PRESIDENT PLANS WATERWAYS PACT

WASHINGTON, March 13.—(AP)—President Roosevelt reiterated today he would seek a new treaty with Canada for development of the St. Lawrence waterways, but emphasized he did not expect to submit a pact to this session of the senate.

He set no time for reopening negotiations with Canada, but in a letter this week to Senator Pittman (D., Nev.), he expressed confidence the relations between Canada and the United States would make such a treaty possible whenever it was undertaken.

MILWAUKIE, Ore., March 13. (AP)—William Simonton, manager of the Ladd Estate company, was convicted in justice court here of destroying game fish by draining duck lake, which adjoins Lake Oswego. He was fined \$150.

The state charged that thousands of fish died in the mud. The lake is drained annually, but fish usually are dipped out, state game officers said.

WOOL OFFERINGS IN NORTHWEST SCANT

PORTLAND, Ore., March 13.—(AP)—The E. J. Burke & Co. of Portland reported the purchase of 30,000 pounds of wool in the Lakeview area today. The price was not revealed, but market observers believed it was around 28 1/2 cents a pound.

A survey indicated wool offerings in the Pacific northwest have been scant. A few small sales of Willamette valley wool on a nominal basis around 25 cents for coarse or blend and 30 cents for medium were reported.

Goat shearing will start in a few weeks at Willamette valley points, the Portland Hide & Wool company reported, predicting a slightly smaller clip than a year ago when around 350,000 pounds were shorn.
