**6,000 IN BUILDING
STRIKE TO RETURN**

NEW YORK, March 13.—(AP)—Six thousand striking building service workers will return to their jobs tomorrow in buildings owned by members of the Association of Metropolitan Owners, under the arbitration agreement made with the union, it was announced today. The association members con-

trol some 600 buildings. Hurwitz said it was understood each worker would get his job back and "replacement workers" who have taken their places since the walkout began March 1 would be dismissed.

The announcement followed a conference in which arbitration was based on Mayor Laguardia's plans for settlement of the strike. A request was sent jointly by the union and the association to Ferdinand S. Silcox, chief United States forester, to act as arbitrator.

**RETURN OF TWO IN
TURKEY DEAL ASKED**

SALEM, March 13.—(AP)—Governor Martin today requested the return to Oregon of A. Michell and C. J. Molinari, under arrest in San Francisco. The requisition was issued on Governor Merriman.

The two men are wanted in Jackson county on a charge of larceny by embezzlement. The information alleges the two had sold turkeys to the amount of \$1,500 on commission, but after collecting the sum failed to return the balance of the money. They were reported as fighting extradition.

**'ALKY' RING HUNTED
FOR TAX DODGING**

LOS ANGELES, March 12.—(AP)—Federal agents along the Pacific coast today hunted 40 persons, reported secretly indicted in connection with a \$5,000,000 alcohol smuggling ring.

Ten men named in the indictments were under arrest. The ring, allegedly shipping large quantities of contraband alcohol from Mexico for two years, was accused of defrauding the government of \$1,000,000 in taxes.

**FLOOD DEATH TOLL
REACHES EIGHTEEN**

**Rising Streams Cover New
Areas, Cripple Traffic
and Communication.**

By the Associated Press. With 18 known dead, suffering in the various flood-ravaged sections of the northeastern United States and Canada was intensified today by increased cold while rising waters inundated new areas and crippled traffic and communication.

Officials fixed the death toll with the finding of four bodies in a home in Kingston, Pa., across the Susquehanna river from Wilkes Barre.

Need for relief is acute in the Wilkes Barre zone and the coast guard ordered held in readiness to move there if needed, seven amphibian planes and ten powered surf boats with food and medical supplies.

New devastation was wrought by New England rivers, especially the Merrimack in New Hampshire and the Connecticut in Connecticut. In New Jersey residents along the Passaic river were warned by officials to be ready to abandon their homes if the rise continues.

**LEWIS AND McAVOY
TO BATTLE TONIGHT**

NEW YORK, March 12.—(AP)—John Henry Lewis, light heavyweight champion of the world, defends his crown against Jack McAvoy of England tonight.

McAvoy, an English fighter who can fight, holds the British middle and light heavyweight titles. He will sail for England next week to meet Jack Peterson for the British heavyweight title April 23. If successful in both bouts, he will return to this country seeking a joust with Jim Braddock.

McAvoy ruled a 9 to 10 choice in the betting last night but the odds were expected to shorten before ring time. Lewis has been training under the expert guidance of Jack Blackburn, trainer of Joe Louis.

night with North Bend high school while Marshfield plays Myrtle Point. The winners play Saturday night for the district championship and the right to enter the state tournament at Salem.

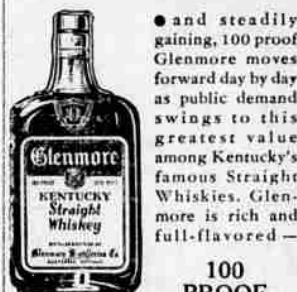
**LAURELWOOD HOME
