KING EDWARD HANDS
OUT EASTER DOLES

LONDON, April 9.—(AP)—King Edward today paid out shining specially-minted coins to 142 persons at services in Westminster abbey commemorating the age-old ceremony of Maundy Thursday.

The ceremony was symbolic of the washing of the feet of the disciples of Jesus Christ at the last supper.

The money was doled out from special red and white purses carried on a golden salver which is among the historic relics at the Tower of London.

The new monarch was the second British ruler in 260 years to take part personally in the ancient ceremony. His father, the late King George, went with Queen Mary to hand out "Maundy pennies" at the abbey in 1934. In other years the lord high almoner, the archbishop of Canterbury has doled out the money.

Edward passed coins to 71 old men and an equal number of old women, all specially chosen for the occasion. The number of recipients traditionally corresponds to the number of years of the king's age. This year, however, by the king's special command, the number of men and women was the same as if his father had lived. The late King George would have been 71.

Each man first received 45 shillings and each woman 35. Then the king gave to each a red purse containing 12, 16s. (\$12.50) and a white purse containing 71 pence of Maundy money.

In olden days the Maundy Thursday ceremony included not only the bestowing of gifts of money, meat and clothing but also the washing of the feet of the chosen subjects. King Edward escaped that by almost 200 years.

James II was the last ruler to practice it. Even before his time, Queen Elizabeth showed signs of breaking royal tradition. She washed her subjects' feet, but only after "yeomen of the laundry" had given them a thorough scrubbing with warm water, followed by liberal applications of sweet-smelling herbs.

HEARING IN DEATH
CRASH IS WAIVED

EUGENE, April 9.—(AP)—Captain Albury L. Eagle, retired army flier, arrested at Grants Pass a few days ago on charges of involuntary manslaughter, waived preliminary hearing in the Eugene justice court this morning and was bound over to the grand jury. Bail was set at \$1500 which was furnished.

Captain Eagle is accused of causing the death of Victor Wunsch, Portland, when the Eagle car allegedly struck Wunsch as the latter was walking along the Pacific highway south of Eugene the evening of June 29, 1934.

According to information in the hands of state police, Eagle failed to stop and turned off the Pacific highway at Springfield, driving over the McKenzie pass and proceeding north to Vancouver, Wash., by way of the Wapinitia cutoff.

"ZEP" IN TROUBLE,
FRANCE GIVES AID

BORDEAUX, France, April 9.—(AP)—Havas (French) news agency reported tonight that the new German Zeppelin, Hindenburg, had signaled that it was having grave engine difficulty over the Moroccan coast.

The agency said the Hindenburg has asked emergency authorization to fly over France.

The Hindenburg is on the way back to Germany after a flight to Brazil.

French authorities, it was announced, immediately granted the authorization.

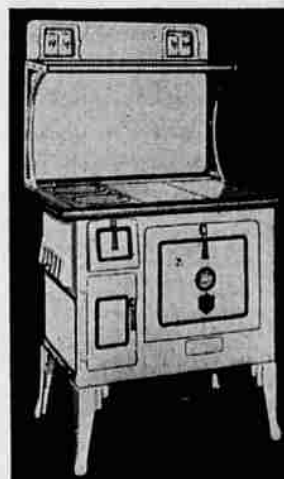
