OUTPUT OF OREGON
CREAMERIES TOLD

SALEM, April 6.—(AP)—Creameries of the state of Oregon manufactured 28,838,293 pounds of butter during 1935, the annual dairy products report issued by the agricultural department showed.

Creameries listed totaled 104, while 23,988 patrons furnished the cream for the manufacturing. Cheese manufactured in the state during the same period totaled 16,387,588 pounds by the 50 cheese factories. Milk was furnished by 3,072 farmers.

The condensed milk industry in the state likewise showed favorable records compared to previous years, the department announced. A total of 26,189,444 pounds of condensed milk was manufactured by 12 plants. They also put out 5,125,549 pounds of powdered milk and 47,719 pounds of powdered buttermilk.

FORCED HAY BUYING
CUTS SHEEP PROFIT

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Sheep, in the main, came through the last cold wave with but little more damage than was caused earlier in the season, the department said. Sheepmen, however, are finding their profits cut by the necessity of buying hay at rising prices.

"Scours," a lamb disease, also was said to have taken a comparative heavy toll in the eastern and east-central Columbia river areas.

Range grass in most sections was reported unusually short but prospects for a better growth later on were seen.

No reports of a serious hay shortage were received although the condition of roads made it difficult to deliver the feed to some areas. Such a condition was understood to be particularly pressing in western and southwestern Idaho.

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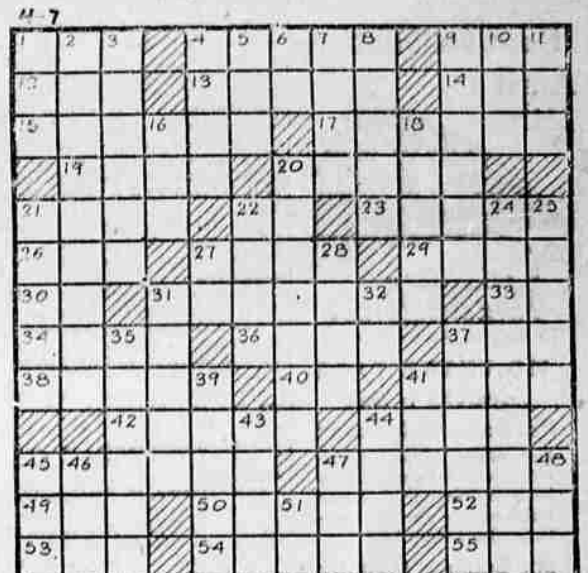
