, S. P. Sheridan, George Haynes, S. Hamilton, and William I. Friedlander. C. Gaddis was chairman. Other officers were E. Livingston, treasurer; Andrew Jones, recorder; L. C. Lane, attorney and L. C. Rodenberger, marshal.

"Others who served as chairman of the board of trustees during the following years were: S. Hamilton, 1873-74; C. Gaddis, 1874-75; George Haynes, 1877-79; J. C. Fullerton, 1879-81; W. G. Woodward, 1881-82; P. P. Hogan, 1882-83; W. F. Benjamin, 1883-84; J. C. Fullerton, 1884-85; H. C. Stanton, 1885-88; L. P. Lane, 1888-90; J. S. Fitzhugh, 1890-92; H. C. Stanton, 1892-94; John S. Shupe, 1894-95.

"The first mayor and council were elected in October, 1895. A. C. Marsters being chosen mayor and Robert Yates, David C. Clements, H. C. Stanton, David Moore, James Fletcher, William Perry, H. C. Slocum and F. H. Churchhill, councilmen. Other officers were F. W. Zigler, recorder; J. A. Perkins, treasurer, and J. B. Cannon, marshal.

"Mayors who have served the city of Roseburg are: A. C. Marsters, 1895-1900; William R. Willis, 1900-01; E. V. Hoover, 1902-09; F. W. Haynes, 1910-11; Joseph Mitchell, 1912-13; N. Rice, 1914-18; D. J. Stewart, 1919; W. S. Hamilton, 1920-22; N. Rice, 1923-24; George E. Houck, 1925-28; E. V. Hoover, 1929-30; J. E. McClintock, 1931-34; April.

"First" Recounted

"In 1872 when Roseburg was incorporated, the city had its offices in the jury room of the courthouse. The first city hall and jail was constructed on a corner of the present courthouse grounds during the year of 1873. The present city hall was built in the year 1892, the site costing \$1,900 and the building \$4,900.

"The first well that the city had dug was in 1878. It was a hole eight feet in diameter and 30 feet deep.

"The first fire department of which a record was made was in 1879 and during that year the city purchased a 100-pound fire bell at a cost of \$50.

"The city in 1882 leased a spring on the hill east of the city at a rental of \$110 per year, and constructed a reservoir there piping water to fire mains in the city for fire protection.

"No record has been found showing when the first water system was inaugurated, but we do find a record of the Roseburg Water Works company operating here in 1885 and 1886.

"Franchise was given by the city to L. L. Hurd in 1891 for installation of an electric light system, which appears to be the first in the city.

"The first sewer system was in 1891.

"The first paving of streets was started in 1908. This paving was on the main business streets, the property owner paying one-half the cost and the city the other half.

"The first newspaper in Roseburg was started in about the year 1850, being the Umpqua Gazette, a democratic paper. It was followed by the Ensign, a republican paper, in 1858. In 1870 the Plaindealer, a democratic paper, was inaugurated, but fell into the hands of the republicans in 1847.

"The first telephone franchise was granted to the Oregon Telephone and Telegraph company in 1891.

"Telegraph franchises were granted to the Postal Telegraph company in 1886 and to the Western Union in 1892.

"A franchise was given to W. F. Boardman company in 1911 for the first gas plant.

"There are various other items of interest in the later history of Roseburg, such as the state soldiers home, the U. S. veterans facility, etc., with which present residents are familiar."

ILES' STORE NOW IN NEW LOCATION

The task of moving stock and fixtures of the Storey Iles Drug store from the Umpqua hotel building to the Parrot building was completed today and the store is now open in the new location. The quarters vacated are to be included in a coffee shop to be opened soon by J. A. Harding, proprietor of the Umpqua hotel. The work of remodeling the rooms is already under way.

ADOREE NEVILLE, AVIATRIX, PASSES

RENO, Nev., March 6 —(AP)—Adoree Neville, noted stunt flier, died during the night from pneumonia following a brief illness. She was queen of the nation-wide air tour made in May, 1932, to promote interest in the Olympic games. She was married to David W. Pentz, of Los Angeles, in May, 1934, and divorced the following April.

\$100,000 FIRE HITS TOWN IN MONTANA

HAMILTON, Mont., March 5.—(AP)—Fire early today swept the business district of this western Montana town, leveling the Valley Mercantile building and damaging adjacent property and store stocks to the extent, owners estimated, of about \$100,000.

Firemen from Stevensville helped the Hamilton fire department battle several hours to bring the flames under control.

NO TRAGEDY WHEN SCHOOL BUS ROLLS

MONTROSE, Colo., March 6.—(AP)—A school bus rolled off a 75-foot cliff today, scattering 25 children over the hillside but none was seriously hurt.

Two small girls riding beside Driver Wesley Fraser were scratched and bruised.

The accident occurred seven miles west of here.

ENGLAND WARNS ITALY ON BOMBING

Italy flew low and dropped about 40 bombs.

Patients Killed

Three hospital ward tents, the operating and sterilization tents, and one truck were destroyed. Three patients were killed and several wounded.

Dr. Melley stated it was not true that three Kenya boys had been killed.

Melley stated that Red Cross flags were flying from all tents and a flagstaff and that a ground flag 40 feet square and bearing a large red cross lay in the center of the camp.

The report from the British minister stated that Melley said Italian planes had flown over the Red Cross unit on many occasions, not only at Quorom but when it was on its way there from Waldia.

"It is most obvious," said an authoritative source close to the government, "that the Italians knew what the unit was."

This source added that late in January the British embassy in Rome was instructed to tell the Italians that Melley's unit was proceeding from Desaye to Waldia and from there to Quorom.

OFFICER OF BRITISH RED CROSS REPORTED KILLED ADDIS ABABA, March 6 — A British Red Cross worker, Major G. A. Burkyne, was killed by a bomb dropped from an Italian plane, an Ethiopian government communiqué said today, while participating in an Ethiopian withdrawal back of the northern front.

Burkyne, 61 years old, a transport officer in the Ethiopian Red Cross organization, had been residing from Addis Ababa to Quorom, 30 miles south of Addis Ababa, with the forces of Ras Khabeda. A heavy Italian air bombardment was reported in that sector.

An unconfirmed report from Desaye said that another Italian airplane had bombed the headquarters of Crown Prince Asfa Wosan and that two Greeks had been killed.

A battle is developing in the mountains about Amba Alaji, the government announced, in its blanket denial of Italian claims of victory in the sector.

Ras Mulicheta, minister of war, with an army of imperial guardsmen, was reported to have proceeded north from Waldie, 60 miles south of the main northern lines.

Ethiopian officials asserted the

Italian claims of victory were issued with a view to impressing the league of nations in its negotiations either for peace or fresh sanctions.

The morale of the Ethiopian troops was described as excellent, despite Italian aerial bombardments.

Emperor Haile Selassie was believed to have arrived in the north to lead his forces in what some thought might be the start of a decisive battle.

Relief administration . . . and reflected the high type of service that has been rendered by this committee and its staff to the state of Oregon.

\$30 Monthly Maximum

Figures presented at recent sessions of the state committee indicated nearly 10,000 persons more than 70 years of age would receive benefits not to exceed \$30 a month.

The program for the aged and blind comes under the federal social security commission.

Of the \$747,500 quarterly for the aged, counties would pay \$196,875, the state \$196,875 and the federal government the remaining 50 per cent or \$353,750.

Funds to aid the blind would be provided by the state and the federal government on an equal basis.

The crippled children's service and the child welfare survey are under the children's bureau of the United States department of labor. The state and government's share for crippled children would approximate 50 per cent each. Under the proposed program for the five-months' child welfare survey, the state would pay \$300 and the government \$1,900.

The child welfare survey plan was designed to determine the best policies and methods for administration of a child welfare program "which will eliminate overlapping of jurisdiction of the various units now performing this

type of service," the governor said.

The state relief committee's social security plan was announced several weeks after the sales tax was defeated and came as a surprise to those who believed Oregon had forfeited its opportunity to obtain match money from the federal government.
