B. P. W. C. NATIONAL BUSINESS WOMEN'S WEEK TO BE OBSERVED

March 15 to 21 will be celebrated by Business and Professional Women's clubs as National Business Women's week. At this time 1400 clubs in the federation will dramatize their value to the communities in which they are organized.

Four years ago a goal was set by the federation when it adopted the following ten-year objective: "During the next decade the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs, Inc. should fit itself to assume real leadership in thinking on economic problems and their social implications with a view toward helping in the establishment, through scientific methods, of conditions which assure to women, and to men as well, the fullest possible opportunity and reward for the development of whatever capacities they may possess."

As a step toward the goal this year the call has gone out for "women, men for effective democracy," which is also the theme of Business Women's week. Democracy is government of the people, by the people, and for the people so to make it effective all men and women qualified to vote must assume their responsibility in endeavoring to elect candidates to office who will make for efficient governments—city, state and national. Statistics show that only 50 per cent of the citizens who are entitled to vote do so.

Twenty-five per cent of the votes cast in every presidential election are first votes; votes cast by those who have reached voting age since the last national election. These voters must be encouraged to come forward and give their best efforts as citizens toward building an honest, efficient government which will mean security for all.

The national federation was organized in 1919, and it has a membership today of over 50,000 business and professional women in the United States, Hawaii and Alaska. It sponsored the organization of the International Federation of Business and Professional Women in 1930 which now has member clubs in 22 countries over the world which are uniting in one great common cause—to bring peace and understanding to all people.
