ETHIOPIANS CLAIM LESSER LOSSES

ADDIS ABABA, April 2. (AP)—The Ethiopian government asserted today Italian casualties were more than three times heavier than those suffered by the Ethiopians in the battle of Mal Ceu, near Lake Ashangi, between the northern Italian and Imperial Ethiopian armies.

A communique said: "In a big battle March 31 and April 1 at Mal Ceu and Debar, 700 white Italians, 36 officers and 2,000 Eritreans were killed. Eight hundred and eighty-seven Ethiopians were killed."

The communique added: "On March 31, Ethiopian troops penetrated Mal Ceu and Debar where they captured four Italian forts."

On April 1 the fighting lasted all day and the number of Italians wounded is not as yet known. The Ethiopians suffered 345 wounded. "Quantities of guns, rifles, machine guns and revolvers were captured."

"The Ethiopian troops advanced despite intense air bombing, poison gases and artillery fire."

SAM BROWN HITS BROADCAST SNAG

PORTLAND, April 2. (AP)—Charles W. Myers, president of radio station KOIN, said Sam Brown of Gervais did not deliver his scheduled radio talk last night "because the speech was libelous."

Denounced Father

The Oregonian said it learned Brown was to have attacked Theodore G. Nelson of Salem, endorsed by the state Townsend board for the republican senatorial nomination. The newspaper also said Brown declined to provide the press with copies of the manuscript.

WARNING ISSUED ON JOBS 'RACKET'

One of the most active current rackets is the "job swindle" says a warning recently issued by the Portland better business bureau.

Typical among these job rackets are the operations of certain self-styled civil service training schools, whose salesmen are now active in the state attempting to enroll high school seniors and recent graduates. Many of these salesmen use the deceptive claim that the "school" can assure the student civil service employment.

Many complaints are also being received on transactions in which unemployed individuals have been induced to buy equipment or merchandise, pay for so-called "territorial rights" or post "cash bonds"—only to find later that the promised job was not as represented or had never existed. In several recent cases called to the bureau's attention, Oregon citizens have lost several hundred dollars to bunco men who promised permanent employment at good salaries and then disappeared after the money had been collected from the job seekers.

The bureau urges those contemplating dealing with some unknown party who promises employment for a fee to investigate carefully before signing a contract or advancing money.

FRAUD ORDER HITS LOTTERY PROGRAM

WASHINGTON, April 2.—(AP)—The postoffice department today announced a "fraud" citation against the national conference on legalizing lotteries, headed by Mrs. Oliver Harriman, New York society leader, and the Golden Stakes with which Al Smith, Jr., son of the former New York governor, is associated.

Karl A. Crowley, solicitor of the department, announced a fraud hearing on the Golden Stakes will be held April 1, and one on Mrs. Harriman's organization April 2. The organizations have been ordered to show cause why they should not be barred from receiving mail because of using the mails in a lottery scheme.
