

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE LECTURE IS GIVEN

Law of God as Applied to Human Affairs Pointed Out in Address.

In these strange, difficult days of the world's unrest, it is not entirely worth while to know of a system of thinking which is not only a religion, but an exact science, capable of demonstration? Christian Science challenges fear, failure, doubt, distress of any kind by affording a practical and workable understanding of the changeless law of God. Let us have done with negative thinking. The world for too long has been looking at the wrong side of the ledger. One may hold a penny so close to his eyes that he can see nothing beyond it. And there is so much "beyond" of beauty and happiness and success! There is a way out of every human difficulty, no matter how hopeless it may appear to be, a right way, a quiet way, a way which will bless all concerned, the sort of way of which the prophet once wrote, "For ye shall go out with joy, and be led forth with peace."

In quoting from Isaiah I am reminded to say what doubtless most of you already know, that Christian Science derives its sanction from the Bible. Our textbook is named, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," and it was written by Mary Baker Eddy, the Discoverer of Christian Science, and its only Leader.

That which is called a Christian Science treatment is the law of God applied to any particular case. It releases, or "saves," us from all that is unlike God, thereby establishing our salvation, not deferred to some future time and to some so-called future world, but immediately, here and now. It includes a grateful acknowledgment of the good already received, a denial of whatever erroneous belief may be presenting itself for correction, and the establishing in consciousness of the great spiritual fact that since God and man are inseparable as Principle and idea, man can know only what God knows, and that God's knowledge does not include such dark dream-shadows as sin, sickness, and death.

God is so good! What is it which ever keeps any of us from demonstrating more of this goodness in our own individual experience? It is our failure to lift our heads above the mist, and remember who we are—the man who has dominion over all things. No matter how hopeless any outward situation may seem to be, keep on singing your songs in the night, and trusting God. Never admit defeat. Never admit failure. There are no failures in God's universe. You are not a failure, nor have been a failure, nor are going to be a failure. That is not the truth about you. You are the child of God, free to walk the heavenly way, unhampered and unafraid.

Market reports may fill humanity with grief, business may disintegrate, human enterprises fail, established precedents come to naught, thrones totter, governments change hands overnight, but the true Christian Scientist is at peace. For he knows that, "behind the dim unknown, Standeth God within the shadow, keeping watch above His own."

FHA EXTENSION PLANS ADJUSTED

WASHINGTON, March 30.—(AP)—Senate and house conferees today settled differences over a bill extending for one year from next Wednesday the authority of the federal housing administration to insure private loans for home and building repairs.

Early approval by both houses was forecast to get under the April 1 deadline.

The conferees eliminated a house provision permitting insurance of residence loans for new construction up to \$2,000 on unimproved property.

A senate clause allowing insured loans on mechanical equipment was stricken out.

Two house provisions accepted would permit loans to lessees whose leases run for six months or more beyond the loan maturity date, and loans to church properties.

EX-SENATOR DILL SUES FOR DIVORCE

SPOKANE, Wash., March 30.—(AP)—Former Senator Clarence C. Dill, of Washington, filed suit in a superior court today for divorce from the former "General" Rosalie Jones, of New York, women's rights advocate.

Dill charged cruelty, alleging in his complaint that Mrs. Dill embarrassed him by wearing "filthy" clothing, burying dead dogs and garbage in the yard of their Spokane mansion, offending labor when the senator needed its support for reelection, refusing to serve food enough to feed guests, and finally leaving him.

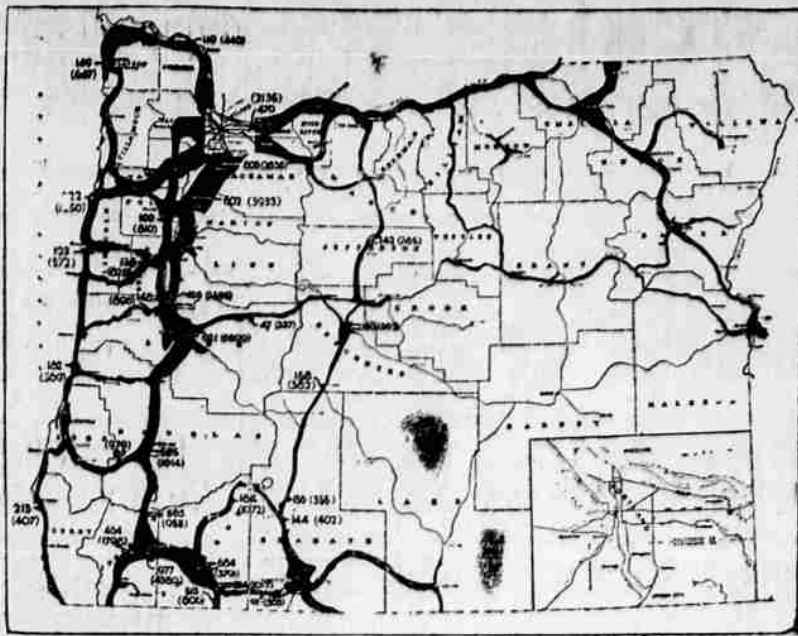
The Dills were married at Cold Springs Harbor, Long Island, on March 15, 1927.

MARCH ACTIVITIES OF CHAMBER OF COMMERCE ARE REVIEWED

Adjustment of Broccoli Crate Tangle, Acquisition of Cannery, Highway Improvement Plans Told in Bulletin; Necessity for New Band Uniforms Present Year Stressed.

A summary of activities of the Roseburg chamber of commerce for the past month, together with announcements of coming events, is contained in the monthly bulletin mailed to all members today by W. C. Harding, secretary. The bulletin is as follows:

Wednesday, April 15th, the state highway commission will be our guests at a chamber of commerce forum luncheon to be held in the Umpqua hotel dining room. Henry C. Cabell, chairman of the commission, will be our guest speaker. Luncheon 50c, and everyone welcome.

Last Wednesday Umpqua broccoli growers were confronted with the loss of \$20,000 through a trivial misunderstanding regarding the legal size of the container they have been using for the past four years. Quick action by your chamber of commerce officers adjusted the matter and the crop is being marketed as usual.

Our municipal band has had no new uniforms for fifteen years. The time has come for replacing the old ones with new ones. The sum of \$500 is required. This money must be found. We hold five conventions in Roseburg this year. They will leave \$100,000 with us. Both of our splendid bands will be used for these events. The municipal band for many years has averaged fifteen weekly concerts each summer. Some of its members travel many miles each week of the year for their practices. Incidentally, they pay their own expenses including gasoline bills. Were these men to quit because of our lack of interest, it means that Director "Snap" Gillmore would leave Roseburg and the school band would soon disintegrate. Nothing of this kind can be allowed to happen. Your chamber of commerce feels that our bands are among our chief assets and that they and Mr. Gillmore must be retained at all hazards. Let us get busy at once and work out the problem.

For the past four or five years your chamber of commerce officers have followed up every lead that pointed cannery-ward. Several of the largest concerns in the northwest were contacted both personally and by letter, but none of them could be interested.

About three years ago your secretary encountered Fred Hurd of Salem, whom he had known for some years. Negotiations were begun with him that have finally resulted in his making all arrangements to can 25,000 cases of tomatoes and probably 10,000 cases of prunes here in Roseburg this year. He has leased the Edenbower packing plant with an option of purchase and will gradually enlarge his canning operations to a 100,000-case pack. In a short time Mr. Hurd's program promises to solve our cannery problem.

The Pacific Highway association directors met in Eugene this month and unanimously recommended that all allocations of money for this highway in the future should be made with especial reference to that portion of the road between Cottage Grove and the California line.

Within the next twelve months we hope to see the Pacific highway rebuilt between Kelly's Corner and Roseburg. Right of way is now being acquired for part of it.

A chamber of commerce committee in connection with our county court members and Honorable Guy Gordon, acting as chairman for both groups, during March conducted the regional forestry office in Portland and arranged for that office to complete the Smith river road during this year.

On Saturday, April 18th, Roseburg will entertain about 200 4-H club members under Earl Britton's guidance. They will be shown through some of our business places and entertained for luncheon under the auspices of your chamber of commerce agricultural committee.

RELIEF SPEEDED IN FLOOD REGIONS

(By the Associated Press)

Rehabilitation workers speeded their efforts in the upper Ohio river valley today as the stream receded to below flood stage from Pittsburgh to Pomeroy, Ohio. In the lower valley additional families fled from their homes but the slowly rising waters held little fear for most of the river cities.

Thousands of acres of bottom lands were under water in southern Illinois, near the confluence of the Ohio with the Mississippi at Cairo, but damage was believed slight.

Tourists drawn by the swollen river brought a weekend harvest to business men of the river towns.

Cold weather lessened the possibility that the Mississippi would overflow in Minnesota and Wisconsin. The Minnesota river, however, was out of its banks. A farm laborer was drowned near St. Peter, Minn.

Rises of 1 foot at Keokuk, Iowa, to 1.3 feet at St. Louis were reported by Mississippi river towns.

At Washington senate leaders considered a new \$500,000,000 flood control bill. Senator Robinson, democratic leader, said he would be compelled to oppose it as a discrimination in favor of the east.

SMALLER POTATO CROP INDICATED

Prices Expected to Climb Higher; Big Increase in Turkeys Forecast.

A decrease in late potato acreage for 1936 as compared with last years is in prospect, according to the best information available, it is announced in the current agricultural situation and outlook report issued by the Oregon State college extension service.

If food prices and domestic demand remain at least at present levels, potato prices may be expected to be higher than for the previous crops, if the indicated reduction takes place. Early potato growers are also expected to plant an acreage somewhat below average. Stocks of old potatoes are much smaller than a year ago in the country as a whole, and probably below average.

Fluctuating yields, as well as changes in acreage have large bearing on the final potato crop from year to year, the report points out. Some observers believe that plantings of late potatoes in 1936 may be as much as 10 per cent below the 1935 level, but production cannot be forecast reliably this early.

Unless unfavorable weather and disease interfere, a large increase in number of turkeys to be grown is in prospect this season, the report continues. The number of hens retained in the country for egg production is unusually large, and turkey hatcheries are experiencing heavy demand. In considering prospective prices for turkeys, however, other factors must be taken into consideration, such as buying power of consumers, prices of competing meats, and the manner by which the turkey crop is distributed and marketed.

SUMMER SESSION STAFF SET AT OSC

CORVALLIS.—Summer session students at Oregon State college this year will have an opportunity to study under one of the largest and most notable groups of visiting educators ever assembled for a summer session here, and, if they desire, to follow this with attendance at the first "post-session" in the history of the college, announces Dean M. Ellwood Smith, dean and director.

The six-weeks summer session will run from June 22 to July 31, and the post-session from August 3 to 28. Eighteen well-known authorities, many of them from large eastern colleges and universities, will supplement the strong resident staff in conducting some 183 courses in the regular session. The four-weeks post-session will offer courses in the school of education and in the departments of bacteriology, botany, chemistry, entomology, geology, mathematics, physics and zoology in the school of science.

SPRING GARDEN TIPS

The slimy slug or snail, early garden pest, is repelled from plants that are lightly covered with copper-lime dust or dry Bordeaux. The poison bran mash used for controlling cut-worms is also useful in killing slugs. Dr. Don C. Mote of the Oregon Experiment station advises, also, a poison bait consisting of 10 parts by weight of finely chopped waste lettuce leaves and one ounce of calcium arsenate. This is spread about the area to be protected and along the border of the garden where slugs may be hiding and from which they come out at night to feed.

Complete commercial fertilizers for a gardener are sold under various trade or brand names. While these are useful in identifying the source of the material, the grower should observe chiefly the analysis as shown on the tag on the sack. The relative percentages of nitrogen, phosphorus and potash, such as 3-10-7 or 4-12-4 is important according to the crop or soil on which it is used. A circular on "Fertilizers for Vegetable Crops" is available at all county agents' offices.

Sulfate of ammonia is not only a good vegetable fertilizer to help stimulate the growth of early garden vegetables but it is also useful in killing moss on lawns. Sprinkle lightly, taking care that the moss is completely covered with the fertilizer. In a very short time, especially if the application is made during a shower, the moss will have turned brown and the grass will be showing a decidedly invigorated growth and dark green color. Sometimes sulfate of ammonia is used in a standard solu-

tion of one ounce (full tablespoonful) to one gallon of water and as such has a stimulating effect on young plants or in fact any plants to which it is applied.

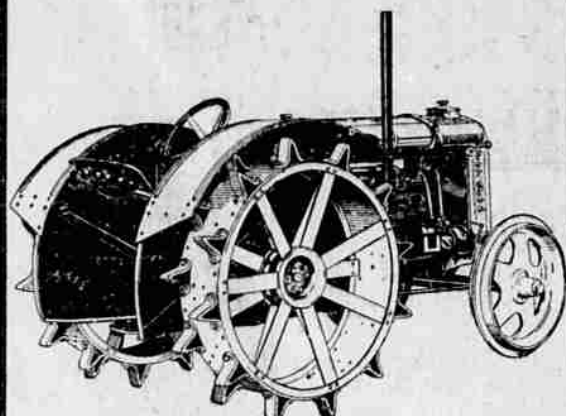

TRUCKERS FIGHTING R. R. PICKUP PLAN

WASHINGTON, March 30.—(AP)—Assailing what they termed an effort by railroads to create a "transportation monopoly," eastern trucking interests moved today to block a proposal of rail lines in the territory to establish free pickup and delivery service.

At a hearing before the interstate commerce commission, trucking spokesmen charged the proposed service would be discriminatory, would be rendered below cost, and would lead to "cutthroat competition."
