PRUNE THIRP AGAIN FOUGHT IN DOUGLAS

Investigations on the control of prune thrip are being carried on in Douglas county again this year in cooperation with the experiment station of the Oregon State college. S. C. Jones, assistant entomologist of the experiment station, spent the greater portion of the past week checking thrip emergence in orchards of the county and found that the thrip were emerging ten days to two weeks earlier than last season.

The first control sprays were applied in the G. N. Riddle orchards Friday and Saturday of last week. Lime sulfur three gallons to the hundred with a pint of nicotine added and dormant oil emulsion two gallons to the hundred and a pint of nicotine added last year gave the best control of all the spray combinations used in the test plots.

Timing of the sprays is most important for control of the prune thrips, according to J. Roland Parker, county agent. "The first application should be made at the green tip stage of the bud development or in other words when the buds are just beginning to open and show a green tip. The second application is made when the blossoms first begin to show white and before blossom opens up."

The only work being done on the control of the adult thrip this year by the experiment station is being carried on in Douglas county. The county provided \$350 to assist in carrying on the work, as the severe injury and loss of the prune crop in many orchards during the past two or three years is believed to be due to thrip.

Prune growers having orchards where thrip injury was prevalent last year and desiring to spray for control measures should make the first applications the first of this week. Either lime sulfur nicotine or oil nicotine should be used for control.

gents to and from their hillside homes to the ferry boats must be exceptionally rugged and safe.

According to C. D. Thomas, proprietor of the Sausalito taxi service, ninety per cent of the driving is in first or second gear. "When you stop to think that ninety per cent—almost all—of our driving is first or second gear you will realize that we must have transmissions that can 'take it,'" he said.

"Another important factor in our taxi service—one which we must give much consideration—is power. Some of the Sausalito hills are tough nuts to crack, even with a run at them, and when you have to stop in the middle of one to let out a passenger, it takes a car with a tremendous amount of zip to start off again. These 1936 Ford V-8's generate more power in less time than any car we have ever used in the Sausalito cab service."
