BARTH GETS VERDICT OVER RED BRUCE

(AP)—Carmen Barth, smooth-working Olympic scrapper from Cleveland, took a 10-round decision from "Red" Bruce of Pittsburgh in a rapid-fire main event on last night's fight card here.

Bruce, widely-known as a hard puncher, was given but few chances and was outboxed by Barth most of the route. Bruce went down in the seventh when Barth caught him off-balance but took no count.

Barth weighed 164, the Pittsburgher 172.

RAMAGE, LEVINSKI BATTLE TO DRAW

(AP)—Los Angeles, April 8.—(AP)—Leo Ramage, once a ranking heavyweight hope, looked down the pugilistic "come back" trail today and saw a lone both rugged and rosy.

The 25-year-old San Diego fighter, who quit the ring 14 months ago after Joe Louis put him away in three rounds, came back last night to hold Levinsky, the ex-mackered merchant of Chicago, to a 10-round draw.

LEWIS DRAWS WITH GEORGE NICHOLS

(AP)—Buffalo, N. Y., April 8.—(AP)—George Nichols, who lost his National Boxing association light heavyweight title four years ago without throwing a punch, is back after a championship bout.

Nichols, who won his NBA crown

in 1932 as a 100 to 1 shot, last night held John Henry Lewis, champion, to a draw in a ten round, non-title bout here.

Today the former champion was more confident than ever his showing will land him in the same ring with Lewis in a fifteen-round affair with the title at stake.

Lewis appeared over-confident at the start and, after winning the first round by a wide margin, lost the next three in succession. He settled down then and forced the battle from that point to the end.

The judges of the bout disagreed but Referee Luke Carr voted a draw.

TWO JOCKEYS HURT AS NAGS PILE UP

About 1,500 relief hands cleared debris in Tule where most of the 195 dead have been buried.

The threat of pestilence seemed to have been checked in both storm regions and the flood troubles which were worrying other sections had not become acute in the storm areas.

FORD V-8'S WIN RACE IN FLORIDA

Over a racing course on the sands of Daytona Beach, Florida, which drivers themselves unhesitatingly pronounced the most punishing on cars within their memory, nine Ford V-8's roared through

dune and sand pit to capture places among the first ten cars to finish.

The winner, Milt Marion, was driving a Ford V-8 stock roadster over the difficult 24-mile course, averaging 47.98 miles per hour.

The low speed average was owing to the nature of the beach road, which necessitated the use of power winches at certain points to haul the cars out of sand pits which often nearly swallowed up the fast moving stock roadsters.

Twenty-seven cars entered the race, a scant ten withstood the punishing grind long enough to cross the finish line. Nine of these were Ford V-8's.

The predominating cause of elimination of 17 cars was transmission failure. Next in order were bent tire rods, bent front axles, stripped wheel hub keys, and burned out clutches.

Originally scheduled for 250 miles, the race had to be called at 210 owing to the rising tide. Near the end of the grind the cars were receiving an almost unbelievable beating what with driving through two feet of ocean water at one place, through deep heavy sand in others, and at the turns where the course had been chopped up, it became necessary for the drivers to take them like jumping ramps.

The nine Ford V-8 drivers, who comprised nine-tenths of those finishing, were unflinching in their praise of the V-8's ruggedness and durability, stating that the Daytona Beach course, as a proving ground for cars has no rival in the United States.

MONEY HELD DUE FROM JUSTICE CASES

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the contention of the auditors that the fines should have been retained, in entirety, by the county.

Some Records Gone
"It is unfortunate," the auditors state in producing their report, "that the audit of these records was not made annually, as we find that in some of the districts the records have been lost, misplaced or burned, and after a lapse of a few years it is practically impossible to establish or reconstruct the business had before the court."

Our investigations covered over 3,000 cases, 25% of which were in the Deer Creek (Roseburg) district. This criminal business, in addition to the civil cases heard before this court would appear sufficient to warrant the establishment of a district court for Roseburg.

Uniformity Lacking
"Outside of the Deer Creek district," the report continues, "there has been no semblance of uniform system used by the justices. Each justice has had his own idea of how dockets and records should have been kept, which has resulted in some of the districts having little or no records at all."

"As far as terms of office expire in those districts doing little or no business, it would appear to be advisable to consolidate such districts until you have only five districts in the county geographically located as follows: Glendale, Canyonville, Roseburg, Drain and Roseburg. As these five districts do about 95 per cent of the justice court business of the county."

"By such consolidations the dis-

trict attorney will be able to exercise closer supervision and co-operation with the courts and the saving to the county in dockets, supplies, travel, etc., would be quite substantial."

The report further recommends a uniform system of dockets, records and reports for the justice courts.

Criminal Cases Few
The audit shows the financial status of each justice district, together with a report on the number of cases handled. Aside from the major courts, very few criminal cases have been filed, and one district has not had a single case in seven years.

The auditors found several hundred dollars included in the list of possible collections held in courts awaiting distribution. Instructions were given for a turnover of the money, and the major portion has already been received. It is believed possible that a considerable sum will result from collection of unpaid fines, forfeited bonds, etc., as well as the possible recovery of money from the state of Oregon.

PENSION CORPORATION FILES OREGON ARTICLES

SALEM, April 8.—The Old Age Revolving Pension, Ltd., filed articles of incorporation for Oregon with the state corporation commissioner, it was announced today.

The articles, accepted by the commissioner, were signed by George M. Cleveland as president; A. A. Mead as vice president; M. J. Timney as secretary-treasurer. All reside in Portland which was set out as the Oregon headquarters.

The organization was declared the same as the original one in California, but the papers did not refer to the name of Dr. E. Townsend.

Purposes of the organization were listed as teaching and promoting cultural subjects along lines of hygiene, scientific, social, economic, non-partisan politics and humanitarianism; providing essential life for all citizens of Oregon of 60 years of age or older by legislation or other lawful means; soliciting of funds; owning a printing plant and controlling of other property.

The time for the annual meeting for election of officers and three trustees was set for the second Monday of every April. Officers are to serve for one year. The three men named were to serve the first year.

LOS ANGELES CLUB QUILTS
PARENT ORGANIZATION

LOS ANGELES, April 8.—The largest club in the Townsend old age pension movement, Los Angeles No. 53, severed its connections with the national organization yesterday.

The club, claiming more than 25,000 members, affirmed its support of its president, George Higley, whose resignation or removal was demanded by directors of the movement meeting in Baltimore.

Higley was accused of "disloyal conduct." He summoned the club into session to hear the charges, and 1,500 members responded.

The club unanimously voted to disband, then reorganized immediately without affiliation with the national organization.

DEDUCTIBLE ITEM ON TAX SPECIFIED

WASHINGTON, April 7.—(AP)—Guy T. Helvering, commissioner of internal revenue, today instructed his collectors to recognize debts charged off by banks and other corporations at the order of federal, or state authorities as deductible for income tax purposes.

Treasury officials said it was the first time that banks and corporations have been permitted to make such deductions.

As an example, should the controller of the currency order a bank to write down a thousand dollar face value bond to its market price of say \$700, then the charge-off of \$300 would be deductible.

JONES ENDS TERM FOR BALLOT THEFT

SALEM, April 8.—(AP)—Walter J. Jones, former mayor of Rogue River, was released from the state penitentiary today after having served his minimum term of a four-year sentence for participation in the Jackson county ballot thefts.

Earl H. Fehl, county judge of Jackson county at the time of the thefts in 1933, will have served his minimum term April 15, and was expected to be released at that time. Warden James Lewis said. He is the last of those involved in the crime still in the penitentiary. All others have been released.
