

OAKS KEEP LEAD OF COAST LEAGUE

Orgy of Errors Mar Week- End Games; Carson Blanks Missions.

Oakland's A's and the error column came out on top of the coast league baseball's 1936 season.

In eleven week-end games the eight clubs piled up 23 errors. Honors went to the San Diego ball park where eight bobbles were made, five of them in Saturday's fray.

But there was some smart fielding. A run on double plays and with tight pitching as the Missions took two of their three week-end games from Portland, and the series 4 to 2. Between them the two clubs made 14 double plays in the three games.

Carson Hurls Blank.
Toby Carson shut out the Missions with three hits to take Sunday morning's set to 5-0. Lloyd Johnson went him one better in the afternoon, allowing the Beavers only one hit, and made this one more as he won for the Beavers 1-0. He doubled in the fourth, coming home on Eddie Jost's double. The Missions won 6-3 Saturday.

Los Angeles broke Oakland's winning streak in the Sunday opener to salvage one game out of the six game series. The Angels won that game 4-3, behind Glen Gable's steady hitting. The Oaks used four pitchers to stop the Lefty men 6-5 in the 7th inning nightcap.

Shellenbach Mauls.
Even the San Diego Padres' spit balling manager, Frank Shellenbach, couldn't stop the Seattle tribe which took the series 5-2. The Indians reached him for eight hits in the 7th inning nightcap to win 2-1 after taking the opener 4 and Saturday's erratic encounter 7-5.

Rained out of three games, San Francisco's batters got plenty of practice with 27 hits in Sunday's double header with the young Senators at Sacramento. The Seals won 8-4 and 10-1.

H. CHANDLER EGAN, NOTED GOLFER, DIES

MEDFORD, Ore., April 6.—(AP)—H. Chandler Egan, noted golfer whose death resulted from pneumonia at Everett, Wash., early Sunday morning, played a large part in inaugurating his favorite sport in southern Oregon.

He came here in 1910 as the owner of a large pear orchard and immediately introduced golf and aided in founding the Rogue river golf club.

A large share of his national successes came before he settled in this area.

He won the national amateur golf title in 1901, repeated in 1905 and was runner-up for the title in 1909. Years later, at the age when many athletic figures languish have ended strenuous competition, he won the Pacific northwest ama-

teur title—in 1920, 1923, 1925 and 1928.

Egan was a member of the Walker cup team in 1934 and aided the United States in defeating England 9-1. He was a member of the United States Golf association's executive committee for many years.

His widow, the former Alice Barrett of Chicago, and a daughter by an earlier marriage, Mrs. Morris Everett of Cleveland, survive. Egan's first wife was the former Lena McNally of Chicago, now of Los Angeles.

HOOPSTERS CHOSEN FOR OLYMPIC GAMES
NEW YORK, April 6.—(AP)—Thirteen of the country's leading basketball players today were selected to represent the United States in the Olympics at Berlin as a climax to the nation-wide tournaments, which ended last night in Madison Square garden with the Universal Pictures of Hollywood posing out the McPherson, Kas. Oilers 44 to 43.

The Universals, whose victory was unexpected following their defeat at the hands of the Oilers in the finals of the National A. A. U. championships, placed seven men on the squad. The Oilers had five named, and Ralph Bishop, University of Washington center, was selected to complete the team.

U. S. BEATEN IN SECURITIES STATUTE CASE

without "due process of law" and transgressed the amendment barring "unreasonable searches and seizures."

The government disputed this, asserting that "securities are subjects of commerce" and "a prohibition against the interstate transportation of unregistered securities is within the regulatory power of congress."

Gold Ruling Sands.
The supreme court refused today to interfere with a lower court decision that the congressional reaction barring payment of obligations in gold does not prohibit collection of the equivalent value of foreign currency if the alternative method of payment is specified.

This left in effect a ruling by the second circuit court of appeals that the St. Louis Southwestern Railway company had to pay \$42 on a \$25 coupon payable in gold, or the equivalent value of Dutch guilders.

The federal district court for southern New York had ruled likewise.

Approximately \$980,000,000 of bonds were said to have been issued by American debtors with this alternative provision.

A few weeks ago the supreme court refused to interfere with a decision by New York state courts that gold bonds of a Finland corporation, issued in this country, might be paid off in the face value of the present devalued currency.

200 KILLED, 1,000 HURT BY TORNADOES

G. C. Reed, manager of the

Gainesville telephone company, said the death toll "may be heavy."

Business houses about the town square were damaged badly.

The twister struck at Gainesville at 8:45 a. m., about twelve hours after other storms ripped from Arkansas to Tennessee.

Tornadoes last Thursday and Friday killed 43 persons, principally in Cordele, Ga., and Greensboro, N. C., and did property damage estimated at \$3,000,000.

Gainesville Scene of Ruin
Gainesville's business district was devastated and the fires trapped workers just after they had reported for duty, killing at least 42 persons and possibly more. Hundreds of others were injured.

A section of the city 2 1/2 miles long and 3 miles wide was laid in ruins. Damage was estimated in excess of \$5,000,000.

Fourteen city blocks of business houses were ruined.

Improvised morgues were set up in three miles.

The city hall and court house were destroyed.

The Dixie Hunt hotel, the city's largest, was demolished and the fate of the guests was undetermined. Fire, which raged in the Dixie Hunt block did not reach the hotel.

Governor Talmadge in Atlanta ordered three companies of national guardmen to be sent here.

"There are lots of dead people in the wreckage," City Fireman G. M. Loggins said.

No Warning of Blow
The tornado struck Tupelo at 8:17 p. m. Sunday, virtually demolishing Willis Heights, a mile west of the city proper.

Its residents were taken without warning.

Tupelo's business section emerged without great damage except for the breaking of plate glass windows, blowing down of signs, and littering of the streets with debris.

The negro section about Park lake, to the north of the city, was demolished. A number of the cottages occupied by negroes were blown into the lake and it was feared some of the occupants drowned.
