LOBBY QUIZ HEARS FROM R. E. SMITH

Investors' Conference Head Examined as to Funds He Got From Utilities.

WASHINGTON, March 16—(AP)—Testimony that he had entertained many members of congress and shared a house with six of them while working for certain legislation was given to the senate lobby committee today by Robert E. Smith, chairman of the national conference of investors.

Referring to representatives as "the boys," Smith said that western power companies contributed the bulk of \$25,177 contributed to his National Security Holders association from January 1, 1935, to September 30, 1935. He listed \$25,178 of this as going for his own salary and expenses.

The witness insisted most of his discussions with members of congress concerned reclamation projects. He recalled finding no telegrams in his files concerning the Wheeler-Rayburn public utility holding company bill.

His genial manner vanished momentarily when Senator Schwellenbach (D., Wash.), charged he had practiced deception by asking investors to join his association at \$1 apiece without telling them railroad, power companies and other large interests had put up \$27,000 for it in 1934.

"I object to the word deception," Smith shouted.

"Did you ever tell any one where the big money was coming from? Did you ever tell any of the fifty congressmen you entertained, or anyone else, where the money for your organization came from?" Schwellenbach demanded.

"No," Smith testified he lived in one residence last summer with Representative

Hondo, California, where Mrs. Redfield had spent the winter with Mr. and Mrs. Dewey.

"We divided the expenses," he said.

Smith acknowledged sending a telegram to the president of the Washington Water Power company, Spokane, Wash., in May, 1935, which said the new deal in general and brain trusters in particular had been dealt a severe blow by supreme court decisions which would have a healthful effect on future legislation.

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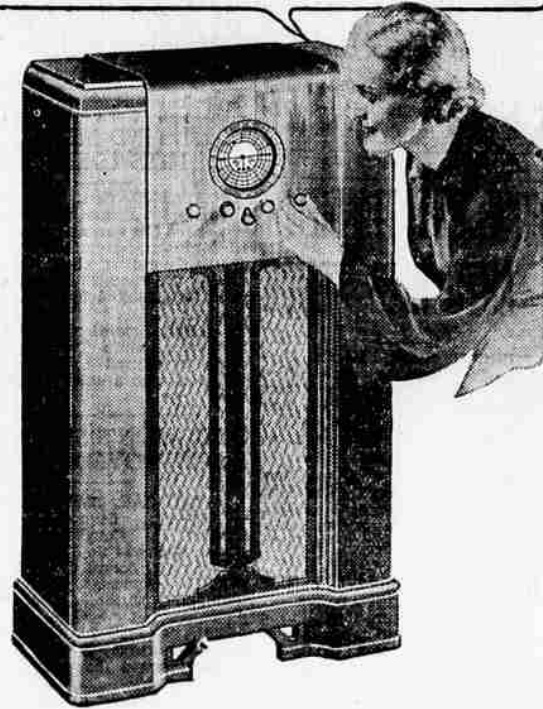
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
