BANKERS WARNED ON WAREHOUSE PAPER

NEWBERG, Ore., March 27.—(AP)—Bankers should beware of warehouse receipts which neglect to state exactly what commodities are in containers. H. S. Yohe, administrator of the U. S. warehouse act, told members of the Yamhill County Bankers' association.

Some warehousemen who have refused to take out government licenses practice fraud by inserting in their warehouse receipts the words "not to contain," instead of declaring exactly what the containers hold.

In accepting receipts as collateral, bankers should not permit the borrower to keep the commodity borrowed on, he said.

OPIATES SMUGGLER DRAWS SIX YEARS

PORTLAND, Ore., March 27.—(AP)—Iwanari Kinoshita received a six-year sentence on charges of smuggling opiates. Jiro Shibata, taken from a ship at the same time Kinoshita was arrested, was sentenced to 18 months on charges of resisting an officer. Fines also were levied.

GRANTS PASS, Ore., March 27.—(AP)—State Representative W. A. Johnson announced his candidacy for the state senate on the republican ticket.

W. T. Miller, house member in 1935, announced for the senate seat on the democratic ticket. Senator James T. Chinook said he will not seek reelection.

R. J. Wright, former Salem resident, announced he will seek the position as Josephine county representative.

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WEST AREA TRADE GAINS ARE NOTED

Building Permits Likewise Increase; Labor Status Shows No Change.

Volume of industrial production in the twelfth federal reserve district was slightly lower in February than in January whereas little change in usual. Retail trade increased, while railway freight traffic declined, after allowance for seasonal factors. Number of workers employed by industry was the same in mid-February as in mid-January, although a small rise ordinarily takes place.

In contrast with the United States as a whole, value of building permits in cities of this district rose in February to the highest figure since July 1931. The increase resulted from larger permits for non-residential buildings and alteration and repair work; residential permits were the same as in January. Although new contract awards for public works were much smaller in February than the year record total in January, construction work on projects of that class continued at a high level.

Daily average lumber production was larger in February than in January, but the increase was smaller than the average of other recent years. The adjusted index, however, at 71 per cent. of the 1923-1925 average, remained close to the highest point recorded since the summer of 1930.

Value of daily average sales of department, apparel, and furniture stores in this district was about the same in February as in January. Freight carloadings did not increase by the usual seasonal amount, largely because the movement of lumber by rail did not show the customary expansion.

Crop Conditions Good.

Favorable weather for growth of crops and of forage on livestock ranges followed heavy rains throughout February. Present condition of crops and livestock generally is good and the outlook for irrigation water and range forage during the spring and summer is excellent. Quotations for farm products were moderately lower in mid-March than in mid-February.

Twelfth district income tax payments to the federal government totaled almost 24 million dollars during the first 29 days of March this year, an increase of 43 per cent. over payments in the corresponding period of 1935.

STRINGER'S ESCAPE EFFORTS RECITED

VANCOUVER, Wash., March 27.—(AP)—Sheriff Leland Morrow revealed today that Glenn Stringer, 23, Medford, Ore., youth convicted of the murder of Herbert Caples, tobacco salesman, made two attempts to escape from the county jail.

The sheriff said Stringer tore a piece of metal off his bed and "began digging at the bricks."

"He didn't get very far either time because we watch them too closely," said the sheriff. Morrow said the attempts were made about a month ago.

Bentley Wilcox, Tacoma, Wash., girl, whom Stringer embraced in court yesterday after a jury returned a verdict recommending the death penalty, will leave here today for her home. The sheriff said Stringer and the girl were sweethearts and had known each other several years.

Morrow said the prisoner did not seem disturbed over the verdict. Stringer was convicted of killing Caples in a holdup on March 19, 1934. In a confession he implicated Ralph Tremaine, who has not been captured. Stringer was arrested at Medford, Ore., for a burglary and police later discovered that a revolver taken from him was the weapon with which Caples was slain.

After his parole from the Oregon prison, Stringer was brought here for trial. He offered no defense and sentence will not be passed until a motion for a new trial is argued, probably late next week. If the motion is denied an appeal is not expected because Stringer is penniless.

SECOND FLAX PLANT PROJECT STARTED

SALEM, March 27.—(AP)—Governor Martin shaved Saturday turned the first shovel of dirt for erection of the second flax retting and scutching plant in the Willamette valley to be constructed cooperatively between WPA and local communities when he handled the spade at Canby.

The governor a week earlier had performed the same ceremony at Mt. Angel, and the third to be erected, at an estimated cost of \$75,000 each, was expected to be started at Springfield soon.

Approximately 80 growers gave approval for the new mill at Canby and authorized filing of incorporation papers.

THREE OREGON CROP PLANTINGS BIGGER

PORTLAND, March 27.—(AP)—Acreage planted to corn, spring wheat and potatoes in Oregon will exceed 1935 figures, the U. S. department of agriculture said.

The department estimated in Oregon an acreage of 63,000 for corn in 1936 against 59,000 last year. 242,000 for wheat against 231,000, 253,000 for oats and 1,061,000 for tame hay, both the same as 1935, 41,000 for potatoes against 37,000, 37,000, and 113,000 for barley against 127,000, the only decrease.

With the exception of corn, the indicated acreages all exceeded by substantial margins the 1928-32 average, which was 63,000 for corn, 177,000 for wheat, 238,000 for oats, 41,000 for barley, 38,000 for potatoes and 923,000 for tame hay.

REBATE ON PICK-UP FARM TRUCKS SET

SALEM, March 27.—(AP)—Earl Snell, secretary of state, announced rebates of \$5 will be made to all licensees of pick-up farm trucks, following the order Saturday of Circuit Judge L. H. McMahon for a peremptory writ of mandamus fixing the license on that type vehicle at \$5 instead of \$10.

The suit to mandamus the collection of what was termed a "double fee" was filed by W. S. Boutman of Tillamook county. Snell said he would not appeal the case to the supreme court. He said he understood the order applied only to pick-up trucks used for farm purposes and not to other types.

The law had been declared unconstitutional by Judge McMahon of the Marion county circuit court.
