YOUTH CONFESSES IN TRIPLE MURDER

DORCHESTER, N. B., March 11.—(AP)—Arthur Bannister, 19 years old, was convicted by a jury today of the "doll baby murder." Bannister was the first of three defendants to go on trial for the murder of Philip Lake, a settler at Pacific Junction.

Lake, his common-law wife, and their infant son were killed in order, the prosecution contended, that Bannister's mother might have the Lakes' baby daughter. The crown contended that previous to the mass killings of the Lake family, Mrs. Bannister had displayed a baby doll in an effort to make friends think she had a baby.

BOY GASHED AFTER FALL FROM TRACTOR

Jimmy Ritzman, seven-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Ritzman, suffered severe head injuries late yesterday afternoon when he fell from a tractor and was struck by a heavily weighted disc cultivator. One of the blades inflicted deep gashes on his face. The accident occurred at the Ritzman farm west of town. The injured lad was rushed immediately to Mercy hospital.

EK WALL ENGAGES IN EPITHET DUEL

Oregon's Congressman and Zioncheck Start Fuss Over Communism.

WASHINGTON, March 11.—(AP)—The house was thrown into an uproar today when the epithets "fool" and "jackass" were exchanged by two representatives. Representative Zioncheck (D., Wash.) told the house he would not object to Representative Ekwall (R., Ore.) discussing communism and free speech "if he wants to make a fool of himself."

"If anybody has made a bigger jackass of himself this session than the gentleman from Washington, I don't know who it is," Ekwall retorted.

Representative O'Connor (D., N. Y.) demanded that the "word" be taken down, a preliminary parliamentary move to determine whether they should be expunged from the record.

"Take 'em down," Ekwall said. Zioncheck, O'Connor, Blanton (D., Tex.) and others all tried to talk at the same time while Speaker Byrnes rapped for order.

Representative Snow (R., N. Y.), the republican leader, stilled the furor by forcing a quorum call. Pierce started fuss. Representative Pierce (D., Ore.) told the house he favored free speech "for radicals and reactionaries as well."

Pierce recently defended on the floor the right of Earl C. Browder, secretary general of the communist party to make a radio address. Pierce's position was assailed by Ekwall. Pierce told the house the political campaign in the offing "underlies the attack on my plea for freedom of speech."

Pierce said his speech defending Browder's speech was described in an Oregon newspaper as his favoring free speech for radicals. "I am not only for free speech for radicals but for reactionaries as well," said Pierce. "I regard communism as unthinkable but I believe it better communism should take the air than be forced into underground passages."

Ekwall said Pierce had not answered his (Ekwall's) attack on communism. He said Pierce too, was up for re-election and was "inconsistent" in his views.

Ekwall said he did not want to return to congress if it was necessary for him to concede to communists or their activities.

A unique appeal came yesterday from a distraught mother. It seemed that the small daughter of the household was developing symptoms of the measles, but the mother was having much difficulty in keeping the child in bed. The Storyland narrator addressed the child, telling her the importance of keeping in bed and keeping warm, and the mother has reported no further difficulties.

AGED MINISTER IS VICTIM OF MURDER

TUSCALOOSA, Ala., March 11.—(AP)—The body of the Rev. John Pate, 70-year-old rural Baptist minister, was found today after an all-night search, and officers immediately arrested two men on charges of murder.

The body was discovered in a shallow grave near here. Sheriff Postus Chamberlain said one of the men, held under the name of Edgar Skelton, 25, confessed he and a man listed as James Franklin had slain the minister Sunday in a robbery attempt.
