DAVID LAMSON CASE IS GIVEN TO JURY

SAN JOSE, Calif., March 20.—(AP)—The fate of David A. Lamson, charged with slaying his wife, was placed in the jury's hands at 12:12 p. m. today.

Lamson, who twice before had watched the jury file from the room, sat like a statue, the knuckles of his hands showing white as he gripped the arms of his chair.

The defense in its closing argument pleaded: "The defendant has suffered enough. Let him go home and raise his young daughter."

"Let him go home?" Prosecutor A. P. Landay asked in a dramatic closing argument.

"Is that the principle of justice by which we are governed? Then we may as well abandon our penitentiaries and let them all go home."

"The real issue is shall justice prevail? Is cold-blooded murder to go unpunished? Your verdict, ladies and gentlemen, will be the answer."

DRY LEADER KILLED IN WRECK OF AUTO

SEDALIA, Mo., March 20.—(AP)—Henry P. Faris, former banker of Clinton, Mo., and once a prohibition candidate for president of the United States, was killed this afternoon when his automobile crashed into a bridge near Deepwater, Mo.

Faris was alone in the car.

BRENNAN HELD FOR SHOOTING OF LEES

ONTARIO, Ore., March 20.—(AP)—Pat Brennan of Ontario, charged with assault with intent to kill in connection with an alleged attack on William Lees Sr., was bound over to the Malheur county grand jury without bond by Justice of the Peace Thomas Jones following a preliminary hearing in justice court today.

If Lees recovers sufficiently from his injuries within the next 10 days or two weeks as to put him out of danger, then the matter of a bond for Brennan will be considered, District Attorney M. A. Biggs said.

The defense placed no witnesses on the stand so that the exact cause of the quarrel that resulted in the shooting of Lees in a hotel lobby several days ago was not revealed. It is rumored that Lees and Brennan quarreled over a patent.

BYRON G. CARNEY OUT FOR CONGRESS

SALEM, March 20.—(AP)—Byron G. Carney, member of the state senate, filed his petition for the democratic nomination for congress from the first district. Carney's residence was given as Milwaukie.

Carney's petition will require the signatures of 1,000 voters before his declaration becomes legal. No slogan or statement accompanied the preliminary petition.

WRECK VICTIM IS SLIGHTLY BETTER

YAKIMA, March 20.—(AP)—Mrs. Claude Harris of Milton, Ore., whose skull was fractured in an automobile accident near Sunnyside on Sunday, is reported today to be showing signs of regaining consciousness but progress is slow. Her general condition is not changed much since she was first brought to the hospital here but physicians are hopeful of her complete recovery.

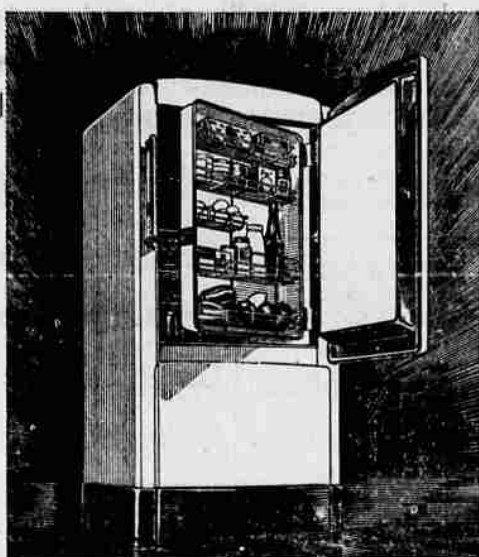
