NEW DEAL PLAYED BY MRS. W. E. EVANS

SALEM, Ore., April 10.—(AP) Mrs. William E. Evans of Glendale, Calif., speaker and organizer for the republican party in nine western states, sharply attacked the national administration's new deal policies in an address before the Marion county Young Republican club here last night.

The speaker declared that only when the present administration was ended could real recovery of the American nation begin, and the national administration of constitutional government be restored.

She held the president, not congress, to blame for the unconstitutional legislation the country has "endured," and charged he had plunged the nation 12 billion dollars further in debt, and instead of helping the farmer had fanned the unconstitutional AAA on the nation and replaced it with an ill-planned soil conservation program. "We had campaign pledges against bureaucracy," Mrs. Evans declared. "Instead we find Washington inundated with 150 new agencies which have filled every available office, yam and overflowed into hotels and private dwellings."

She scored trade treaties negotiated by the president, particularly the Canadian lumber pact in the northwest.

Mrs. Evans said republicans had a duty to their country in restoring order from chaos in national affairs. "We need to do this for the business man," she concluded, "and by that I mean the small man as much as the large one. In four more years of such prodigious spending there will be no more sound business to tax."

LAW PUTS DENTIST IN POLITICAL RACE

License Suspension Causes Dr. Pittenger to Seek Legislative Seat.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 10.—(AP)—Dr. J. J. Pittenger, aroused over the suspension of his dental license, became a candidate for the state legislature to seek dental law "reform."

His suspension by the state board of dental examiners was for advertising "satisfaction guaranteed." Recently enacted state laws which prohibit dentists from advertising guaranteed service, prices, superior workmanship or painless dentistry are "too drastic," Dr. Pittenger said.

Another point that chafes is lack of the right to appeal from board decisions.

"The dental board is practically prosecutor, judge and jury combined," he said. "I had believed it a great American axiom that every citizen is entitled to his day in court for the redress of wrongs."

Dr. Pittenger said he will have plenty to say if he is elected. His 60-day suspension, he said, was equivalent to a fine of \$1,000. "A dentist in his practice can guarantee dentistry in any manner he chooses, but is prohibited from advertising the fact," Dr. Pittenger continued. "If it is allowable in practice, why prohibit the advertising of it?"

Defended. Rallying to the defense of the law, Dr. Arthur F. Weeks of Portland, secretary of the board of examiners, said advertising is permitted, but "objectionable" types are forbidden.

"There was a great deal of misleading advertising prior to the enactment of this law," he said.

"Some long-time advertisers have told me they approve the law as it stands and would hate to see the regulations removed. These include dentists who bitterly opposed enactment and early enforcement of the law."

"The measure was designed to take the 'bait' out of dental advertising."

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., April 10.—(AP)—Most of the Klamath area's WPA workers have found jobs in private industry. Tom Dezell, dist works progress supervisor, said today.
