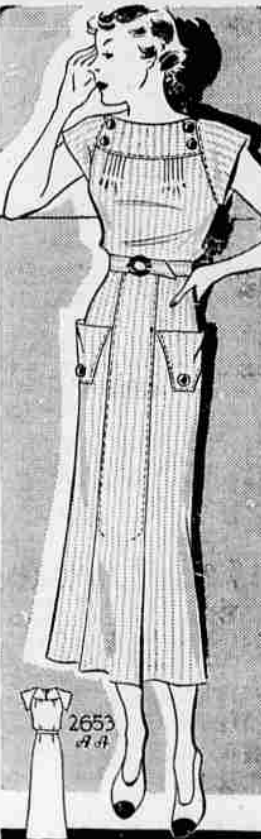

"Windfall" Rate Studied The windfall tax occupied the sub-committee this morning, but Chairman Samuel D. Hill (D., Wash.) asserted "we haven't come to any decision as to rates or on any phase of the situation at all." He added that members have in mind a very high rate of perhaps 80 to 90 per cent and the classification of the windfall tax in a new category. Hill disclosed that schedules originally submitted by the treasury to carry out the corporate tax suggestion still were under consideration. These contemplated rates of 20 to 37 1/2 per cent, starting on net income up to \$2,000 and going up to a bracket of \$10,000 or over. The sub-committee, however, decided that would not allow corporations sufficient opportunity to build up reserves for bad times and worked out a schedule of its own. It called for a 15 per cent tax when corporations held back up to 10 per cent of their net income and climbed to 55 per cent for those withholding 30 per cent or over.
