

STUDENTS FUSSED IN MANNERS TEST

SALT LAKE CITY, March 26.—(AP)—University of Utah men students generally aren't embarrassed when they go to teas, dinner parties and dances. They know most of the answers.

A goodly share of the cords confessed, through errors in a social usage test, that they aren't so sure of themselves at social functions.

A majority of both men and women students agreed that gum is to be chewed in private and that neckers should neck, if they must, in some shady, out-of-the-way lane rather than on the steps of the administration building.

A lot of the students got all tangled up on their answers how to properly introduce a person.

Approximately one-third of the men rebelled at rising when a woman leaves or returns to a dinner table.

One thousand students took the test, designed to make them conscious of social usage.

Scores ranged from 14 to 160 per cent. No one made a perfect score of 180 per cent.

ITINERATE SELLERS OF LINOLEUM HIT

A "bargain" offered by itinerate linoleum peddlers may prove very costly, if recent complaints to the Portland Better Business bureau are a criterion.

These complaints indicate that a crew of these transient salespeople are operating in Oregon. Their practice is to call at a home and represent that they have just finished laying new linoleum in a house in the district and have a piece of fine quality linoleum left which they are willing to sell at a greatly reduced price rather than take it back to the shop.

Like most of these "something-for-nothing" deals, the transaction must be completed immediately, and the complainants report they were rushed into the purchase before they had any opportunity to investigate the representations, or check the value of the floor covering.

One party who made a purchase from this crew reports she paid \$19.00 for so-called linoleum, only to find later that the merchandise delivered to her was actually felt base floor covering that could be duplicated in retail stores at a fraction of this price.

All efforts to locate these peddlers have proven futile, for they apparently make only a few calls in a given territory, and the business address they have been using is fictitious.
