BLUE STONE TO BE GIVEN SHEEP MEN

Owners of sheep in Douglas county having trouble with liver fluke will be able to secure blue stone in limited amounts without cost for the control of the snail generally found in the wet and seepy areas in the pastures and found to be the alternate host of the liver fluke. Destroying the snails automatically controls the liver fluke as the life cycle of this parasite is broken up.

Farmers desiring blue stone for the control of liver fluke are requested to be at the county garage back of the courthouse in Roseburg next Thursday between 10 a. m. and 4 p. m., according to County Agent J. Roland Parker, who is in charge of distributing the blue stone to sheep owners willing to cooperate in eradication of the parasite on their farm and pastures. Containers or sacks must be provided by individuals securing the blue stone and each party must agree to use the material as directed by instructions that will be available at time of delivery.

The blue stone is being provided by the government through a WPA project sponsored by the bureau of animal industry to cut down heavy losses occurring each year as a result of animals becoming infested with liver fluke.

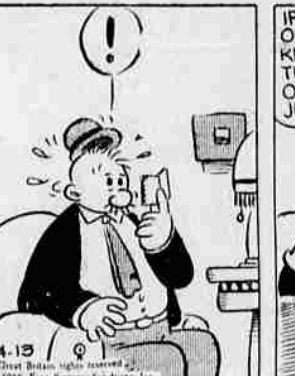
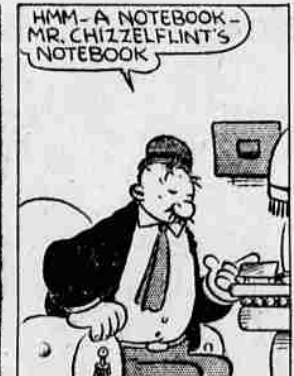
