

SOIL CONSERVATION WILL BE EXPLAINED

Details and Rules Soon to
Be Laid Before Douglas
County Farmers.

Farmers of Douglas county will have the opportunity to learn the details of the new federal soil conservation and domestic allotment act within the next ten days or two weeks, says J. Roland Parker, county agricultural agent. The first step in preparing to take advantage of the soil conservation program is setting up a temporary county committee to help get the preliminary work under way and arrange for community meetings.

Details and provisions of the soil conservation program will be explained at the various community meetings. Each community will have its own community committee elected by the producers within the community boundaries. The chairman of the various community committees will automatically become members of the permanent county committee.

The duties of the county committee will include informing members of the farm practices necessary to qualify for benefits under the new program, and to examine information supplied by farmers of the county with respect to individual farms.

Rulings Being Made
At Oregon State college a technical committee has been working on recommended practices and crops for the state to be laid before the regional and national AAA officials, who requested such cooperation. As soon as the rulings are made on several points essential to the Oregon program, extension service officials will get the detailed information out to the county groups.

Many farmers will not need to wait for all these rulings before deciding on planting plans for this year, states County Agent Parker. Most grasses and legumes have been definitely classified already as well as most soil depleting crops in this state.

To qualify for the major or soil payment a farmer must have 15 percent fewer acres in soil depleting crops this year than last. To qualify for the lesser soil building payment he must actually plant soil building crops or carry out soil building practices this year.

Nearly every producer will be able to benefit from the program and should file a work sheet and attend the community meetings says County Agent Parker.

DOOM OF ETHIOPIA VOICED BY IL DUCE

ROME, April 8.—(AP)—Premier Mussolini proclaimed to his ministers today that security for Italy in its east African colonies would be realized only with "total annihilation of the Ethiopian military formation."

Destruction of Emperor Haile Selassie's army, Mussolini told his minister, "cannot be lacking or delayed."

Mussolini asserted the population of the Ethiopian territory already conquered had demonstrated their "sympathy" for the Italians, and said the work of conquest was going forward without encountering important obstacles.

ADDIS ABABA, April 8.—(AP)—Seven Italian airplanes were reported to have bombed Dessale this morning.

A government communique from Quorom, northeast of Dessale, on the northern front, stated:

"Numerous squadrons of Italian planes have surveyed the rear of the Ethiopian lines in the last four days."

"They literally sprayed liquids and gases there. There were a large number of victims among the civilian population. It is believed there have been 80 deaths and 300 wounded by this means."

The communique denied that the Italians captured Quorom.
