COPCO PAYS FIRST TAX INSTALLMENT

The California Oregon Power company paid its first quarter tax bill to Douglas county last week amounting to \$14,800.48. This is one of the largest tax payments received by the tax collection department of the sheriff's office. The total property tax to be paid by Copco to Douglas county this year amounts to \$59,201.51. This sum covers only the state, county, city, school and other district property taxes levied against Copco in Douglas county, but does not include other forms of state and federal taxes.

The total of property taxes alone to be paid by the California Oregon Power company in the state of Oregon this year will amount to \$354,639.39, according to local officials.

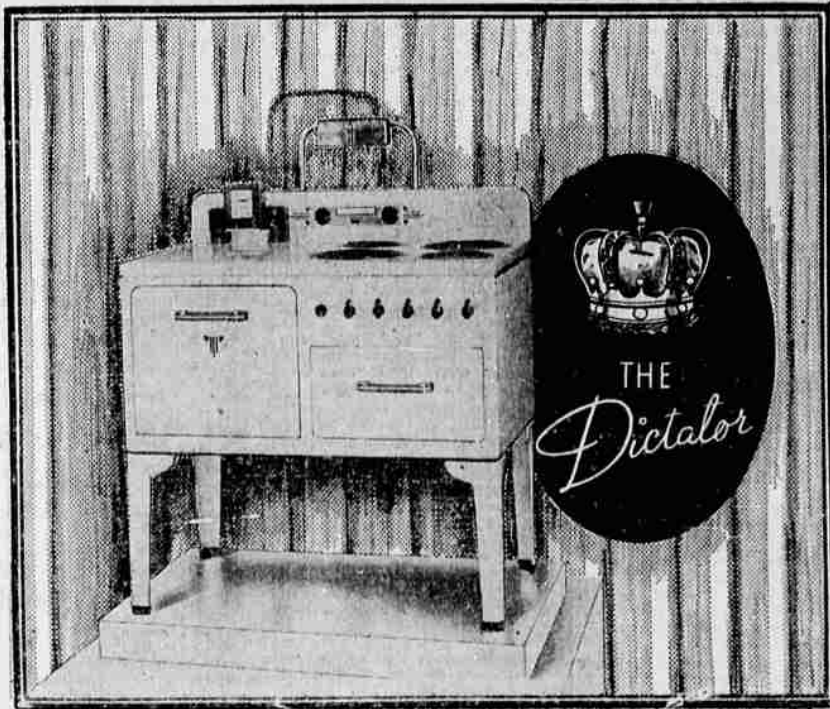
