Filene, a close friend of the president, said he found "bankers and big business men in California feel about Mr. Roosevelt much as eastern bankers and big business men do."

He added: "But the average man—the farmer, small merchant and mechanic—is definitely for him. They recognize that President Roosevelt has made a real attempt to help them in their economic problems. Some believe he has spent too much money but expect to vote for him nevertheless."

ROSEBURG ARMORY
GETS REPAIR FUNDS

Work on 28 armory projects in Oregon will start after the Oregon works administrator determines priority of projects on the basis of availability of funds and whether the projects meet federal requirements. It is announced from Washington, D. C. Ten projects call for construction of new armories, but work cannot start until land is acquired and federal money cannot be used for land acquisition.

An allocation of \$2,736 has been made for repair, painting and construction of additional facilities at the Roseburg armory, and it is expected that this project will be given early approval. The recommendation of the state calls for an acoustic ceiling in the auditorium to make the room more serviceable for public meetings and other uses. This improvement is proposed in addition to painting and general repairs.
