JAPS AND RUSSIANS END 24-HOUR CLASH

(By the Associated Press)
A 24-hour battle which informed Soviet forces asserted contained the danger of another Russo-Japanese general headquarters in to have ended today.

The battle was fought on the border between Manchoukuo, the Japanese-created empire, and outer Mongolia, the soviet-advisee state which the Chinese national government still claims is a part of China.

Russian sources said the battle was fought in Mongolia; the Japanese general headquarters in Hsinking claimed it was fought in Manchoukuo.

Each party to the dispute claimed the other had used airplanes and one Japanese source implied the Mongols used poison gas.

Official advisers received in Moscow from Mongolia said the Manchoukuoans and Japanese had been forced to retreat from Mongolian territory.

Mongolia recently concluded a mutual assistance pact with Russia under which the red army is pledged to go to the assistance of Mongolia in case of unprovoked aggression.

HEADSTONE FINDING ENDS LOVE DREAM

PORTLAND, Ore., March 31.—(AP)—For 48 years—nearly half a century—a woman clung to the hope that a report of the death of her childhood sweetheart was wrong.

Then a tombstone which WPA workers unearthed recently in Hoyt park here proved the report all too true that F. L. Whitman, who came to Oregon from Iowa in 1885 with his father, died in 1888 from black smallpox.

But the woman, a South Bend, Wash., resident who asked that her name be withheld, had the solace that the grave will be neatly kept in the future.

She refused to believe that her loved one was dead, so she followed Whitman to the Oregon country. She couldn't locate the grave, but a thread of ebbing hope remained.

A few days ago she read in the Portland Oregonian that a headstone was unearthed in Hoyt park with the simple inscription: "F. L. Whitman, born Aug. 5, 1839. Died May 14, 1888."

At the request for further information Police Inspector L. V. Jenkins assigned two detectives who confirmed the identity of the grave.

"There is no question, in my mind, that this is the grave of F. L. Whitman," Jenkins wrote the woman.

"I have instructed Mr. Hinkle, superintendent of the park, to fix the grave up in nice shape," the letter concluded.

DENIES NAZI HYMN OF JEWISH ORIGIN

Emil Brust of Roseburg, German World War hero, today challenged a statement by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that the hymn "Die Landeshymne" sung as Choral for Hitler appeared for his election speech at Cologne, was a translation by the Jewish poet, Josef Weyl.

Brust exhibited old German hymn books in support of his claim the hymn was translated by Martin Luther 300 years before the birth of Weyl.

Brust came to the United States in 1930, when he became dissatisfied with the trend of government in Germany. He served four years in the German army, spending one year on the Russian front and three years on the western front during the World war.

During the recent visit of the German cruiser Emden to the Pacific coast, Brust was called to Portland where he was personally decorated by Captain Bachmann with the Hindenburg cross for val-

LAND-POOR FAMILIES TO GET U. S. HELP

PORTLAND, April 1.—(AP)—Five hundred families in the Pacific northwest will receive cash for their land and assistance, if desired, in relocating on good farms in established communities, the regional resettlement administration said today.

In summarizing the work, Walter A. Duffy, regional resettlement administrator, commented:

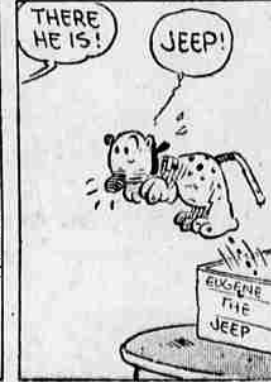
"Many underprivileged families struggling under inadequate standards of living face a new future as the administration launches a determined attack on rural poverty through retirement of over 500,000 acres of unprofitable and misused farm lands in the depleted timber and arid range areas of Oregon, Washington and Idaho."

Four-fifths of the land optioned already has been accepted for purchase and payments will be forthcoming as titles are cleared for final transfer to the government, Duffy said.

A statement from the resettlement office said private land being acquired are blocked with adjacent public lands to form conservation areas where more than 1,000 workers assigned to the resettlement administration from WPA rolls already are engaged in returning the lands to their natural cover and developing them for forest, range, wildlife conservation and recreation.

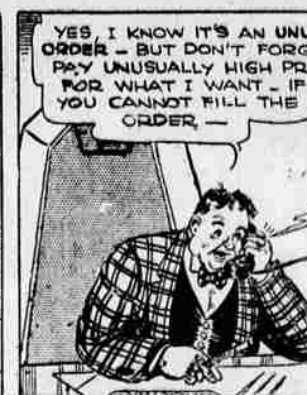
The two forest conservation areas include approximately 500,000 acres of depleted timber land in northeast Washington and 1,200,000 acres of second growth and burned over forest land in the Oregon Coast range. The statement also said range land conservation areas embrace approximately 200,000 acres in central Oregon and 350,000 acres in southeastern Idaho.
