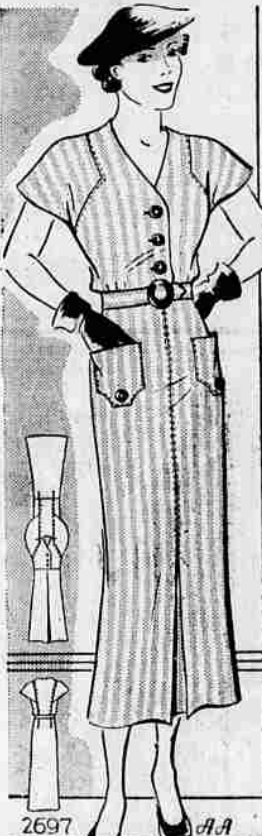
WOMEN'S AUXILIARY MEETS AT YOUNG HOME TONIGHT AT 7 O'CLOCK

OLD AGE AID PLAN OUTLINED BY VOYT

fied by reason of age and residence, are eligible for assistance. "It is required of the relief staff," Voyt said, "that before a grant is made, a visit must be made to the place of residence of each applicant. To facilitate the efforts of the county relief committee staff, it is advisable that all present county old age cases prepare definite data, regarding proof of birth date, proof of state residence, and lists carrying full names and correct addresses of living children, brothers, sisters and other near relatives, insurance records, property records, etc."

"In the past the county court cleared old age payments on the 15th of each month, covering payment for that month. The relief committee and staff will make every effort to complete investigations so that payments of grants can be made at this period," Voyt said.

"Applications from persons who have heretofore not received old age aid from the county court should be made in writing to the county relief committee, stating full details."

Mr. Voyt particularly emphasized the importance of collecting data, prior to the visit of the case worker. Persons eligible and making application for assistance, he states, should have ready for inspection by the investigator, a birth certificate, or some valid paper or instrument showing proof of age. Proof of citizenship and of residence must also be furnished and should be prepared in advance. Records concerning insurance and property should be ready for investigation, and a list must be provided giving the full names of

children and close relatives of the applicant.

"It should be thoroughly understood," Voyt said, "that the present system is not one of pensions. It is a plan for old age assistance and such assistance will be upon a basis of individual needs within the maximum limitations established."

LOCAL ENROLLMENT OF CCC ORDERED

A new local enrollment of CCC recruits has been authorized, according to word received today by the local relief office, Franklin Voyt, manager, reports. Applicants for enrollment must be between the ages of 17 to 28 years and must be from relief families who are on public assistance rolls, WPA rolls or from families receiving direct grants or rehabilitation aid. Applicants must also measure up in physical well being. Former CCC men meeting the requirements are eligible for reselection if they had minimum of four months consecutive service previously.

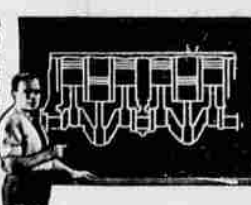

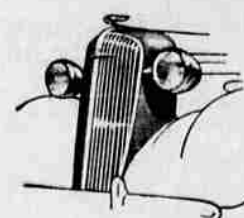
