Above Portsmouth, at Ashland, Ky., and Huntington, W. Va., the river was steadily leveling off.

On upstream, the river was back within its banks around Marietta and East Liverpool.

Soldiers Keep Order
One thousand national guardsmen were on duty in Hartford, strewn with debris and swamped by the Connecticut, to prevent looting and restore order. New military and police restrictions were imposed to keep persons from entering flooded business houses.

The river was falling rapidly and weather bureau officials said it would return to normal by tomorrow morning.

Over all the east, Red Cross and public health officials rushed supplies of vaccine to stricken communities, but the danger from contaminated water in most localities appeared to be passing hourly.

As the Ohio plunged downstream to meet the Mississippi at Cairo, the tributaries of the "Father of Waters" were rising in Minnesota.

The Missouri river, likewise, was swelling rapidly. At Omaha, Neb., this rise was four feet in 24 hours.

Dust storms, ironically, swirled over parts of six western states during the week-end.

crews would begin work at both Leland and Port Orford, working together to join rails.

Two Conditions Faced
Recommendation of a certificate was issued in mid-December by Frank C. McCulloch, Oregon public utilities commissioner, based on two contingencies:

He made a "vigorous" recommendation because of resources and markets concerned. However, he strongly emphasized that the ICC should require that "the applicant within a time fixed (not to exceed one year) make adequate and proper showing . . . of financial ability to construct and adequately equip the proposed road."

"That construction actually commenced within a time fixed (not to exceed two years from date) and thereafter be diligently prosecuted to completion."

McCulloch said the record is extremely weak as to the applicant's present ability to adequately finance construction and equipment. . . . The record is very strong upon the point of public necessity. We feel that the improvement already made by private enterprise almost alone justified the allowance of the certificate.

RAILROAD CONSTRUCTION IN LANE COUNTY APPROVED

SALEM, March 23.—(AP)—The interstate commerce commission today issued a certificate authorizing construction of the Oregon, Pacific and Eastern railroad between Waldon and Mosby in Lane county, the public utilities commission or was informed.

The proposed line would tap approximately 7,000 acres of timber land in Lane county and connect with the Southern Pacific railroad. The cost of the line was estimated at \$23,350.

The certificate provides that con-

struction operations shall begin prior to October 1 this year and be completed within 12 months.
