FORFEITS BAIL ON
"DRUNK" CHARGE

Bail in the sum of \$10 was forfeited in the city court today by Olaf Erick Sutherland, who failed to appear for arraignment on a charge of drunkenness. Sutherland was arrested Sunday by city officers and deposited cash bail for his appearance.

PORTLAND SEWER
BONDS ARE UPHELD

SALEM, March 31.—(AP)—The Oregon supreme court ruled the \$6,000,000 bond issue for construction of a sewerage disposal plant in Portland was legally voted and the action by the city council for the project valid. Authorization for procedure with the project was granted.

The opinion, reversing the Multnomah county circuit court overruling the injunction against issuing and selling the bonds, denied the complaint the city council had changed plans and specifications from those submitted to the voters at the special election in July, 1933.

The proposal submitted provided for sale of bonds and request of a grant of \$2,000,000 from the federal government for construction. It was set out the sewerage disposal plant would eliminate the 50 sewers emptying into the Willamette river and "polluting the stream."

The injunction proceedings was brought by E. Shainwald against the city of Portland, and allowed by Circuit Judge Robert Tucker, on the grounds the plans and specifications submitted to the voters were insufficient for their information.

Justice Henry J. Dean, author of the opinion, stated that the city council had adopted and adopted by the council give all the general information in regard to the sewerage disposal plant that the voters would be likely to read or to understand. We do not think it was necessary to have specifications for the voters' information to designate how many miles were to be put into a board, used in the work, or how far apart they should be, or details of that kind. The reports submitted to the voters were prepared by Walter Baer.

Continuing Justice Dean stated that the change in specifications filed after the election called had no part in the proceedings leading up to the election, and thereby the authorization of the bond issue was legal.

Damages Denied
In another opinion the supreme court denied damages of \$8,500 to Ambrose Tauscher from the Doernbecher Manufacturing company and others as a result of damages alleged to have been received in an assault the night of June 5 in front of the manufacturing plant in Portland.

The assault, the complaint read, was an outgrowth of alleged communist plotting and the plaintiff was attacked and "badly beaten up" without reason. The opinion, written by Chief Justice J. U. Campbell, reversed the lower court presided over by Judge John P. Winter, and remanded the case "for such further proceedings as may be taken."

NEW TRIAL SOUGHT
FOR GLENN STRINGER

VANCOUVER, Wash., March 31.—(AP)—Superior Judge George B. Simpson took under advisement today a motion for a new trial for Glenn R. Stringer, Medford, Ore., youth condemned to die for the slaying of Herbert Lee Caples, holdup victim.

P. J. Kirwin, defense attorney, contended that the court erred in permitting Prosecuting Attorney E. G. Cushing to remark to the jury: "What would the world think of a not guilty verdict?" and in further saying: "There has not been a word of refutation."

Kirwin contended the latter statement inferentially referred to the fact that Stringer did not take the stand in his own defense, and that such reference is illegal.

Several other errors were charged.

NO FUNDS SEEN
FOR ARMY JOBS

PORTLAND, Ore., March 31.—(AP)—The works progress administration has no funds for Oregon's \$838,749 armory, repair and construction program, E. J. Griffith, Oregon WPA administrator, said today.

Twenty-eight projects were tentatively approved, but "money never was allotted," Griffith said.

Nor do any funds appear in sight, but there is one remaining hope. Brigadier-General Thomas E. Rilea, commander of the Oregon national guard, went to Washington to see if other than WPA funds could be obtained for the program, Griffith said.

OREGON TO OUTLAW
DEATH TRAP PLANES

PORTLAND, Ore., March 31.—(AP)—Oregon's new regulations outlawing "cheap" airplanes of the potential death trap variety will become effective as soon as printed copies can be circulated, the state aeronautics board said today.

Allan D. Greenwood, board inspector, said planes not used in interstate commerce will be subjected to state regulation as strict as federal aeronautics rules. Other states are interested in the Oregon regulations, he said.

Planes with state licenses only will not be permitted to be used for student instruction or any commercial purposes.
