

YOUNG DEMOCRATS TO DINE APRIL 13

**Douglas County Club Will
Join in Birthday Fete
Honoring Jefferson.**

Judson Koezer, president of the Young Democratic club of Douglas county, today announced that he had notified Frank Wickham, president of the Young Democratic club of America, that his organization was joining some 2,000 other Young Democratic clubs throughout the nation in simultaneous Jefferson day dinners in honor of the "Father of Democracy" on the evening of April 13, Thomas Jefferson's birthday.

The forty-eight state presidents, the national committee and committeewomen of the Young Democratic club of America will hold a regional convocation in Baltimore during the day. At 7:30 p. m., Pacific standard time, President Roosevelt will address them and a gathering of some 20,000

guests from Maryland and nearby states. Most of the party leaders will attend and the Maryland club officials say it will be one of the largest political gatherings in the history of the state, Mr. Koezer reports.

The president's message is to be broadcast over a nationwide hookup and Jefferson day celebrations all over the country will listen in. As explained by Mr. Wickham, a large number of the clubs were, for various reasons, unable to hold Jefferson day dinners and many of them have insisted they be given another opportunity to show their loyalty to the party.

The dinner will be held at 4 p. m. at the Umpqua hotel. Mr. Koezer announced today. He notified President Wickham that he expected not less than 100 to attend. All democrats and all democratic candidates are requested to attend and let the "youngsters look you over." Following the dinner those who care to can take in the American Legion auxiliary ball held annually on Easter Monday.

Decorations Funds Voted

The council also authorized last night an appropriation of \$252.50 for the purchase of flags and banners for street decorations.

Through the American Legion committee an opportunity was offered to purchase decorations for streets and store fronts at a close-out price. The various business houses have purchased materials for use in decorating the store fronts, and the city will now have 35 streamers for use in the business district.

These will be maintained by the fire department, which will be paid for putting up and taking down the decorations, while a small charge will be made to organizations to eventually pay the cost of the decorations.

The \$24 bid of T. H. Hill for salooning the rooms of the city hall was accepted. Two other bids of \$106.50 and \$129 were received. The work will be to be painted by members of the fire department.

Mr. Wimberly Reappointed

Mrs. G. W. Wimberly was reappointed last night as a member of the city library board. Her term had expired and her reappointment was proposed by Mayor Clark and unanimously ratified by the council.

Connellman W. F. Harris declared that Mrs. Wimberly and Mrs. Charles Roberts are entitled to a great deal of credit for their work on the library board, and particularly in volunteer labor in removal of the valuable S. D. Evans library. The two women, Mr. Harris stated, performed the work of removing the 1,000 or more volumes to the newly prepared rooms in the library and classified and indexed the books. They were given some aid by volunteer workers.

The council approved the transfer of the liquor license of Collins and Bowler to G. G. Collins, who is assuming sole management of the business at the Monogram Clear store, and referred to the liquor committee the application of C. H. Welch for a retail beer license.

An offer for purchase of two lots in North Park addition was referred to the ways and means committee.

Repeal of two obsolete ordinances pertaining to licensing of trucks and buses was proposed by Recorder A. J. Geddes and the matter was referred to City Attorney R. L. Eddy for a report.

The recorder stated that taxes are due on city-owned property taken over by the city prior to 1931 and authorization was given to pay the tax, amounting to \$2,950.72.

The Veterans of Foreign Wars were given permission to rope off a portion of Washington street, adjoining the Catholic grounds, for a street carnival to be held in connection with the Fourth of July celebration.

all confidence" in Highley. They suggested that the club expel him if he refused to resign.

Highley was said by the directors to have hired a Capt. D. Wilkey to contact a man designated only as "WT" and "WLT" in order to "scare" him into getting his resignation as a member and director of an unidentified California "corporation."

Affidavits Sought

Clementine, mentioned in the action against Highley, recently resigned as secretary of the organization after differences with Dr. Townsend. He since has testified before the house committee investigating old age pension organizations.

The inquiry into the Townsend plan was temporarily halted while Representative Cavanagh (D-N. Y.) prepared to leave tomorrow for California to get affidavits needed by the committee.

Headquarters of the Townsend plan yesterday denied reports that Dr. Townsend would resign. A statement said that he was "in the midst of reorganizing the movement."

HIGHLEY WILL LET CLUB PASS ON ACCUSATIONS

LOS ANGELES, April 7.—George Highley, a leader in the Townsend old age pension movement, said today he will let charges of "disloyal conduct" to the "people of my club."

"I have not received official notification from the board that I quit as president of this club. When I do I shall probably have something more to say," he declared.

The club is meeting soon, said Highley, and may take up the matter.

OREGON TOWNSENDITES LAUNCH ROSTER DRIVE

PORTLAND, Ore., April 7.—The Oregon Townsendites political campaign committee launched a house-to-house canvass today but found another club hailing at contraband toward the state campaign chest.

The 500 members of Portland club No. 7 tabled a proposal by Charles L. Paine of Eugene, Oregon Townsend campaign manager, that each club member pay five cents a week for six weeks.

Opponents said they did not believe the national organization approved endorsement and backing of candidates in primary elections, and asked what assurance there was the money would be spent for its intended purpose.

No other state has called for this special political assessment, said J. W. Rounds, club secretary.

"If we can be assured of one-third of the state voting strength, we will have nothing to worry about."

The campaign should bring Oregon's estimated 130,000 Townsend club membership to 200,000 and result in establishment of 130 new clubs, he said.

OREGON HOUSE MAY RE-ENTER GOP LIST

SALEM, April 7.—(AP)—Five state senators and 18 members of the house at least will be absent when the 1937 legislature convenes early next January—leaving 15 hold-over senators, 12 seeking reelection and 42 house members campaigning for their return.

The survey of complete filings which ended last week revealed also that of those who were definitely out of the running for various reasons, 16 are democrats and seven are republicans—a situation which prognosticators state may place the lower house again in the republican column.

The democratic house during the past biennium was the first for that party in 56 years. The senate remained with a republican majority.

Others, both in the senate and the house, may be prevented from returning by the electorate, while in the case of the senate several hold-overs seeking other offices had not resigned their places in the upper house. But half of the senate membership is elected every two years.

All 60 house members are to be elected. Nine members are seeking other offices, one for democratic national committee, four for congress and four for senate seats.

TORNADO TOLL OF DEATH NEARS 500

Civilians and soldiers searched for more victims in Tupelo as the bereaved set out to bury their dead.

Tornadoes last Thursday killed 43 persons, confining their fury up on Colorado, Ga., and Greensboro, N. C.

Death of injured persons added to the Gainesville toll today.

Richard P. Allen of the American Red Cross announced \$1,000,000 was needed for relief of the tornado victims.

Heavy preventive measures were taken to forestall pestilence. The dead were shrouded in news in temporary morgues pending hurried burial.

National guardsmen patrolled wreckage strewn streets with fixed bayonets, with orders to shoot would-be looters.

Gov. Hugh White of Mississippi took personal charge of relief at Tupelo, and estimated property damage at \$8,000,000.

An area a mile wide and four miles long was destroyed at Tupelo. Virtually all the business area and much of the residential section of Gainesville was devastated, with an estimated material loss of \$15,000,000. City officials said it would take Gainesville 10 years to recover.

In South Carolina, the textile area of Anderson had 200 homes, 30 injured and at least \$500,000 in property damage as the result of a twister yesterday.

MEN, DOGS GUARD AGAINST KIDNAPING

ROCHELLE, N. Y., April 7.—(AP)—Thomas F. Manville, Jr., heir to an asbestos fortune, replaced seven armed guards on his palatial Long Island sound estate today with six police dogs, the better to watch out for kidnapers.

The dogs, Manville said, have two advantages: dogs don't drink liquor and are easily awakened.

Manville expressed fear of an abduction plot after police raided a gang arsenal last month in New York City and arrested seven men and three women.

WOULD REGISTER ALL EX-CONVICTS

SEATTLE, April 7.—(AP)—Chief of Police Kirtley today considered asking the council to enact an ordinance requiring all former convicts to register with police. Kirtley said ex-convicts were congregating here as a result of the Los Angeles border blockade.

The plane, groping blindly in weather described, with reference to visibility, as "absolutely zero," last was heard from at 10:09 a. m. eastern standard time.

More than four hours later, reports reached Uniontown that a WPA worker had found the wreckage of the giant ship, crushed against the mountainside about 7 miles west of the coal mining city.

Searching planes were dropping over the broken countryside at the time.

Quickly the TWA offices in Pittsburgh reported a telephone call from the hostess.

Every available ambulance rushed to the scene, but officials said it would be some time before the bodies could be carried down a tortuous mountain trail.

HABITUAL CRIMINAL ACT BEING FOUGHT

MEDFORD, Ore., April 7.—(AP)—The constitutionality of the Oregon habitual criminal act will be tested, George M. Roberts, counsel for Raleigh H. Hoylman, announced in circuit court this morning at the opening of Hoylman's trial as an habitual criminal.

Hoylman, when called upon to plead, stood mute, and counsel waived an opening statement and declined to question jurors.

J. S. Murray of Salem, keeper of the state prison records, was scheduled to appear as a state witness.

Hoylman is charged with four convictions of felonies in this county, mostly for forgery. His first conviction was in Jackson county in 1927.

It is the first prosecution in Jackson county under the habitual criminal law.

DAY-OLD CHICKS GIVEN PLANE RIDE

BELLINGHAM, April 7.—(AP)—Undertaken as an experiment, 5,000 one-day old White Leghorn chicks were shipped from Seattle to Chicago by airplane Sunday by the Washington Cooperative Egg & Poultry association. The plane left Seattle at 6:30 p. m. and was due in Chicago at 11 a. m. Monday.

The association, whose president is G. E. Van Horn, believes this is the first shipment of chicks by airplane from the northwest.

Such shipments, he predicts, will become common next season but not many are expected to be made this year.

CIVIL WAR VETERAN PASSES AWAY AT 99

SEATTLE, April 7.—(AP)—Funeral services will be held Thursday for Thomas Walter Tyler, 99, a civil war veteran who saw the surrender of Gen. Robert E. Lee at Appomattox.

A volunteer Union army soldier from Ohio, he rose to the rank of major at the time of his "squirrel hunter's discharge" from the service.

His niece and a grand-niece survive.
