would be rather difficult since the immigration committee might find it impossible to determine whether Joan Blondell's figure balanced Marlene Dietrich's famous legs, or whether Greta Garbo's mysterious charm was offset by Carole Lombard's blonde beauty in the balance of trade. ### PRO-AMERICA CHAPTER NATIONAL ORGANIZATION OF REPUBLICAN WOMEN

Much interest is being shown in Douglas county regarding the re-organization of Douglas unit of Pro-America, national organization of republican women, which is headed here by Mrs. H. C. Waddell, chairman.

Pro-America was founded by Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt, Sr., and a group of Seattle women February 22, 1933, and incorporated August 23, 1934. The organization was founded for the purpose of educating women of the United States in the republican party. The purpose of the organization is to uphold the constitution of the United States, with its American traditions and ideals, and combat all destructive influences which will imperil the sacred heritage of liberty bequeathed to citizens of this country by their forefathers.

On March 22, 1935, before a group of Seattle women, Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt, Sr., dedicated Pro-America to the preservation of constitutional government with its guarantees of liberty and justice for all. The program includes special emphasis on education, which is the foundation of this organization. The program educates its members by the practical application of the knowledge gained through study and experience. Speakers are secured to talk at monthly meetings on topics such as legislative, judicial, social and economics.

An investigating committee works in this organization for the purpose of investigating all candidates appearing on ballots and to see that everyone is registered to vote in each county.
