erson's birthday.

Fees Are Ex-Donors. In 1932, many of the donors gave also came from persons who are now opposed to the administration.

Pierre S. Du Pont contributed \$12,500 and John W. Davis \$500. Later on, the democrats had contributions of \$25,000 from William Randolph Hearst, now bitterly opposed to the administration; \$25,000 from John J. Raskob, and \$2,500 from Bainbridge Colby.

Predicts Defeat. Other developments in the political picture included a prediction by Governor James M. Curley, of Massachusetts that President Roosevelt will be reelected no matter who the republican nominee is. Curley said that if Governor Alf M. Landon of Kansas is nominated "he will be defeated by as big a majority as was piled up over Hoover in 1931."

Six candidates for the London pledge state in California filed at 11 a. m. to qualify for the May 5 primary. The London leaders said the entire slate of 44 would be ready to file by Saturday.

Borah Draws Reply. From Oklahoma City came a statement assailing Senator Borah, avowed candidate for the republican presidential nomination, as a result of his accusation that the "Standard Oil company" was involved in Oklahoma republican politics.

Wirt Franklin, former president of the Independent Petroleum association of America, said that in the senate, Borah "either walked out or voted in favor of the four or five large oil companies engaged in importing oil."

Franklin said that Borah voted against a tariff on oil in 1930. Large oil companies, Franklin added, had been importing oil to the disadvantage of independents.

Western headquarters of the republican national committee announced that Mrs. Katharine Kennedy Brown had been named director of women's work in the division. Harrison E. Spangler, western director, said the appointment inaugurates a drive to line up women in the region.

ened the basis of Locarno.

"The Locarno agreement was built on the principle of solidarity of western powers," he continued. "It is regrettable that the political basis on which the treaty rested should have been so undermined. Sanctions are being applied against Italy at a moment when Italy is needed as a guarantor of the security of western Europe."

The fascist said Italy recognized there had been a breach by Germany but bluntly warned the council it could not expect any help from Italy as a guarantor of the Locarno pact until Italy's "rights" in the Italo-Ethiopian dispute have been recognized and "injustices" removed.

He appealed for a united Europe and said "cooperation with Germany as a great power is necessary for peace."

Eden Replies Softly

His bitter complaint against sanctions was followed by a temperate and conciliatory speech by Anthony Eden, in which the British foreign secretary pleaded for some handling of the Italo-Ethiopian question and pledged Britain's full support in building a new peace structure for Europe.

It was announced that Spain would support the Franco-Belgian resolution formally indicting Germany as a violator of the treaty.

Dr. Joseph Beck, foreign minister of Poland, asserted Poland was not concerned with the Franco-Soviet pact but declared, "we wish to maintain friendly and durable relations with our eastern neighbor (Russia)."
