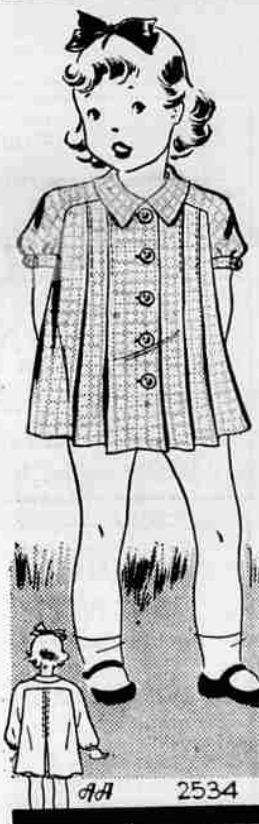

PUBLIC OWNERSHIP RAILROADS DECRIED

PORTLAND, Ore., March 28 — (AP) American railroadroading must weigh the possibility of government ownership more seriously today than at any other time in the industrial history of the nation, Harry G. Taylor, Chicago, chairman of the western association of railway executives, believes.

Taylor, speaking before the Pacific northwest advisory board yesterday, used the operation of the Canadian National railways by the Canadian government as an answer to proponents of government operation in the United States.

He asserted that an annual deficit of \$123,000,000 was being piled up in operation of the Canadian road and that unless some major financial operation is soon undertaken the debt will consume all public revenue.

Taylor charged that the fires of government ownership are being fanned constantly by the interstate commerce commission, RFC, Federal Rail Coordinator Eastman, congressional investigators and 48 state commissions. These agencies are citing "alleged" railroad shortcomings in their arguments, Taylor asserted.

FAMILIES IN DIXIE FLEE FLOOD PERIL

(By the Associated Press) Rising rivers drove scores of families from their homes in the lower Ohio valley and the south today.

Approximately 100 persons evacuated their dwellings in Pope county, Illinois, as the overburdened Tennessee river were flooded. Many residents of the menaced area took to the hills. The highest levels in four years were in prospect. The Cumberland river also expanded to threatening proportions.

The upper Mississippi slowly swelled. A huge ice field swept away a 395 foot pontoon bridge utilized by a railroad at Reads Landing, Minn.

The Ohio was above flood stage from Pittsburgh to Cairo, Ill., but no new rampage was indicated. Evansville, Ind., looked for a stage of 45.5 feet Monday, but the

rise had virtually halted above Cincinnati. Further upstream, rehabilitation work was pushed.

Meanwhile, the house banking committee approved a measure to authorize the reconstruction finance corporation to lend up to \$25,000,000 to persons and corporations in the stricken areas.

O-HEAD CROSSING OAKRIDGE, SOUGHT

SALEM, March 28.—(AP)—The public utilities commission received an application from the Lane county court for permission to construct an overcrossing over the Southern Pacific tracks at Oakridge.

The court asked that the cost of construction be divided between the county and the railroad company. Cost of the crossing was estimated at \$25,000.

A hearing will be set after an answer on the application is received from the railroad company.
