

HIGH SCHOOL BANDS SET FOR CONTEST

CORVALLIS, Ore., April 9.—(AP)—Thirty high school bands, a record number, will tout their snappiest notes tomorrow and Saturday in the annual state contest at Oregon State college.

The winners in all four divisions last year will compete again, but La Grande, class B champion, will enter the class A competition.

Corvallis is defending champion in the A division for schools with 700 or more students. Jefferson high of Portland, which won the class A championship three

consecutive years, will return after a year's enforced leave to give other bands a better opportunity. Beaverton is class C champion for schools with 200 to 450 students, and Burns for class D schools with fewer than 200 students.

About 100 of the 1000 musicians will compete in the solo contests tomorrow for honors in the flute, clarinet, saxophone, bassoon, trumpet, French horn, mellophone, trombone, baritone, bass and snare drums.

VICIOUS SLAVE RING BROKEN BY RAIDS

NEW YORK, April 9.—(AP)—A series of raids on political clubs has broken up one of the most vicious white slave rings in New York City, police officials claimed today, if the story of a woman complainant is true.

At least 500 women were caught by the syndicate in the last few years, the unidentified informant reported to Police Commissioner Lewis J. Valentine. Some of the victims, she said, were of well-to-do families and many of them were married. Their names were not disclosed.

First of the raids was March 1 on a political club in the Bronx where 15 persons were arrested. Other clubs were raided subsequently—seven in all were closed—but prisoners were taken only on gambling and disorderly conduct charges.

As explained by the informant, the ring's system was to rent from the clubs rooms for gambling. Taxi drivers were paid \$20 for each woman they could bring into the card games, she said, adding that the women invariably found themselves in debt and were persuaded to sign notes at exorbitant rates for loan sharks.

In endeavoring to extricate themselves from debt, it was said, they became only more deeply involved and then were approached by women accomplices of the ring to persuade them that prostitution would solve their financial problems.

DAV GROUP FORMS LAST MAN'S CLUB

Dean-Perrine chapter, Disabled American Veterans of the World War, met at the home of Richard Holmquist in Melrose Wednesday night for the regular semi-monthly meeting of the disabled veterans.

The chapter voted approval to the members to form a Last Man's club, which was organized after the close of the chapter meeting. It is believed that this is the first such club to be organized in the state.

Members signing applications were Dick Preston, Earl Wolfe, Ward Cummings, Carl Rittenhouse, Lloyd Crouch, Richard Holmquist, Harry Cleveland, Van Perrine, Roy Kelley and Roy Wells. Ward Cummings was elected secretary.

Preston, Cummings and Wolfe were appointed to draw up by-laws for the new club, which will be open to membership to any member of the Disabled American Veterans of the World War.

It was announced that the chapter would be open for any member of the chapter until the death of one of its members, after which it would be closed permanently. It was further announced that any one desiring membership in the

Last Man's club should contact Secretary Cummings.

The chapter unanimously endorsed Cummings for department commander of the D. A. V. at the state convention to be held at Medford in June. Mr. Cummings served as department senior-vice commander last year and is one of the most active D. A. V.'s in the state. He was instrumental in organizing the local chapter and was its first commander. He is also commander of the local post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and member of Umpqua post, American Legion.

After the meeting, which was largely attended, refreshments were served to the members and ladies' auxiliary by Mr. and Mrs. Holmquist.

GLIDE GRANGE SETS ANNIVERSARY FETE

Glide grange will celebrate the 25th year of its organization on April 11, at the hall at Glide. The evening will begin with a 7 o'clock potluck supper followed by a short business session and a program. All grangers are cordially invited to attend.

Special musical numbers and outside speakers, including Mr. and Mrs. Fred Goff and Dr. C. H. Bailey, prominent Douglas county grangers, are listed on the program prepared by the grange lecturer, C. B. Holland, and the committee in charge.

The five charter members will especially be honored at this time. They are Mrs. Gertrude Hatfield, who was first master; John Alexander, the first secretary; Mrs. Anna Alexander, Mrs. Elizabeth Blackely and H. A. Blackely.

200 ARCHITECTS VIE IN CAPITOL DESIGN

PORTLAND, Ore., April 10.—(AP)—Two hundred architects, 50 of them from New York, have entered the competition for the contract for Oregon's proposed \$2,500,000 statehouse at Salem, Alton John Bassett, secretary of the Oregon capitol commission, said today.

Entries must be in tonight. Plans are to be in the hands of Arthur Benson, clerk of the Oregon supreme court, by May 22. Judging will be completed May 28. Judges will not be informed as to the identity of entrants.

Architects were asked to figure on a \$2,500,000 building so that \$200,000 will remain for emergencies. The winner will receive the architectural contract, calling for 6 per cent of the gross cost. Five runners-up will receive \$1,000 in cash each.

If an out-state architect wins, he must employ an Oregon associate and turn over to him 2 per cent or one-third of the 6 per cent fee. The PWA approved a 45 per cent grant for the building which will replace the 55-year-old structure destroyed by fire a year ago.

Bassett said architects asked scores of questions, including "what is the rainfall at Salem" and "what is the temperature in the day-time."

"TIPSTER SHEETS" SCORED BY BUREAU

According to a recent report issued by the Portland better business bureau, it has been estimated that fifteen million people in the United States are periodical recipients of "tipster sheets," publications in various forms of market letters or financial sheets, mailed out by so-called brokers or financial advisory services for the purpose of selling some "pet" securities to the public.

These "tipster sheets," the bureau reports, appear in the guise of unbiased and reputable publications. The propaganda concerning the stocks they wish particularly to sell appears among the list of well-known and dividend-paying securities discussed. One such publication, the bureau says, goes unsolicited and without charge to weekly mailing list of 600,000 at a cost of \$26,000 for stamps alone, at an average of 6 cents a piece. The public, who purchased these stocks, pay for the cost of printing, mailing and the usual follow-up of telegrams and long distance telephone calls.

"Tipster sheets" depend for their success on the inherent desire of the investor to make easy money and get rich quick. They do not merit public confidence. They should not be confused with reputable financial publications or financial services.
