

OAKS LEADS COAST PENNANT PARADE

Beat Angels in 9th Frame Rampage While Beavers Trough Missions

(By the Associated Press.)
Bill Meyer, a new Coast league manager, and his Oakland hall players stepped out in front of the 1935 pennant parade today.

The Acorns became the sole leaders of the circuit with the aid of Walter Beck, hurler for the Missions who slipped out of a first place tie. Beck lost a ten-inning tussle with the Portland Beavers 4-3 by walking the batters who scored the first two Portland runs in the opening inning, and then failing to touch first for a put-out in the tenth. That turned out to be the winning tally.

Meyer's Oaks did their share by driving Los Angeles into the cellar with a 12-3 victory. A nine-run rampage in the second drove Angel hurlers Newell, Kimball and Mails to the showers. The Oaks, several of whom came with Meyer from the Pennsylvania club of the New York-Pennsylvania league, got eight of their 16 hits in that inning.

San Diego, the only club among the leading four that is piloted by last season's manager, tried three pitchers in an unsuccessful effort to stop the Seattle Indians. The Tribe won 7-4, but couldn't get out of the cellar.

Sad Sam Gibson of the San Francisco Seals missed the Sacramento Senators to five hits as he eked out a 2-1 victory. Sid Stringfellow, Senator shortstop, missed an earlier fielding try to keep up his average of an error a game.

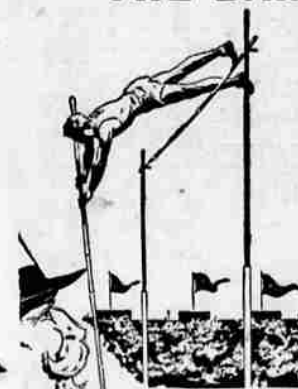

Self-Support of Oregon Penitentiary By Industrial Plants, to Save \$300,000 Annually, Offered by Senator Lessard

PORTLAND, Ore., April 3.—(AP)—State Senator Dellmore Lessard, chairman of the Oregon commission on penal institutions, advocated today an industrial program which he said would make the Oregon penitentiary self-supporting and save \$300,000 annually.

"New York's penitentiary doesn't cost taxpayers a cent," he said. "There are about 1000 strong, healthy men in the Oregon penitentiary, and they have nothing to do but loaf most of the time. Most of them would rather be busy and have a chance to earn some money."

"We could teach them to become skilled workmen and let them earn enough to have a stake, rather than turn them loose with \$5 and a penitentiary suit of clothes which a policeman can 'spot' a black away."

"If the released prisoners know trades and get jobs, we will have fewer repeaters. Many would go straight if they got a break."

Lessard said he favored having the prisoners make everything possible for their own sustenance, but "nothing to compete in the open market."

He will submit his proposal to other members of the commission at a meeting here Saturday night. Several other members are in accord with his plans, he said.

Products Suggested
"Oregon is the only state in the union which does not have some

manufacturing industry in its penitentiary," Lessard continued. "Thirty-six states manufacture automobile license plates. "It would cost less than \$10,000 to start a plant in Oregon and the same machinery could be used for manufacturing highway signs."

He also advocated manufacture of brooms and clothing for use in all of the state's institutions. Another proposal, which he said was debatable, was having prisoners do all mechanical work on state-owned automobiles.

The prisoners now manufacture their own shoes, but none for inmates of other institutions. They also do some farm work and have a flax plant.

Would Halt Flax Plant
"The flax plant should be discontinued," Lessard declared. "Oregon is one of the few places in the world where flax can be raised profitably, and the prison gives the Oregon flax industry a black eye."

Further flaxing will be required to determine the cost of inaugurating the program, but Lessard said he was in favor of starting it "as soon as possible."

He anticipated there would "be a howl somewhere, no matter what is done, but the taxpayers are entitled to consideration."

He said the New Westminster, B. C., penitentiary pays workers twenty-five cents a day, which amounts to several hundred dollars on long terms.

The commission will make its recommendations to the 1937 state legislature and probably offer bills to carry them out.

Roseburg Country Club Facilities Being Greatly Improved Under New Caretaker

Many improvements have been and are being made at the Roseburg Country club. Robert Junor, the new caretaker, who has been in the club since the first of the year, has been working hard to improve the golf course and the club house. He has built several new tees, has rebuilt the sixth green, drained the first and eighth greens and now, with a crew of men, is engaged in entirely rebuilding the ninth green.

Few people realize how much knowledge and work are required to take up the grass sod and change the surface of a green. The grass sod is cut in fourteen inch strips by a patented device invented by Mr. Junor's brother, Donald Junor, of the Portland Golf club, then rolled much as one would roll up a carpet, carried to the side of the green and there placed in piles until ready for re-laying. Then comes the matter of determining the proper elevations and the work of replacing the hardened soil with new soil. The grass is then re-laid, leaving a softer surface, easily penetrated by moisture and having a much more desirable contour.

New, larger and more comfortable benches, as well as tee boxes, have been generously donated by

Roseburg merchants. A new foundation has been placed under the east end of the club house and, in all, the property has been greatly improved since the first of the year. Old members of the club, who have not visited it recently, will be proud of, and new members and visitors will be pleased with the many new improvements, and it is certain that Roseburg Country club now faces the most successful year in its history.

Mr. and Mrs. Junor have endeavored themselves to the public by their courteous and efficient management and the club is indeed fortunate in procuring their services.

The annual Directors' cup tournament will begin Sunday and will be played for four Sundays, with participants being given the privilege of playing on any four of the five Sundays upon obtaining permission from the tournament committee. The tournament is played on a medal score basis but through the cooperation of local merchants their valuable prizes have been donated and each player is assured of a prize.

Ten tournaments have been scheduled with other clubs, providing a pleasant form of intercourse with our neighboring cities.

PUPPET STATE GIVES WARNING TO SOVIET
Two Asiatic nations whose political lives are sponsored by separate world powers found their relations further threatened today.

Manchoukuo, sponsored by Japan, warned outer Mongolia, advised by Soviet Russia, that unless the Mongolian government "takes immediate steps to terminate all kinds of provocations against Manchoukuo's frontiers, the relations of the two countries are threatened with the most serious consequences."

The warning grew out of a series of border incidents which were climaxed with a pitched battle Tuesday and Wednesday between rival forces of Mongolians and Manchoukuan.

The Manchoukuan stated the Mongolians crossed the ill-defined border between the two countries and attacked Manchoukuan-Japanese border patrols. The Mongolians accused the Manchoukuan and Japanese of a similar violation of Mongolian sovereignty.

BOY SCOUTS OF TWO STATES WILL RALLY
PORTLAND, April 3.—(AP)—The biggest circus Portland will have ever seen will be put on to-night by 5,000 Boy Scouts and their 4-15 leaders from 15 counties in Oregon and Washington.

Fifteen acts, each a picture of scout work, will be offered during the show, which ends tomorrow night.

Two troops expected to attract attention are from the Warm Springs and Chemawa Indian reservations. The scouts will appear in native dress. Another troop is from the Washington state school.
