HEARST OPPOSES TELEGRAM EXPOSE

WASHINGTON, March 12.—(AP)—William Randolph Hearst filed in the supreme court of the District of Columbia today a petition seeking to prevent the Western Union Telegraph company from delivering a copy of a telegram to the senate lobby committee.

Chief Justice Alfred A. Wheat, who yesterday enjoined the telegraph company from turning over to the committee telegrams sent and received by the Chicago law firm of Winston, Strawn and Shaw, refused to sign an immediate restraining order on the Hearst request. He said he preferred to hear the case on its merits. Wheat said the Hearst case differed from the Strawn firm case in that Hearst named one specific telegram. The Strawn firm won a blanket injunction against delivering all telegrams, over a period of months.

Elisha Hanson, attorney for Hearst, explained he would have Western Union file an answer in the court so the case could be heard on its merits as soon as possible.

SPUR TO EXTEND TO FORD SAWMILL

Work has been started in grading an extension of the Southern Pacific company spur track in North Roseburg to the Ford sawmill, located on the Roseburg-Dixonville road in the northeast section of town. It is expected that the mill will be put in operation in the near future.

The roadbed for the spur track is being graded and materials are being hauled preparatory to the work of extending the tracks. The building for the Ford mill was erected several years ago, but a slump in the lumber market caused the owners to postpone operations. Work was started several weeks ago to put the building in readiness for work, and machinery, which has been in storage here, is now being installed. It is expected that operations will be started by late spring.

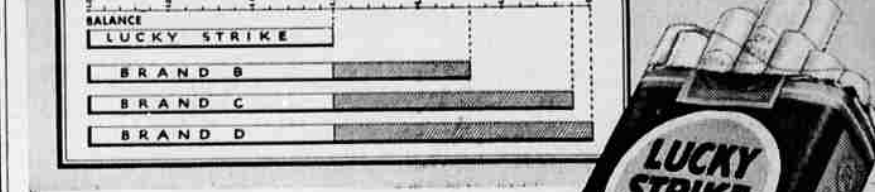
