

TIPPLERS IN PUBLIC MAY FACE TROUBLE

City Attorney of Portland Prepares Ordinance to Curb Hootch User.

PORTLAND, March 20.—(AP)—The football fan who goes to the big game with a bottle on his hip may run into a lot of trouble next fall if City Attorney Frank Grant has his way.

Grant drafted a proposed ordinance which would prohibit drinking at games or in other public places, or appearing at such places intoxicated.

Members of the city council refused to accede to the proposal of the Oregon food and beverage dispensers that a penalty be imposed on minors who misrepresent their age to buy liquor.

The association charged yesterday that Circuit Judge C. H. Gilbert had used an attempt to curtail the sale of beer to minors in a political gesture for himself.

F. H. Stas, secretary-treasurer, at a meeting called by Judge Gilbert to discuss the problem, presented a resolution blaming the jurist for the rejection of the proposed ordinance which would penalize minors.

Judge Gilbert replied that he would continue to try to devise the best plan for protecting minors even without the assistance of the association.

Is Townsend Plan Losing Force?



In view of congress' recent vote to investigate financial operations of the national Townsend organization, a sample of public opinion on the movement, as expressed by several representative voters, throws an interesting light on the issue. Opinion generally is divided between those who ardently champion the plan, regarding it as their possible financial salvation, and those who consider it wildly impractical and impossible to finance. While many observers concede that the Townsends will play some part in the outcome of the national elections this year, some are of the opinion that the pending congressional investigation will signal the decline of the movement's power. Congressman C. Jasper Bell, Missouri Democrat, is chairman of the house committee which will investigate the Townsend organization's financial activities.

FACULTY MEMBERS HAVE TO QUIT AT 70

SEATTLE, March 20.—(AP)—Regents of the University of Washington have ordered mandatory retirement of University of Washington faculty members to half time service, or less, at the age of 70. Between the ages of 65 and 69 a faculty member may be retired to half time service, or less, upon request or upon recommendation of the university president.

THE DALLES, Ore., March 20.—(AP)—Crime wave? Not in Wasco county. The county jail is empty for the first time in 12 years. The last prisoner, C. K. Burton, went to the state prison to serve a term of a year on a check charge.

U. S. LAMB OUTPUT WILL BE LARGER

PORTLAND, March 19.—(AP)—C. J. Borum, statistician of the United States department of agriculture, said today that in spite of some unfavorable factors in the early spring, lamb crops in principal areas this year will run about six per cent above that of 1935.

The early crop is designated as lambs usually marketed before July 1.

The condition of the crop at March 1 was on the average somewhat below that of 1935, said Borum.

Except in California, Arizona and Texas, he said weather conditions were less favorable this year, although supplies of feed stuffs were more abundant. Green feed has been late in starting, however. The cold weather in January and February brought abnormal losses.

Oregon Output Smaller

Reviewing conditions in various states, Borum said of Oregon: "Weather in February was rather severe in eastern Oregon and snowfall was heavy throughout the state. Conditions west of the Cascades were more favorable than east. Losses of early lambs were above average and the condition of lambs on March 1 was below average. Marketings before July 1 may be 10 per cent smaller this year than last."

The California lamb crop was estimated at 10-15 per cent above last year and possibly a record-breaker. Ewes were in good condition. Losses of early lambs in Washington were large because of the cold weather and little new grass was available. Little green feed was available by March 1.

In Idaho death losses were less than expected and early lambs of March 1 were in fair condition. Range prospects were good. Conditions were good in Texas and a large crop increase was in prospect.

Arizona likewise enjoyed favorable conditions and a larger crop.

IOWA "MESSAGE" REVEALED AS HOAX

LONGVIEW, Wash., March 20.—(AP)—A message purporting to have been written by the first engineer of the wrecked freighter Iowa was definitely branded as a hoax last night by the Pacific county sheriff's office after comparing the note with handwriting of Valentin Clabery, first assistant engineer of the ill-fated ship. Samples of the script of Clabery and of Carl C. Bendixen, chief engineer of the Iowa, were taken to South Bend, Pacific county, late yesterday by two reporters of the Longview Daily News.

A comparison of the crude scrawl of the note with the neat signature of Clabery and the regular, legible writing of Bendixen indicated that it had not been written by the hand of either of the engineers.

Al Hultgren, chief deputy of Pacific county, after scanning the three samples of writing, expressed the opinion the note, picked up in a sealed bottle floating in the waters of Willapa harbor, was the work of "some schoolboy."

OREGON EVENTS FLASHED FROM WIRE SERVICE

PORTLAND, Ore., March 19.—(AP)—A circuit court jury convicted William R. O'Donnell of manslaughter charges for the automobile accident which proved fatal to William Maxwell, a pedestrian. Judge John P. Winter will pronounce sentence tomorrow.

THE DALLES, Ore., March 20.—(AP)—The Dalles chamber of commerce and the county Pomona grange have invited the Oregon State grange to hold its annual 1937 session here.

It was proposed that the session theme be a commemoration of the completion of Bonneville dam. This year the grange will meet at Lebanon in June.

PORTLAND, March 20.—(AP)—Oregon lost another pioneer today—a huge cow elk.

It was found dead by CCC workers in Clatsop county. Frank Wier, state game supervisor, said "so far as I know it was the oldest elk in the state. It was one of the original stock of the Jackson hole herd in 1912 or 1913."

PORTLAND, March 20.—(AP)—A test of the constitutionality of Oregon's weight marking pact came to a showdown today with lawyers instructed to file briefs up on which Federal Judge Fee will rule.

The pact was attacked by the Hudson-Duncan company here. After hearing final arguments, Judge Fee ordered the attorneys to file briefs in 15 days.

DEFER CROP PLANS, FARMERS ADVISED

WASHINGTON, March 19.—(AP)—President Roosevelt issued a statement today urging farmers not to complete this year's crop plans until they have studied benefits for crop diversion offered under the new farm program.

In his statement the president said agriculture department figures showed farmers were planning an increase of 19 per cent in spring wheat acreage, six per cent in corn acreage, 11 per cent in rice, nine per cent in tobacco and eight per cent in peanuts—with unofficial estimates of about 15 per cent in cotton.

"Although the production control program has been stopped," he said, "farmers are not entirely at the mercy of unbridled competition with their fellow producers, as they were in the years preceding 1933. The farm act provides for financial assistance by the government to those farmers who, heeding the warnings contained in the intentions-to-plant reports, wish to shift from the production of unneeded surpluses of soil-depleting crops to the production of needed soil-building crops."

"If farmers, for any reason, should fail to take advantage of the new act, and especially if they should carry out their intentions as indicated in the department of agriculture report, the consequent excessive production of such cash crops as cotton and wheat and tobacco might result once more in wrecking of their prices and undermining of their soil."

"But if the farmers, in operating the soil conservation program, display the same energy and cooperative spirit which they showed in making the production control programs work, they will go far to protect both their soil and their incomes."

"This is an appeal to all farmers to cooperate for their own and national good to help in preventing excessive production."

DISCHARGE OF TWO TEACHERS OPPOSED

PORTLAND, Ore., March 19.—(AP)—Five patrons of Rockwood school district east of Portland ask-

ed a circuit court injunction to prevent the directors from discharging two teachers.

The petition stated that Minnie B. Altman and Marian Hamlin were to be discharged "to satisfy personal grudges."
