

Washington U. Basketeers Win Northwest Title

OREGON STATERS DEFEATED, 39 TO 30

Wally Palmberg Hangs Up New Conference Record in Scores Made.

SEATTLE, March 7.—(AP)—The University of Washington stood firmly entrenched atop the northern division Pacific coast basketball ladder today as champions, while alongside was Wally Palmberg, sensational southpaw, record scorer of Oregon State.

The Huskies and Beavers, fighting before 10,000 fans last night, were tied eight times during the game, but Coach Edmundson's quintet, paced by Bishop, broke through Coach Gill's man-to-man defense for a 39 to 30 triumph.

The Huskies automatically qualified to meet the winner of the Stanford-Southern California play-off in the southern division for the Pacific coast championship next weekend, and the Pacific coast Olympic trials here March 26 and 27.

Palmberg's new northern division scoring record is 180 points, four better than that set by Bobby Galer of the University of Washington in 1934. Palmberg scored 19 points last night and if he chalks up 20 points in tonight's game, he can break 200 points.

The Huskies used only one substitute in the game—when Bob Egge was forced out on fouls. Oregon used four substitutes and changed players intermittently.

Cougars Beat U. of O.
At Pullman, Wash., Washington State college clinched third place in the northern division with an impressive 44 to 30 victory over the University of Oregon.

The Cougars opened early in last night's game with the offensive display which has made them the sensation of the closing conference weeks, and rolled up a 21 to 10 halftime lead. They were never headed.

The two teams will close their conference season at Pullman tonight.

McMINNVILLE, Ore., March 7.—(AP)—McMinnville high will meet Tillamook tonight for the right to represent district six in the state basketball tournament at Salem.

McMinnville won from Independence 39 to 22 and Tillamook defeated Monmouth 40 to 25 in the semi-finals last night.

CARNERA DISPOSES OF IZZY GASTANAGA

Referee Halts Slow Fight in 5th Round; Purses of Both Men Held Up.

NEW YORK, March 7.—(AP)—The latest flurry in showmen heavyweight stock found Primo Carnera today in possession of a technical knockout over Izzy Gastanaga, wild-swinging Spaniard, and the purses of both held up, pending the final outcome of charges that their bout was just a friendly proposition among business associates.

Their match lasted less than half the ten-round distance in Madison Square Garden last night, being halted after 46 seconds of the fifth round by Referee Arthur Donovan because of Gastanaga's damaged left eye.

A crowd that included 8,334 cash customers who contributed a "gate" of \$18,380, jeered the proceedings in general and Carnera in particular but Brig. Gen. John J. Heelan, chairman of the state athletic commission, declared afterward he was "perfectly satisfied with the honesty" of the performance.

The general said his decision to hold up the fighters' money, until completion of investigation of accusations that the rival managers actually were "business associates," was merely "precautionary," and to avoid any "black."

Carnera's victory was decisive, despite the sudden and accidental ending to a bout which developed no knockdowns and little excitement. Gastanaga suffered a jagged cut over his left eye late in the fourth round when he failed to duck a right uppercut. It bled profusely and treatment between rounds appeared to aggravate rather than alleviate the damage. The referee consequently acted quickly in the fifth round.

Carnera weighed 268½, Gastanaga 268½.

HITLER ABANDONS LOCARNO PACT AND GRABS RHINELAND

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"unpredictable consequences" for Europe.

A memorandum to foreign powers was incorporated in the reichstag speech.

It declared France had "replied to the friendly offers (extended) to again and again by Germany" and "Germany's assurance of friendship by violating the Rhine pact, and by signing a military alliance directed exclusively against Germany."

"Germany, therefore," the memorandum went on, "no longer considers herself bound to this now defunct pact."

The document then announced the reich, "in the interest of the primitive right of a nation to secure her own borders and to safeguard her possibilities of defense," was reclaiming "full unmitigated sovereignty of the reich in the demilitarized zone of the Rhineland."

Equality Gained
It concluded with Germany's proposals "for erection of a system of new European peace safeguards," the last of which said:

"Now that Germany's equality at last is finally achieved and full sovereignty over the whole reich territory is reestablished, the reich government regards the principal grounds for its withdrawal from the league of nations removed."

"It is ready to reenter the league in expectation that in due course, by amicable negotiation, the question of colonial equality as well as the question of separation of the league of nations covenant from the Versailles base shall be cleared up."

This pact, he shouted, with its danger to Europe of bolshevik "chaos," freed Germany from Locarno.

To begin his day of extraordinary action, Hitler told foreign diplomats of his intention to occupy the Rhineland in violation of both the Locarno and the Versailles treaty.

Creed Proclaimed
Standing on the rostrum of the Kroll Opera, at the very moment when some 2,000 troops crossed the historic Rhine and moved into old Cologne, Hitler cried:

"In this historic hour, when in western provinces our reich German troops are moving into their future garrison of peace, we all unite in two holy confessions."

"First, in a solemn oath to recede before no power and no force in reestablishing the honor of our people, and to succumb honorably to the heaviest privation, rather than ever capitulate before it."

"Second, in a determination now, more than ever, to help bring about understanding among peoples of Europe, especially among our western peoples and neighbors."

"Thus, after three years, I believe I can consider with today

the fight for German equality as concluded."

Before that, Hitler had told the foreign envoys the Rhineland reoccupation by several battalions of the "reichwehr" regular army—would be an unquestionable and desirable, a dramatic symbol that Germany at last is free of her bonds of "humiliation."

But with brass band music and anti-aircraft guns, the first detachment marched into Cologne, through narrow streets aflame with waving swastika flags and before a wildly cheering population.

Flirts With France
Leading up to his attack on the Franco-Russian pact, der fuhrer declared he had "again and again tried—unfortunately but too often in vain—to build a bridge of understanding reaching over to the French people."

He pleaded:

"Why shouldn't it be possible to break off the superstitious quarrels of centuries, that did not and could not bring a final decision to either of these two peoples, and to substitute for it consideration of higher common sense?"

"The German people are not interested in having France suffer, nor vice versa."

He did not, he said, "decline cooperation with Russia, but with the bolshevism that lays claim to ruling the world."

"I do not want," Hitler told his reichstag, "the horrors of communitarian international dictatorship and hate to descend upon the German people."

Soviet Power Feared

Again he warned the world of the "horror of this destructive revolutionary Asiatic conception of life," and said he "trembled" for Europe, should the "chaos of the bolshevik revolution prove successful."

Hitler quoted Russian army figures, said the soviet had 1,350,000 men under arms and a vast military reserve, tanks and air power, and declared "this gigantic army would completely upset Europe's balance of power, were it allowed."

He disclaimed "territorial claims in Europe" and pledged his claims to do everything that will bring to realization the high ideals of peaceful cooperation.

He concluded with a plea that Germany "strengthen me in my faith" and "to support me in my struggle for real peace" at the elections this month.

Der fuhrer was in campaign form. Repeatedly his words brought the reichstag to its feet. When he announced the reoccupation of the Rhineland, his overhauls heaved rose and stood shouting and beating their hands together for fully five minutes.

Continually, the members shouted "suir richtig" (quite right).

France Stirred
A shocked Europe greeted Hitler's move with these acts:

(France) decided to submit the Locarno reoccupation to the league of nations council. Premier Sarraut called the French "war council" into session and army officials moved to cancel all military leaves.

(Italy) informed first of the German move, was reported unwilling to put into effect her guarantees under Locarno. British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden conferred swiftly with French and Italian ambassadors; the Belgian cabinet was called into Monday session.

(Geneva) saw Hitler's thrust as creating a grave crisis likely to dwarf the Italo-Ethiopian issue.)

LOCAL CHAMBER TO URGE HIGHWAY JOB

A delegation from the Roseburg chamber of commerce will meet with the state highway commission next week to urge work on the Roseburg-Kelley's Korner section of the Pacific highway. The highway commission, it is reported, is preparing to build the contemplated overhead crossing at Greens in the near future and has allotted \$40,000 for this piece of work. The chamber of commerce is urging that the grading and surfacing project between Roseburg and Kelley's Korner be started during the coming summer.

LABOR SHORTAGE STAYS WPA WORK

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100 men to work on the Roseburg airport, for which approval of the runway grading and surfacing project is expected.

It had been anticipated the airport job would be handled by men from the Roosevelt Transient camp, but this camp has been ordered closed March 20, and the men will not be available.

The chief handicap, Mr. Fies states, is the rule permitting employment only of men who were on relief between May 1 and November 1 of last year, coupled with the fact that the national reemployment service is required to give employment, where possible, to men of the same certification.

Rule Changes Sought
Oregon relief agencies have been endeavoring for considerable time to secure a change in the federal ruling, to permit the employment of laborers certified for relief after November 1, pointing out that seasonal labor kept many of the best types of workers off the relief rolls during the months specified. So far, however, the appeals for a change in the ruling have been unavailing.

Could the services of these men be secured it would be possible, Mr. Fies states, to keep the WPA projects up to schedule and start the new work which has been approved and for which allocations have been made. Otherwise, new projects will have to wait until work now under way is completed.

Projects—particularly affected are those requiring services of skilled carpenters. During the past few weeks the national reemployment office has placed a number of carpenters on contract work, removing them from the WPA rolls.

Other Work Attracts
Logging and farm work are absorbing many of the best men on the WPA roster. Fies reports, and the crews now working include a great many elderly or partially incapacitated men, who, although certified as employable, are not able to do the work of younger and more physically capable men.

Despite a reduction in the size of the crew now employed at the Roseburg airport, Mr. Fies expects to complete the culvert project by May 1. The crew of 29 men has been reduced to 17 in number. The men are engaged in excavating for a concrete culvert 300 feet in length to take care of water in a stream which bisects the field. The earth and rock fill to provide a runway 150 feet in width. The runway and surfacing project is expected to provide for a runway 3,850 in length.

The culvert is to be built in 50-foot units, through the use of moveable forms. The excavation for the first unit is nearing completion and pouring of concrete is expected to start Thursday of next week.

The allotment of \$8,000 is expected to be sufficient for the job, Mr. Fies states, reporting also that of the eight projects already completed only one exceeded the allotment.

Suddenly gunshots rang out and three of the invaders dropped—two of them dead.

The officers worried through the tangle of blockading cars and arrived just after the shooting. The invaders scattered and fled.

The officers made no immediate arrests. It was not at once determined who did the shooting.

Last night the company management reported increased tension between the pickets and the workers, and asked for officers this morning. The International Ship and Paper Workers' union had jurisdiction over the camp, but the Sawmill and Timber Workers' union has contended for about eight months that it should have jurisdiction.

Clubs Also Used
Alex Derkacht, one of the workers at the logging company, was struck in the face with a shotgun blast as he emerged from his bunkhouse.

Three men knocked Camp Foreman C. McLeod down and beat him over the head. Albert Anderson was hit over the head with a club as he lay in his bunk.

The pickets overturned one car and smashed windows on several others in the camp.

Recently the unions tentatively agreed that the sawmill and timber workers' union would be given jurisdiction over the camp, which logs for the Crown Willamette Pulp and Paper mills. However, the workers at the camp refused to join the Seaside chapter of the Timber Workers' union, and asked for their own local. When this was denied, negotiations broke off.

Grand Jury to Probe
District Attorney Willis West said he would call the county grand jury Monday to make a complete probe of the bloody battle.

T. E. Patterson, one of the camp men, was battered with rocks and the back of his head was minced by the vicious stamp of boot calks.

The fleeing pickets overturned an automobile containing four workers, and beat them up. A score or more were hurt, and the bunkhouses were reduced to a shambles. The casualty list may run even higher, police said, when it is learned how many of the pickets were injured.

STATE POLICE ORDERED TO SCENE OF UNION STRIKE
SALEM, March 7.—Governor

Martin took cognizance of the picket "warfare" in Clatsop county today when he directed Superintendent Charles P. Pray of the state police to send a force of men to the scene at once. Captain Wayne Gurdane of Portland and a squad of men were dispatched immediately.

Superintendent Pray will also leave for Clatsop county as soon as a report is received from Gurdane. The woods-camp, where two men were killed and another wounded in the early morning fight today, was declared to be nine miles southeast of Astoria.

Pray stated that the local police were already at the camp and the force en route will be augmented if necessary. Governor Martin said the picket battle was between two unions in which the matter of jurisdiction was involved.

Insults Alleged

The governor released the following statement on the situation as given him by J. R. From, woods-boss of the Crown Willamette Paper company, where the reported riot occurred:

"Yesterday morning at the camp in Clatsop county, pickets of the timber workers' union called our boys vile names as they went into our camp. Our boys are members of the International Brotherhood of Pulp and Sulphite workers."

"This insult was repeated last evening as our men came out of camp. A few of our boys got out of their cars and went back and chased the pickets off without injury to the pickets. Last evening, Ray Gillespie, president of the Seaside local timber workers' union, called our superintendent by telephone and informed him that the boys had driven the pickets off the job and threatened that he would have enough pickets on hand this morning to see that the place was properly picketed."

Assault Recited
"This morning at 6:15, one hundred and fifty timber workers were out there. Ordinarily we do not operate on Saturday, but the boys drove in—about 35 of them—to do a little repair work. The pickets stoned the cars and some of our boys got cut up pretty badly from the glass, but they managed to get through the mob and went into camp. The first thing they knew these timber workers converged on them from all angles. They were armed with gaspicks, pick handles, sledges and crow-bars, anything they could lay their hands on."

"Our men were unprepared for any such violence and were unable to properly defend themselves. The timber workers broke the windows in the houses of the camp occupied by the women and children. They also tore down the bunkhouse where men were sleeping. Some of our boys were still in bed as they did not expect to work today. The

timber workers beat some of them up pretty badly and knocked down a few of them and then the shooting started.

"It was an unprovoked attack by the timber workers. The attack was made on private property about a half mile from the public highway. The timber workers also cut telephone lines. Jackson, our superintendent, got away and reported from Seaside."

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
