OPERATION LEAVES
MAN MINUS LUNG

PORTLAND, Ore., March 6.—(AP)—A delicate operation, believed the second successful one of its kind in the world, was successful when Dr. Ralph Matson and assistants removed the right lung of Joe Wolnowich of Portland.

Dr. Matson, who performed the operation yesterday at the county hospital, said the other successful operation for the removal of a right lung was performed in Boston.

Seven or eight successful removals of left lungs have been made. But thinness of the blood vessels on the right side and the presence of large veins close to the heart make the removal of the right lung more hazardous.

The lung was cancerous. Wolnowich still was in a critical condition, due to his weakened state prior to the operation.

THE DALLES, Ore., March 6.—(AP)—The United Spanish War veterans will hold their 1936 state convention here July 12 to 15, state department officers announced today.

A memorial service Sunday, July 12, will be the opening event. A grand ball at night will be Monday's feature, and the parade will be Tuesday night.

Some 500 Spanish War veterans were expected to attend.

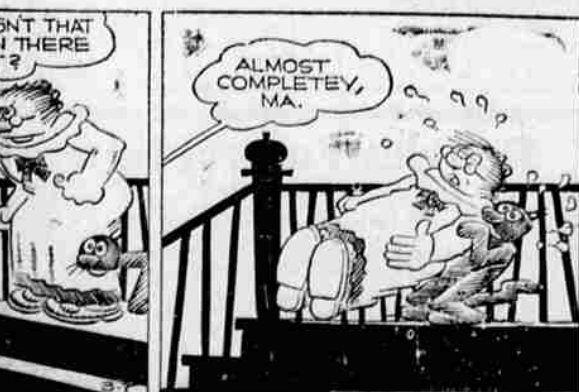

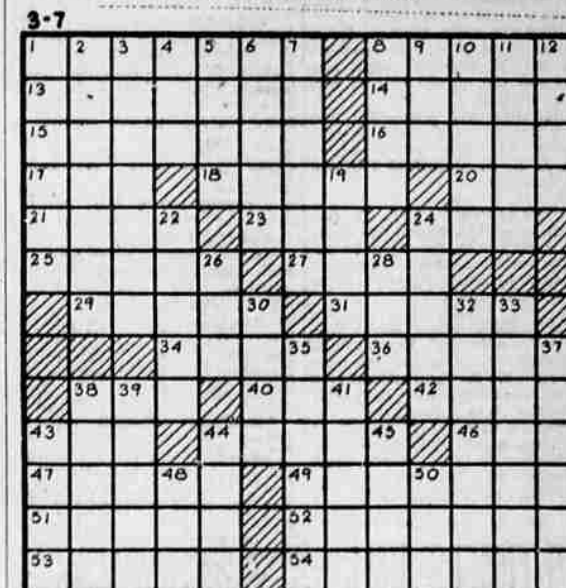
