EX-CONVICT SOUGHT AS SLAYER OF GIRL

SALT LAKE CITY, March 24.—(AP)—City and county officers pressed a search today for an unnamed ex-convict wanted in connection with the assault-murder of pretty 20-year-old Ruth Shaw.

The half-dead body of the pretty unemployed office worker was found on a blood-stained snowbank beside a canyon road east of her Sunday.

What police said was a "tentative identification" spurred the search for the slayer. Naomi Shaw pointed to a picture in criminal records last night and said that it "looked very much like" the blond young man with whom her sister left a public dance hall Saturday evening, presumably to go home.

Lack of Name Handicaps
However, police continued to question numerous young men answering the general description given by Miss Shaw. They still were handicapped by the lack of a name. None of the girl's family ever heard Ruth mention her companion's name, although she had known him for some time and danced often with him at the resort.

The opinion also was expressed by investigators that the girl may have been violated by more than one man. Harold Bell, a service station attendant, told police he was positive Ruth Shaw was the girl in a car containing three men which stopped at his stand for gasoline Saturday night.

An inquest jury found Miss Shaw met death at the hands of "some unknown persons, before or after being criminally and feloniously assaulted."

Requisition for
HARPER IS AIRED

SACRAMENTO, March 24.—(AP)—Governor Merriam held hearings today on two requisitions from Oregon and postponed definite action on both until he has reviewed additional affidavits.

The hearing on the requisition for the return to Roseburg, Ore., of Frank F. Harper, charged with attempting to obtain property by false pretenses, was continued until tomorrow.

The legality of the papers was questioned by Harper's attorney and a deputy attorney general will advise the governor on this question.

Harper is held in Crescent City. Attorneys for A. Michell and C. J. Molinari, who were arrested in San Francisco on an indictment returned in Jackson county, Oregon, told the governor he lacked jurisdiction because Molinari never had been in Oregon.

Molinari and Michell are charged with having obtained turkeys on consignment from Oregon growers and failing to pay for them.

District Attorney G. A. Coddington of Jackson county and attorneys for Molinari and Michell were given a week in which to file affidavits.

CROP LOANS OPEN TO APPLICATIONS

Application for emergency crop loans for 1936 are now being received at the county agent's office in the federal building at Roseburg, reports George Hilton, Jr., field supervisor of the emergency crop and feed loan section of the farm credit administration.

The emergency crop loans will be made only to farmers who cannot obtain credit from any other source, as provided by regulations issued by the governor of the farm credit administration. The money loaned will be limited to the farmer's immediate and actual cash needs for growing his 1936 crops and in no instance may exceed \$200 to one farmer.

Farmers are not eligible for emergency crop loans if they can borrow from an individual, production credit association, bank, or other concern. Farmers will also be considered ineligible if they have an application pending with resettlement administration, have received assistance from that organization this year or are indebted to the resettlement administration for an unpaid loan.

As in the past, the security for

an emergency crop loan will consist of a first lien on the crop financed. Landlord or others having an interest in the crop to be financed will be required to waive their claims in favor of a lien to the governor of the farm credit administration until the emergency crop loan is repaid.

Checks in payment of approved loans will be issued by the regional emergency crop and feed loan office at Spokane.

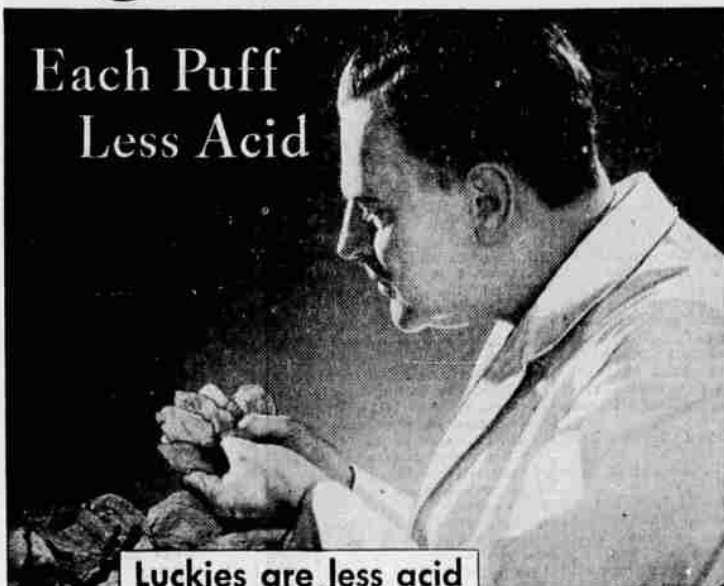

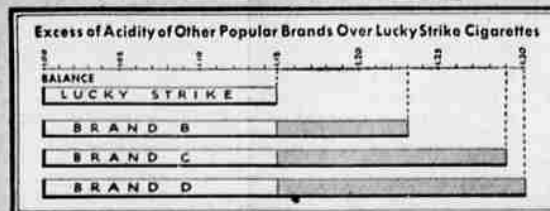
