## MARCH HERE LOW IN PRECIPITATION

The month of March was normal in temperature and low in precipitation according to the monthly meteorological summary compiled by D. P. Marting in charge of the local office of the U. S. weather bureau.

Mean temperature for the month was 47 degrees as compared with a 56-year average of 47.1 degrees. The lowest temperature was 29 degrees March 30 and the highest 72 degrees, March 20. The lowest temperature ever recorded in March was 18 degrees in 1896 and the highest was 85 degrees in 1923.

Rainfall totalled 1.76 inches as compared with a normal of 3.28 inches. Total precipitation since September 1 is 27.42 inches as compared with a normal of 27.11 inches, giving a seasonal surplus of 51 of an inch. A surplus of 2.67 inches in January accounts for the existing excess.

Rev. James H. Taylor, noted missionary to China, will speak at the Free Methodist church in West Roseburg Friday at 7:30 p. m. Rev. Marvin Knigge, pastor, announced today. Rev. Taylor is a grandson of the well known minister, J. Hudson Taylor, and is returning June 27 to China, where he has been in missionary service for the past 31 years. His parents spent 50 years in that land. He is president of the Theological seminary in China and is in great demand as an evangelist among the better educated groups of the Chinese. Rev. ## TRAGIC DEATH OF MAURER IS PROBED

Lane County Lumber Firm Official Found Killed by Rifle Bullet.

EUGENE, Ore., April 2.—(AP)—Officers waited the result of an autopsy today before determining their course of action in the death of Otto H. Maurer, secretary-treasurer of the Penn Lumber company of McEllynn, 25 miles west of Eugene.

The autopsy was ordered by District Attorney L. L. Ray. Maurer was found lying amid overturned and blood-splattered furniture at his home at McEllynn. Both his eyes were blackened, a bullet penetrated his head. The gun, a .22 calibre rifle, was found leaning against the wall of the room.

Officers first leaned toward the theory he was slain. Coroner C. P. Poole said the blackened eyes "would not have been normal in a death from gunshot wound."

Officials of the lumber company, with which Maurer was connected for 15 years, scouted the theory of foul play, however. They said Maurer, so far as they knew, had no personal enemies. They also said he appeared worried of late.

He was about 50 years old. Investigators hoped to determine by the autopsy whether the portion of the brain governing locomotion was disturbed by the rifle bullet.

Several have advanced the theory Maurer possibly created the disorder in the room by groping about blindly after he incurred the wound.

Maurer was found dying by E. H. Henry, who assists at the Maurer home. Henry called a physician from Eugene but Maurer died before medical aid could be given.

## 35 FACING TRIALS IN SEASIDE RIOT

ASTORIA, Ore., April 2.—(AP)—Thirty-five men faced separate trials today on charges of participating in the fatal labor riot at Seaside March 7.

The group pleaded innocent when arraigned yesterday and pleas for individual trials were granted. The defense reserved 10 days in which to file motions for a change of venue. Date for the first trial was set tentatively for April 27.

Bail for 34 was reduced from \$2,500 to \$1,000. Bail for Ray Gillispie, president of the Seaside local of the Sawmill and Timber Workers' union, was continued at \$5,000.
