EDEN'S ASSERTION DISTURBS GERMANY

British Minister Asked to Explain Avowal to Aid Belgium and France.

By the Associated Press. Great Britain's readiness to fight for France and Belgium if they are attacked appeared to disturb Germany's representatives at London today.

Joachim von Ribbentrop, envoy of Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler, called on Anthony Eden, British foreign secretary, for an explanation of his reaffirmation of Britain's obligations under the Locarno treaty, as well as his warning that peace negotiations depend on a conciliatory move from Germany.

Hitler, meanwhile, went to Germany's biggest munitions factory at Essen to broadcast an election campaign speech for "peace and patriotism" while all Germans were commanded to stop their work and listen. The reich votes Sunday for a new Nazi reichstag, the election amounting to a plebiscite on the Rhineland's reoccupation by German soldiers in violation of the Locarno pact.

The reichsfuehrer repeated his oft-stated thesis: "There can be no real world peace without equality between partners." He reiterated that Germany wanted peace but would resist aggression.

In Paris, French sources suggested the possibility of France forming a united front with Soviet Russia and Poland for quick action by their armies in event Germany attacked.

Italy's dictator, Mussolini, who wants the sanctions against his country lifted, informally invited Salvador de Madariaga, league of nations negotiator, to Rome, diplomats said, to discuss preliminary terms for peace in Ethiopia. Madariaga was thought unlikely to accept, however, because he would have to show the same regard for Ethiopia's emperor, Haile Selassie, by going to Addis Ababa.

CORDON ELECTED EXALTED RULER

Attorney Guy Cordon was elected exalted ruler of the Elks lodge held last night. He succeeds V. T. Jackson, who has headed the Roseburg lodge for the past two years. Mr. Jackson automatically becomes the local delegate to the grand lodge.

Other officers chosen were Adrian Fisher, esteemed leading knight; Harry Burr, esteemed loyal knight; L. J. Griffith, esteemed lecturing knight; Ira B. Riddle, secretary; I. G. Pickens, treasurer; Walter Good, tyler; Perry Foster, trustee.

The new officers will be installed at the regular meeting Thursday, April 2.

GALLOWES CLAIMS KILLER GEO. HALL

California Murderer Dies in Noose After Futile 3-Year Court Fight.

FOLSOM, Calif., March 27.—(AP)—George Hall, slayer of State Highway Patrolman Steven Kent and Leslie Quigley, Yreka garageman, dropped to his death on the gallows of Folsom prison here today.

His execution brought to an end a three-year fight against paying the penalty for his crime, climaxed by the desperate effort of his attractive 23-year-old wife to help him escape by smuggling guns into the prison to him.

The wife, near collapse, awaited the news of her husband's execution in her cell in the county jail at Sacramento. Just 24 hours after the springing of the trap she is scheduled to be arraigned in superior court here to answer to a felony charge based on her "one-chance-in-a-million" attempt to provide him a means of shooting his way to freedom. She has been treated for a week at the state hospital for the insane, her odds with the defendant assertion, "well, there was at least a chance to die with him."

Although seemingly on the point of breaking, Hall walked to the scaffold unassisted. He declined to make any statement. The sacrament was administered by Father Cronin of the prison's Catholic chapel.

Hall shot down Highway Patrolman Kent and Kent's brother-in-law, Quigley, March 10, 1933, when the man recognized Hall as the fugitive hunted for kidnapping a federal customs officer at the Canadian border a week before.

After his car had been forced to the curb, Hall fired three times at the approaching pair. Kent died instantly, a bullet through his heart. Quigley was dead 15 minutes later, two bullets in his chest.

Seizures Support Law That Commercial Jams Must Follow Pound-for-Pound Rule

Housewives really established the definitions and standards for jams, jellies and preserves. For generations they have been making jams and preserves by combining fruit and sugar, pound for pound, and boiling the mixture until it is suitably concentrated. The trade, too, followed this pound for pound rule when preserving moved from the kitchen to the factory.

Buyers expect to get just about this combination, say the food and drug administration officials who enforce the federal food and drug act, and any combination that varies much from the standard set by the home jam-makers is regarded as misbranded.

For several years some products have been appearing on the market which have been made with a smaller proportion of fruit than is customary, or in which moisture which should have been removed by boiling has been retained in the mixture, which has been thickened by the use of pectin and acid. The sale of these imitation preserves labeled as pure preserves is not only a fraud upon the purchasers but is demoralizing to the preserve industry.

Officials of the food and drug administration in the enforcement of the food and drug act began an extensive investigation of the practice, which has resulted in numerous seizures of sub-standard preserves, jams and jellies.

In the last few months 22 seizures of these products which were deficient in fruit or fruit juice were made in eastern cities. These represented the products of ten firms.

In no case did the labels give any indication that the articles were other than pure preserves of normal composition. When adulterated food products are shipped in interstate commerce they are subject to seizure under the provisions of the food and drug act and in addition the shipper may be prosecuted.

Officials of the food and drug administration state that wherever the facts warrant it is their intention to prosecute the shippers of these adulterated and misbranded preserves.

Example by Federal Expert Shows How Soil Conservation Plan Will Operate

WASHINGTON, March 23.—(AP)—A specific example of how the new soil conservation farm program would operate at one farm was outlined today by John B. Huston, an AAA regional director.

The example follows: Midwest farmer owns 100 acres. He usually plants 60 acres of spring wheat, 15 acres of rye, 10 acres of oats and the remainder in pasture of some form.

His "soil depleting base acreage" would be those acres usually planted in wheat, rye and oats, a total of 85 acres.

The AAA says, except in the case of cotton, tobacco, peanuts, sugar beets, sugar cane, flax and rice, that a farmer may not receive a subsidy payment for shifting more than 16 per cent of his "soil depleting" base to "soil conserving" crops.

Fifteen per cent of 85 acres would be 12 acres.

The farmer might elect to shift

12 acres of wheat land to a soil conserving crop. His rye crop already would be planted at this time.

Suppose that the farmer had average yields, he would receive about \$10 an acre for shifting each acre of wheat land to a soil conserving crop.

This would amount to \$120.

In addition, he might receive as much as \$1 an acre for planting the 12 acres in a soil conserving crop.

This would raise his payment to \$132.

Finally, if the farmer plowed under his rye to improve the soil, he might receive as much as \$1 an acre for the rye, or \$15 for the 15 acres.

The farmer's payment for "soil conserving," under AAA definitions, would be \$120. His payment for "soil building" would be \$12 for a crop replacing wheat, plus \$15 for rye. The farmer thus would get a total of \$147.

METAL FOUND IN HEART OF INFANT

CHICAGO, March 27.—(AP)—A clue of the nature of the most piece of metal found in the heart of a newborn infant was advanced today.

The London correspondent who detailed the mystifying case in the Journal of the American Medical Association suggested it may have been a contraceptive device.

The writer related how two physicians conducted a post mortem on an English girl who "appeared normal in every way but died suddenly some hours after birth." Dissecting the heart, they found a piece of metal "resembling brass or gilded tin" and "looking something like the claw setting of a toy jewel ring."

He said the doctors rejected the possibility the object had been dropped by one of them, picked up from the mortuary slab or shed by one of their instruments.
