FORD V-8'S LEAD IN MOTOR SALES

More motorists bought Ford V-8's in 1935 than any other car.

This information is according to official figures published in the Automotive Daily News, daily publication of the automobile industry.

Proof of the public's confidence in the V-8 car is revealed by the following facts: Sales of Ford V-8 units in the United States totaled 1,965,992 as compared with 677,179 units in 1934, representing the astonishing gain of more than 57.2 per cent!

Ford V-8 sales in the United States were approximately 31.1 per cent of sales by the entire motor car industry, giving Ford a wide lead for the year.

Correspondingly, the world record of Ford V-8 unit sales showed a large increase. In 1935 world sales totaled 1,311,927 units, a gain of 51.6 per cent or 446,826 units over 1934's production number, 865,101.

Ford V-8 was so overwhelming the favorite in 1935 that its total passenger car sale exceeds by more than 200,000 the sum of the total sales of seven cars in the first ten, as computed from listings in the Automotive Daily News. It is expected that the present year, with a production schedule calling for 1,000,000 cars a month, will surpass 1935.

YONCALLA SCHOOL BUDGET INCREASED

YONCALLA, March 10.—The directors of the high school district No. 9 met jointly with the budget committee on Friday night, March 6, to work out the annual budget. The total expenditures for the ensuing year has been estimated at \$14,176, which is \$1,000 above that of the present year. The increase is due to the installation of courses in home economics and manual training.

April 3rd has been set as the time for voting and there will be

two issues to be voted upon. First, whether or not to exceed the six per cent limitation and second, the adoption of the budget.

At the last meeting, Feb. 7, A. R. Marsh was reelected principal for the coming year, but Miss Miller and Mr. Hunter resigned some time ago, and their places will not be filled until after the budget meeting on April 3rd.

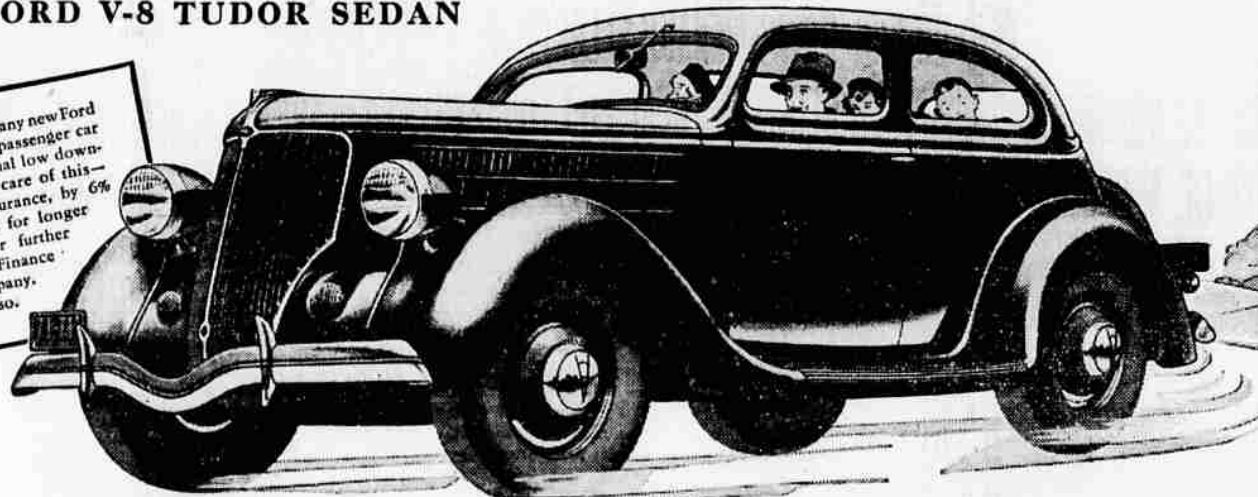
